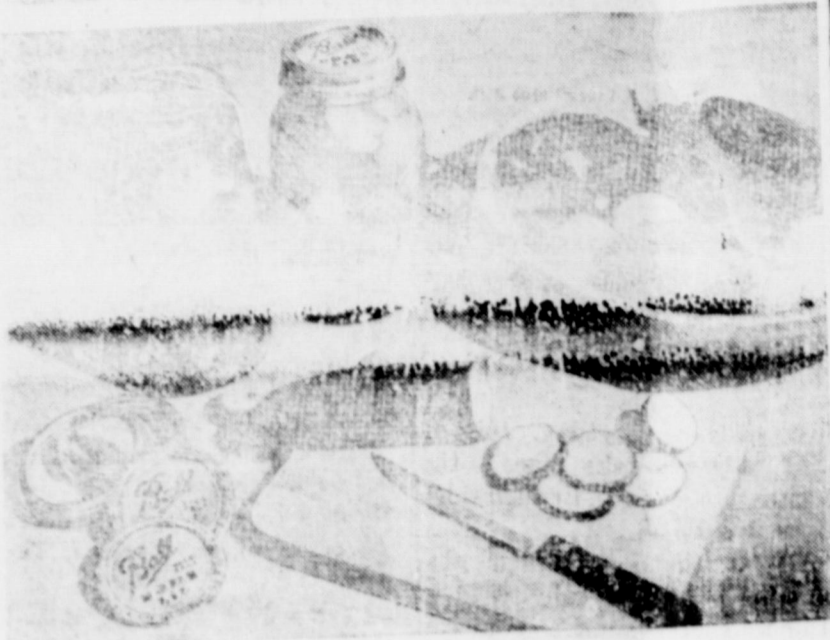

QUICK, SLICED PICKLES

- 3 quarts sliced cucumbers
- 3 onions sliced
- 5 1/2 cups vinegar
- 3 cups brown sugar
- 1 pod hot red pepper
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 2 tablespoons mustard seed
- 1 teaspoon turmeric
- 1/2 tablespoon celery seed
- 1 piece horseradish
- 1/2 teaspoon alum

Soak cucumbers and onions (separately) 5 to 10 hours in brine made by dissolving 1/2 cup salt in 1/2 gallon cool water. Drain well. Add onions, 2 1/2 cups vinegar, and 2 1/2 cups of water to the cucumbers. Simmer about 10 minutes. Do not cook until soft. Drain. Discard liquid in which scalded. Make sirup by boiling the sugar and spices with 3 cups of vinegar and 1 cup of water for 10 minutes. Then add alum. Pack well drained cucumbers and onions in hot Ball Mason Jars. Cover with boiling sirup. Seal at once with Ball Dome Caps.

Pressure Saucepan Saves Time and Fuel

In a comparatively short time the pressure saucepan has won an assured place in farm kitchens, according to Laura Dalley, in an article in *Copper's Farmer*, one of the best known farm magazines.

It saves time and fuel. Many different foods may be prepared in a pressure saucepan. It is particularly good for those which need long cooking. "Pressure cooking," Miss



Dalley says, "preserves food value, color and flavor."

A few rules of operation are important:

1.—Never fill the pan more than two-thirds full.

2.—Be sure that steam flows steadily from vent before you close it.

3.—Wait until weight or pressure control rattles or hisses or cooking indicator is at right position to your directions before you start counting time. Then reduce the heat and let cook for specified time.

4.—Reduce the pressure as each recipe indicates.

5.—After pressure is reduced, be certain to remove the weight, or lift the pressure control, before removing cover.

Some farm women are doing a limited amount of canning in their pressure saucepans, Miss Dalley points out.

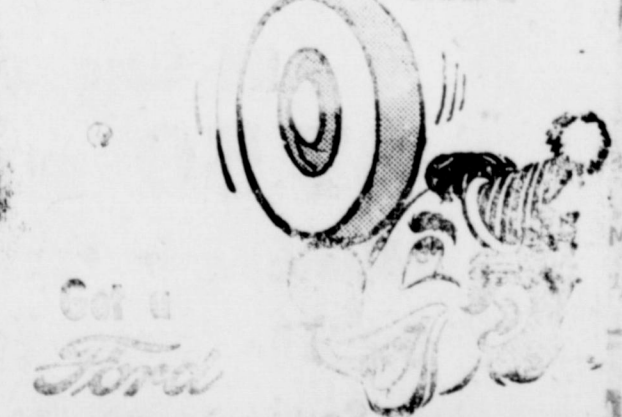

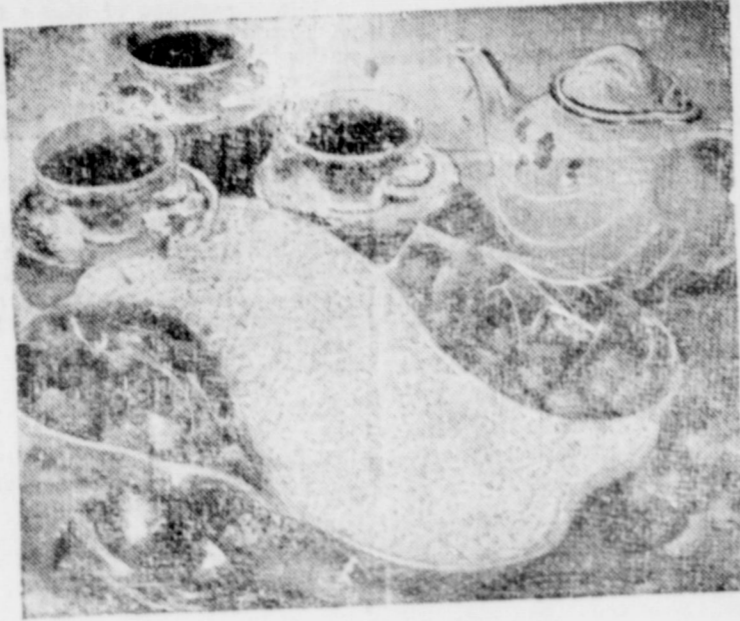

Almond Chicken With Rice

Chinese Chicken Almond With Rice, a delightful delicately flavored dish with chicken, celery topping, is sure to please your family. It makes an attractive "one main dish type meal" and is easily served to a crowd. Fresh or canned mushrooms may be used for making Chinese Almond Chicken.

INGREDIENTS
 1 cup uncooked rice
 1 cup sliced mushrooms (canned or fresh)
 1/2 cup almonds - blanched
 2 tablespoons salad oil, to be used 1 tablespoon at a time
 1 clove garlic, cut in half
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 cup cubed bamboo shoots (canned)
 1/2 cup thinly sliced water chestnuts (canned)
 1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
 1 cup diced, cold chicken (fresh or canned)
 2 tablespoons liquid (1 tablespoon each, from bamboo shoots and water chestnut cans)

INGREDIENTS FOR GRAVY
 2 teaspoons cornstarch
 1/2 teaspoon sugar
 4 tablespoons water
 4 teaspoons soy sauce

GARNISH
 1/2 cup sliced green onion

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE—To make 3 cups fluffy rice: Put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt in a two-

quart saucepan and cover with a tight-fitting lid. Bring to a vigorous boil. Then reduce the heat as low as possible and steam for 14 minutes or until all the water is absorbed, leaving the separate rice grains with their full nutritional value. This makes very firm rice grains. (If you prefer more tender rice grains, add 1/2 cup more water and increase the slow cooking time 4 or 5 minutes.) Remove the lid, permit the rice to steam dry to the desired consistency and the grains will be separate and fluffy. Never stir rice; lift gently with a fork.

METHOD: Brown almonds in 1 tablespoon oil. Set aside. With table fork, mash garlic into salt in skillet. (Be sure there is a tight-fitting cover, which can be used later.) Add 1 tablespoon oil, then add chicken. Brown lightly. Add 1 tablespoon oil and then bamboo shoots and mushrooms. Brown lightly. Add liquid, drained from canned bamboo shoots and water chestnuts. Cover tightly. Cook over low heat 5 minutes. Add water chestnuts, celery and 1/2 of the almonds. Just heat through. Celery and chestnuts should remain crisp. For gravy... shake up in small jar, cornstarch, salt, sugar, water and soy sauce. Stir into mixture. Cook until liquid thickens and is smooth. Sprinkle over dish, green onions and rest of almonds. Serve with hot fluffy cooked rice. This will serve 4.

Jelly Making—Easy and Rewarding

Spend a little time during the summer making jelly to be used on breakfast toast, hot biscuits, between-meal sandwiches for the children, and lop a sizeable food expense item from your next winter's grocery bill!

Excellent jelly is easily made from the juice of tart apples, grapes, currants, blackberries and several other fruits and berries. They contain enough pectin, the substance in fruits which makes jelly "set." But, some fruits are low in pectin, notably cherries, peaches, strawberries and sweet apples, and the amount of pectin in a fruit may vary from season to season. It is also influenced by the degree of ripeness.

You may mix fruit juices known to be low in pectin cup for cup with those known to contain a great deal

of pectin, but it is usually better to add pectin—the kind you buy in liquid or powdered form—when making jelly of low-pectin fruits. It is also faster. A one-minute boil is enough for jelly-making when you use either Certo or Sure-Jell, well known brands of natural fruit pectin.

You may even make jelly from canned or frozen juices and fruits by using pectin. This is one of the easiest ways of making jelly because it eliminates preparation of the fruit and permits you to make jelly any day of the year in about 15 minutes time.

Pectin may be bought at the food store in either liquid or powdered form. Be sure to follow the directions which come with the bottle or package when you make your jelly.
