

Area gins report a good cotton harvest underway

The cotton harvesting season is in full swing in Bailey County and area gins are reporting good crop turnouts and prices.

"As far as I know, it (the harvest) is going really good. I believe all of the gins are ginning," said Curtis Preston, agricultural extension agent at the Bailey County Extension Office.

"The farmers are mainly getting all of the dryland stripped and several people have already started irrigating and some are still waiting on a freeze. But the majority have defoliated," Preston said.

Marvin McCall, manager of the Maple Gin reported that as of last Monday approximately 5,600 bales of cotton had been ginned at that gin. Muleshoe Co-Op Gin was following close

behind that as of last Monday, having ginned 3,100 bales of cotton, according to manager Charles Moraw.

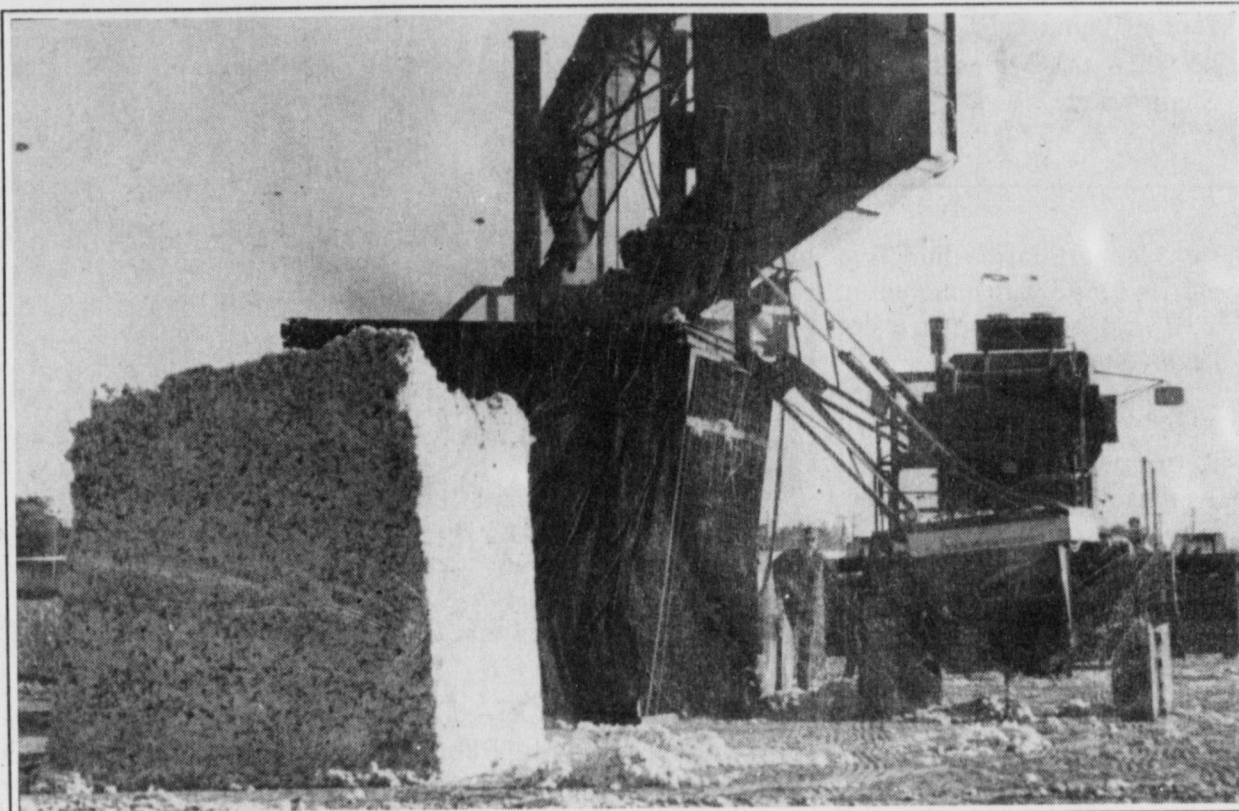
Moraw said that prices seem good this year, averaging between \$.60 and \$.64 cents a pound.

According to Donny Baker, Manager of the Farmers Co-op Gin Association of Enochs, that gin has ginned 3,000 bales of cotton as of Monday.

"The harvesting is still going on," Baker said. "There have not been much problems and we didn't have any problems with hail this year."

West Camp Gin had ginned 1,462 bales of cotton as of Monday.

"Compared to last year, we are way ahead. We are doing pretty good," said James Shebart, manager.

"The quality is good, grades are good, turnout is good. It is just an excellent quantity of cotton. Prices are also good, between \$.60 and \$.64 cents," Shebart said.

Needmoore Co-op Gin, as of Monday, reported 1,300 bales of cotton ginned.

According to Wanda Shafer,

bookkeeper, prices this year are above average, around \$.63 per pound.

"I would say this is a good season," she said.

Bailey County Gin as of Monday had ginned 1,100 bales of cotton.

"That is good compared to last year," said manager Pea-

nut Hawkins. "Prices are pretty good, a little better than last year."

The harvest in Parmer County may be a different story. As of Monday, North Lazbuddie Gin had ginned a reported 1,050 bales of cotton.

Mules use big play to blow out Bobcats, 43-15

DIMMITT—The Muleshoe Mules exploded for three first quarter touchdowns in the span of 1:13 to set the stage for their impressive 43-15 win Friday night at Dimmitt.

The Mules (2-7, 1-3 in District 2-3A) got on the board first when Jimmy Gauna connected with Daniel Garbarino on a deep post pattern. Garbarino caught the ball and out-

raced the Bobcat secondary for the 70-yard score.

Garbarino put the Mules up 14-0 on a 19-yard touchdown reception. On the play, Garbarino caught a quick slant and even as he was still catching the ball began to pivot to the outside to leave Bobcat cornerback Dagon Newto grasping at air.

The play was set up by a

fumble recovery by Chad Johnson.

Rashad Kirven had the final bit of first quarter fireworks when he went up the middle from his own 19-yard line, split a pair of Bobcat tacklers and jetted the final 50 yards untouched.

"It's pretty much a shock to everybody when your team comes out and scores three touchdowns that quick, on

three plays," said Mule head coach Randy Adair. "I don't know what kind of effect that had on Dimmitt."

The effect must have been substantial, because the Bobcats only mounted two serious drives all game, both in the first half and both resulting in touchdowns.

Despite that, that Mule defense was solid. They forced three fumbles (recov-

ered only one) and caused a pair of safeties. The Mules hadn't forced a safety all year.

"I'm proud of the kids, proud of the way they played. They were due for something good to happen to them," Adair said.

Muleshoe's offense was in high gear, piling up 307 yards before intermission (475

County jail denies charges in lawsuit by former inmate

On behalf of the Bailey County Jail Sheriff's Department, a response to a lawsuit by a former inmate at the county jail, was filed this past week by District Attorney Johnny Actkinson.

The county jail had a lawsuit filed against it last week by Ismael Ramirez Reyes, a former inmate who is current in a state transfer facility in

Abilene. In his lawsuit, Reyes alleged that he fell down after taking a shower and suffered injuries and continues to suffer from them due to "unsafe conditions at the jail house."

In the response filed in the 287th District Court on Tuesday, the defendant entered a general denial of all allegations.

The response by the county

further states that the county jail has governmental immunity pursuant to Vernon's notated Texas Statutes and that the plaintiff has not filed or followed prerequisites to allow a lawsuit like this against a government entity.

When contacted on Thursday, Actkinson said that he

does not comment on pending lawsuits. However, he did state that this last note concerning prerequisites, stated in the response to the lawsuit, basically means that the plaintiff has to follow the rules, even if he is acting as his own attorney.

Actkinson said that there are some rules and procedures re-

quired in the lawsuit process that Reyes did not follow. Actkinson would not say which rules or procedures they were.

The response to the lawsuit further states that the lawsuit should be dismissed and at the cost of the plaintiff.

A hearing or trial regarding the lawsuit will be set at a future date.

Casas is new pastor at Spanish Church of God

The Rev. Fernando Casas is the new pastor at the Spanish Assembly of God Church in Muleshoe. Casas, who is replacing former church pastor Antonio DeAquino, has lived in Muleshoe with his family for a month now.

Fernando and his wife Maria have two daughters, Sandra, 14 and Monica, 11.

"I am very happy to be in Muleshoe. I like the love from the people we have received when we came here," Casas said.

Prior to coming to Muleshoe, Casas was pastor in Raymondville and in Oklahoma for a combination of five

years. Casas received a bachelor of arts degree in theology at Mexico, D.F. in 1983. He said that he has a total of 20 years of experience in the ministry.

Casas says he has no immediate plans for any changes at the church, but said he is making plans for special Thanksgiving and Christmas services. Next Monday, he will conduct a Children's Special Service at the church at 7 p.m.

Casas said he hopes to be active in the Muleshoe community, with his family, he enjoys travelling and playing basketball.

The Mules added a 25-yard field goal by Edward Rodriguez and were awarded a safety when a Bobcat lateral went out of bounds in the end zone.

The second half consisted of Muleshoe running the clock out. Kirven scored their only offensive points of the half on a 9-yard run and Rodriguez ran the ball in for the two-point conversion. The defense picked up another safety in the fourth quarter when the game was already decided.

Muleshoe rounds their season out next week against Shallowater at Benny Douglass Stadium.

The growing political influence of the so-called "religious right" promises a lively political debate in America this year. The New Militant Center

In the spring of 1992, Ross Perot unleashed a flood of voter energy and frustration when he announced on "Larry King Live" that he would run for president if Americans got him on the ballot in all 50 states. Two million people called his 800 number urging him to run and offering assistance. By mid-June, polls showed 40 million people said they would vote for Ross Perot for president of the United States.

Though only 20 million people actually voted for Perot on election day, his supporters have joined with other like-minded centrists to form a new militant center that is electrifying American politics. The New Militant Center examines this significant political front and its impact on legislatures and elections around the country.

The New Militant Center chronicles the efforts of socially-tolerant, fiscally conservative citizens in several states who are determined to overhaul a system they believe is badly in need of financial and moral change. Taped across the United

States, the one-hour program follows people inspired by Perot to become involved in politics and looks at what these activists are doing to change laws, unseat incumbents, and force budgetary and ethical reforms.

*In Montana, members of the new militant center have gathered enough signatures to put an initiative on the ballot that, if passed by voters in November, will dissolve the legislature's authority to tax citizens.

*In 11 of the other 23 states that allow citizens to amend the state constitution or pass statutes through the initiative process, efforts are under way requiring state governments to submit tax increases to a vote of the people.

*Incensed by their legislature's refusal two years ago to place a constitutional amendment imposing term limits before voters, residents of Massachusetts have gathered enough signatures to put to a vote this fall a law that denies eight-year legislative incumbents a place on the ballot.

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Drive with caution this winter

Trooper C.B. Baiza, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Winter driving is more hazardous than most people realize. There are more hours of darkness, often less visibility, and sometimes freezing temperatures with ice, sleet or snow. These are real challenges for drivers and test a person's ability to drive."

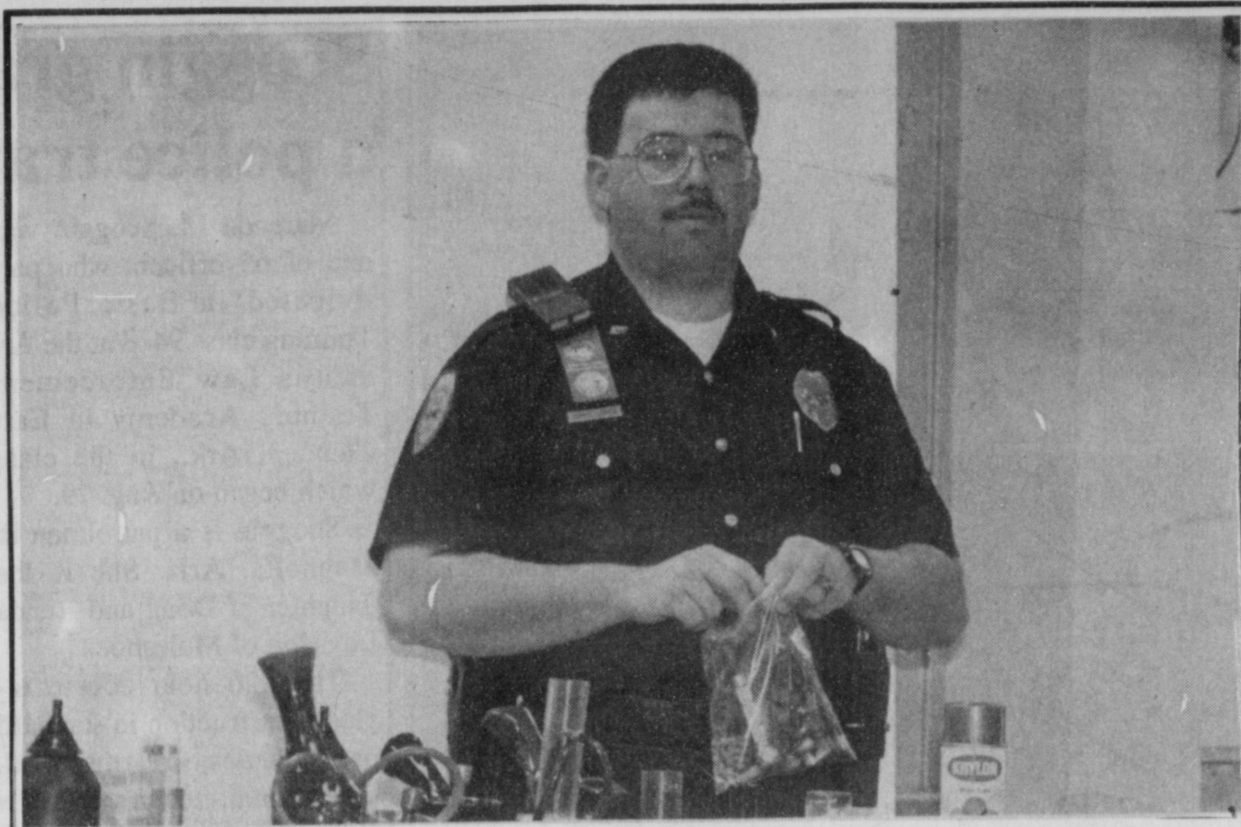
"Safe winter driving, when it's all said and done, is largely the application of common sense to some basic driving facts," C.B. Baiza added.

"Drivers must be able to see all around their vehicle to drive safely. Make sure all ice and snow is removed from all windows. Don't be a 'peep-hoe' driver. Keep windows from fogging by using the defroster. If necessary, stop and knock ice or snow off wiper blades to keep the windshield clear."

Too much speed on slippery roads is the mistake that breeds the most trouble. Adjust your driving habits to match the weather and road conditions. Trips on icy roads are going to take longer. Face the facts, don't be in a hurry. If the road is covered with ice or snow, start your vehicle moving slowly and gently. When stopping, apply your brakes lightly and much earlier than usual. Make your turns slowly and smoothly.

Most loss of control comes in the form of skids. Skids don't just happen, they are caused by the driver in most cases. To recover from a skid, back off the accelerator, stay off the brakes and steer your vehicle in the direction you want to go.

It is obvious that winter driving can pose problems for even the most experienced drivers. But as stated above, if people take time, take it easy, make smooth movements and adjust speed to match conditions, it will be a safer winter.

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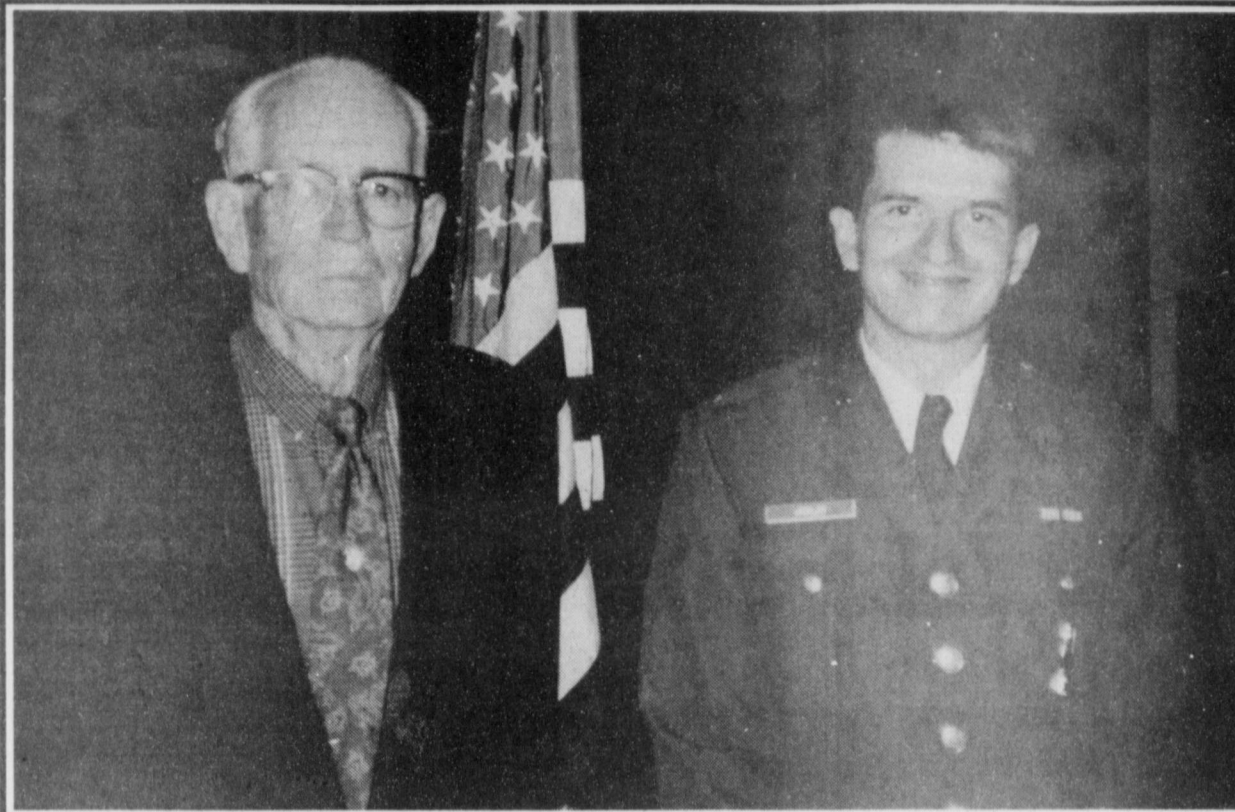

Flu vaccines urged for people with high risks

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) warns each year that anyone who may be at increased risk of complications of influenza should be immunized before the flu season begins.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) each year predicts which strains of influenza pose the greatest public health danger. The vaccine CDC has recommended for the 1994-95 season is designed to combat the A/Shangdong, B/Panama and A/Texas (first isolated in Houston in 1991) strains of the disease.

Flu vaccines are subject to yearly change, and the effectiveness of the shots declines with time. Therefore annual immunizations with the recommended vaccines are necessary for people most at risk.

People most at risk of se-

vere or fatal complications of the disease include those 65 or older, anyone with chronic respiratory or heart problems and children weakened by disease.

"Yearly, usually between December through April, influenza kills about 20,000 in the U.S., most of them in high-risk categories," Robert D. Crider Jr., director of TDH's Immunization Division, said. Crider said that the elderly are among the hardest-hit by influenza and its complications.

"Fewer than 30 percent of Americans in high-risk groups heed our annual warnings to seek influenza vaccinations," he added. "We know that one reason some older people fail to be vaccinated is because of an unfounded fear that the vaccine can actually cause influenza. The truth is that a vaccinated person may still contract some strain of influenza, but not from the vaccine. If they do become ill, the vaccine usually

helps lessen the severity of the case."

The categories of people who are most likely to develop influenza complications are: People 65 years old and older; adults and children with chronic heart or lung disorders, including children with asthma; People under medical care for chronic metabolic disease or blood problems or weakened immune systems; and children (18 and younger) who already are receiving long-term aspirin therapy, which can place them at risk of developing Reye syndrome after influenza.

"We strongly recommend influenza vaccinations for all people in high-risk groups, especially if they are international travelers or if they are pregnant," Crider advised. "People infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (the virus which causes AIDS) also may be at increased risk for flu complications." In addition, CDC recommends that physicians, nurses and other health professionals should be immunized against influenza to avoid spreading the disease to their patients. Residents and employees of nursing homes and other facilities treating

chronically ill patients also should be immunized.

"We advise physicians to offer vaccine to their patients during routine clinic visits, beginning in September and throughout the influenza season," he said. "Children younger than 9 who have never received these influenza vaccines will need a first shot, followed a month later by a

booster. Adults, however, will need only one shot in a season, since CDC has found no added benefit in a second shot for adults in a single season."

Crider explained that all unimmunized residents of chronic-care facilities, such as nursing homes, should be immunized during October and November.

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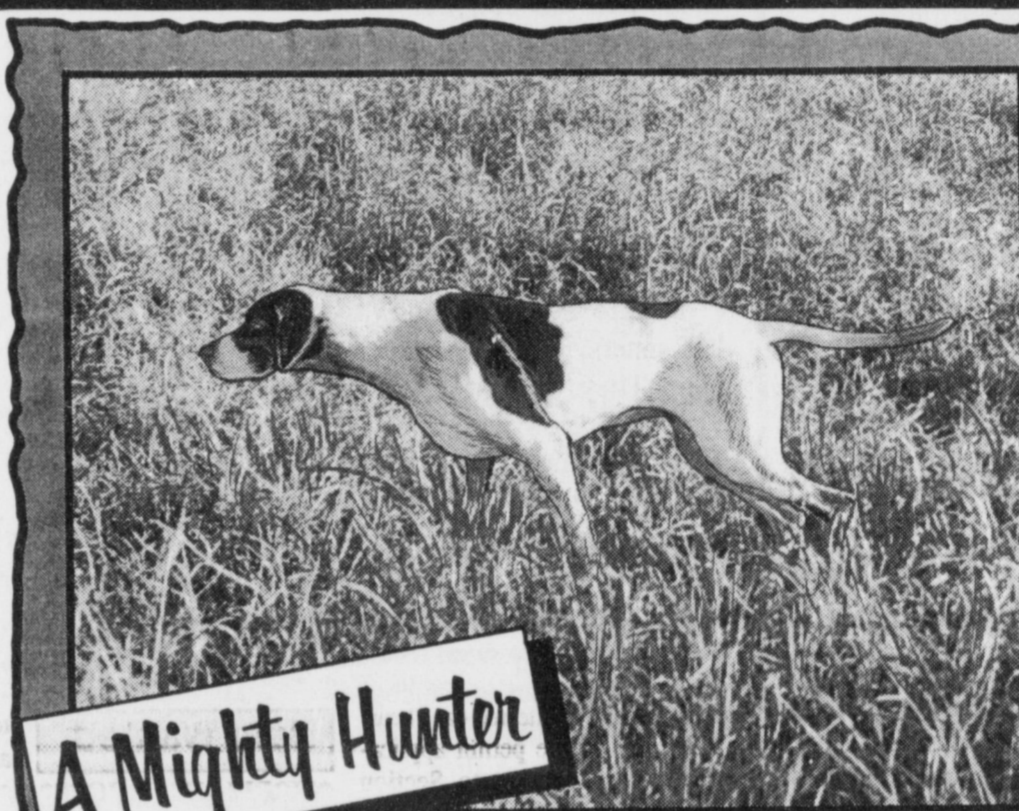

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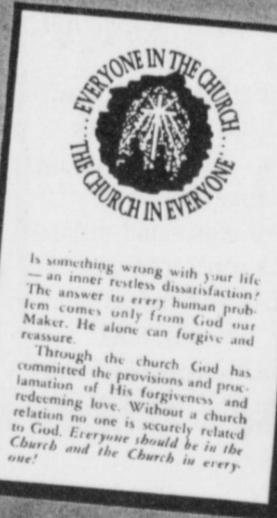
