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#### Serbs block U.N.'s attempt to evacuate

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Bosnian Serbs massacred civilians and blocked U.N. efforts to evacuate 1,500 sick and wounded people Tuesday as they overran a Muslim enclave in eastern Bosnia, according to U.N. officials.

Serbs were "plundering, killing and burning," said Lyndall Sachs, a U.N. spokeswoman, with tanks rumbling through the smouldering ruins of villages where American pilots had dropped thousands of meals the day before.

The U.N. officials said Serb fighters in the Cerska and neighboring Srebrenica area were killing women and children.



#### Republicans join health reform plans

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Clinton broke bread with Republicans Tuesday in a political gesture that won no new support for his economic plan but produced talk of cooperation on overhauling the nation's health care system.

"We want to be players in health care reform," said Sen. Bob Dole, the Senate minority leader.

While Clinton was meeting with Republican leaders, House Democrats were looking for \$3 billion to \$4 billion more in spending cuts in the president's pack-

House Budget Committee Chairman Martin Olav Sabo of Minnesota said his committee was eyeing both defense and domestic programs, but has made no final decisions.

The administration has indicated that budget director Leon Pannetta, who was speaking to the House Democratic caucus Wednesday, would back a modest package of additional cuts.

#### Control advocates welcoming Clinton

WASHINGTON (AP) -With an ally in the White House for the first time in years, gun control advocates are pushing hard for national restrictions while getting mixed results in state battles with a gun lobby once considered all powerful.

New Jersey and Virginia are at the forefront of the state battles, which President Clinton plunged into Monday with pointed criticism of the National Rifle Association. He said the NRA and others are "fixated" on defending the right to bear arms to the degree they ignore violent crime.

There is evidence that the NRA's absolute opposition to restrictions has caused cracks in the organization's imposing political strength. Many Virginia lawmakers complained about the NRA's absolutism and what they considered strong-arm tactics before adopting a measure last week to limit handgun purchases.

Backers predict enactment this year of the "Brady Bill" national waiting period for handgun purchases.

### Negotiations continue in

WACO (AP) - At least 14 persons died in Sunday's assault on the Branch Davidian compound, sources said Tuesday as preparations appeared to be under way for an end to the standoff that began with a bloody gun

A well-placed federal official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said there were at least 10 people dead inside the Mount Carmel compound Other reports placed the count between seven and 15.

Four federal agents and one other cult member were known dead in the initial assault Sunday morning, with another cult member killed in a second gun fight Sunday night. That body apparently was retrieved by cult mem-

Activity increased about 8 p.m. as buses and minivans with darkened windows drove away from the 77-acre compound, and there were reports that peace justices, who serve as coroners in some Texas counties, had been called to the scene.

In a taped statement broadcast earlier Tuesday, cult leader David Koresh had said he would come out "peacefully," but the standoff continued hours later. Negotiations went on into the night, said Jack Killorin, a spokesman for the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

Early Tuesday, eight more children and two adults were released from the compound. Then about 8 p.m., several buses and minivans left. There were reports another 20 children had been released, but that could not be immediately confirmed. State Children Protective Services spokesman Bryan Gilbert earlier said the agency was expecting another 20 children Tuesday evening.

#### I repeat myself

To the editor:

Regarding Natalie Bueno's response to my original letter about the nature of rights: Either I failed to make my point, or Ms. Bueno is unable to read. I will grant her the benefit of the doubt, and restate the nature of rights without the emotionalism, so that those of you who have a difficult time handling abstract ideas will not be as distracted.

A "right" is a moral principle sanctioning a man's freedom of action in a social context. There is only one basic right: the right to one's life. Out of this basic right come two corollaries: liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. In English, this means you can go about your business without interference from other men. The purpose of government is to protect man's rights. The purpose of the Constitution is to protect men from the government.

The purpose of government is not to make people happy. Nor is it the purpose of government to feed people. Nor is it to give people health care on demand. These are not in the Bill of Rights, and yet the popular conception is that, somehow, they are "rights." How? No one ever asks.

Declaring food, shelter or health care as a right does not cast a magical spell creating food and water. Hard-working people produce these goods and services. The only entity that can force them to give you their goods and services for free is the government. This is the government at its worst; it is no longer protecting man's rights - it is giving some men privileges at the expense of others.

Ms. Bueno, I got the impression from your letter that you felt I had no compassion. The opposite is true. Indeed, if we lived in your ideal world, compassion would be meaningless, since you would go to jail if you did not help the ailing. This policy would harbor more resentment than compassion. Is this what you think the framers of the Constitution intended?

And this time, Ms. Bueno, leave the insulting remarks at home. Male Care Provider, indeed!

She will speak at 9 a.m. in the University Center Allen Theatre on being the public relations officer for a major university and on the boundaries she goes beyond.

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

Since I became involved in the student government as a freshman, I have convincing argument to minimize cuts on his or her university to the legislators in Austin.

A well-thought out and researched speech certainly must be effective. I still wondered how can a Texas Tech SA President stand out from the others and give not only an effective speech, but a powerful speech. I have been involved in the effort to do just that since last September. It is called the Legislative Affairs Committee, and we will be addressing all student organizations to discuss the budget cuts. During this time the students will write how the budget cuts are affecting them on postcards, and then the committee will mail the postcards to their respective representatives in Austin. This is the most powerful yet most basic argument that an SA President can take to Austin. This method allows for the voice the objective to address and assist in the financial aid situation of the constituents to be heard, and hopefully it will make an impact. I would like to expand the use of this committee to address other issues facing the students in Austin, among them, the grade replacement policy which is being debated in Austin in the form of House Bill 1. By continuing and expanding the goals of the legislative committee, the students' voices will be heard and may make a difference in the lives of the students.

The next objective I would like to discuss is my proposal to streamline the registration and advisement procedures. I will present a proposal to the Faculty Senate to end the requirement for signatures on drop/add slips. The issue is that students finally get to the computer terminal during registration, a class he/she might need is not available, so the student must literally sprint across campus to an adviser to have a drop/add slip signed before sprinting back to the UC only to find that someone just filled up the last section of that course. This scenario is all too common, and could be avoided by allowing students to drop/add without a required signature. A second proposal I will present to the Faculty Senate would be to limit mandatory advisement to incoming freshmen, incoming transfer students and when filing a degree plan. This would free up more time for quality advisement for students in need. not being spent. Of the \$140,000 allocated to student organizations last year, over \$10,000 went unspent. As President, I would make a concerted effort with the Internal Vice President to maximize student organizational spending. I plan to address this issue by sending letters to organizations behind on their planned spending and to allow the interorganizational reallocation of funds under special circumstances. Hopefully, these efforts will increase the percentages of the spending of student organizational

My final objective is one that is of utmost importance. This is through student initiated efforts. Chris Loveless has already enacted a student committee to serve as a think tank for ideas for improving the current system. Many of the ideas which have come from this committee are presently being reviewed by the administration for possible implementation. I will continue this committee as well as expand its present focus to that of a facilitator. This committee will serve as a 'go between' for students lost in the system. If a student has a pressing question, he/she will be able to contact another student for an answer or referral. This will hopefully take some of the burden off the financial aid office, as well as serve as another means to making this process less cumbersome for the student. I believe this is a feasible and practical measure the student government can make in this arena.

The overall goal of my platform is to provide the Texas Tech student with maximum service from his/her student government. To do this we must enhance communication links between the students, the student government and the Legislature in Austin. Registration and advisement continue to be on the students' collective tongue. The student government should address these issues and take them to the proper authorities. Student organizational spending trends must improve, and the student government can play a role in this improvement. Lastly, the financial aid situation can feasibly be improved through student initiated action. I believe that all of the ideas discussed above are practical and very attainable with the right leadership.

I feel that the best way to accomplish this is through personal meetings between the Internal Vice President and the relevant senators.

The way I propose to accomplish this is by the Internal Vice President personally assuring that each of the seven committee chairpersons are educated well enough to, in turn, teach others what they have learned on an individual basis on the senate retreat.

Clarification of the budget process is also very important. Both publications sent out by the senate that relate to the budget process are unclear and hard to understand. This results in quite a few discrepancies and problems for both the organizations involved and the Committee on Budget and Finance. To solve this problem, the Internal Vice President and the Committee on Budget and Finance should meet and rewrite these publications so that they are more informative and easier to follow.

It is also very important for a person entering this position to understand the importance of fairness and objectivity. 
#### intramural softball teams wanted

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

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
