## Martin, Goodloe Principal Speakers At Gorman Meet

Bishop W. C. Martin of Dallas and Dr. R. W. Goodloe of the Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University will be two of the principal speakers at the Cisco District Conference to be held in the Gorman Methodist Church beginning Wednesday night, November 15, and continuing through Thursday, November 16, according to announcement from the Rev. Leslie Seymour, district superintendent. Bishop Martin, in charge of the Fort Worth-Dallas area which comprises three conferences including the Central Texas, will preach at 8 o'clock Tuesday afternoon and Dr. Goodloe will preach at 11 Thursday morning.

Wednesday night at 6:30 a Methodist men's banquet program will be given in the annex of the Gorman church, the principal speaker for this occasion being E. F. Jud of Waco, conference lay leader. C. J. Thompson of De Leon, lay leader for the Cisco District, will be toastmaster for the program which it is expected will be attended by some 150 lay men from over the district.

The official opening program of the district conference in the church sanctuary will follow the banquet at which time the choir of First Methodist Church in Cisco will lead the congregation in a thirty minute period of hymn singing. The lay sermon for this meeting will be given by Mr. Roy L. Farrow of Dallas.

Speakers for the Thursday sessions will include representatives from the various schools and colleges of the Methodist Church as well as from other congregational interests such as the Methodist Home in Waco and the Harris Memorial Hospital in Fort Worth. A composite report from all the pastors and churches of the district will be presented indicating work accomplished during the first half of the current church year.

**Interflowing Life**  
 Lesson for November 12, 1950

**AN AUSTRALIAN minister once remarked:** "If ever a church could be found whose members treated one another better than people treat one another on the outside, that church would flock to its doors." In that exaggerated remark there is a pointed truth, and in a matter of fact, that was the case in the early church, and the world did flock to its doors. From six score people that a church grew to 5,000 in one time, and in less than three centuries it was the religion of a world-empire.

**ON THE "outside" what is the rule?** David Harum put it in a nutshell: "Do unto your neighbor as he would like to do to you." "Every man for himself and the devil take the hindmost." "Every man has his price." "Look out for Number 1." "Blasphemy is that to which his own horn, the same shall not be touched."

**People get tired of living in a world like that. Something tells them that the everlasting scum is not the way to live, there must be a better way. Suppose they could look down the street and see that better way actually being put into practice by a little community of people?** They ought to be able to see it wherever there is a Christian church. But—is the average church that kind of community? Do the members treat one another (on Mondays, that is, with more understanding, consideration and affection than the local athletes or Non-lingarians show toward one another? Is there anything whatever that seems to link these First What-is Church people together with a common bond?

**Making Fellowship Real**  
 In a large city there will be a page or more of Smiths in the telephone directory. These all have the same name, but most of them don't know one another and don't care. Too often it is this way with Christians.

**What they ought to have is fellowship.** This is a mere word. It can be a real thing. It is like a two-way blood transfusion, in the realm of personality, it is interflow of life. It can be the source of the Christian's finest growth.

**So our Christian faith and life are kept growing and growing through the fellowship of like-minded persons.** One thing your Sunday school class, and indeed the whole congregation, may well consider seriously, even adopting it as your Project for the Year is this: What can we do to make fellowship more real in our church?

**Wider Horizons**  
**CHRISTIAN** fellowship needs not only to be enriched; it needs to be enlarged. In a town or section where denominational lines run sharply across the population, there is too much cross-fire. Such a community has a hard time being a community. Many a denomination has been afflicted with the disease of pride. Loyalty to one's own denomination too easily replaces loyalty to the kingdom of God.

**Whatever be your own church connection, the time has come when the Christians outside the bounds of your church. Do you know them? Do you worship with them from time to time?** Young people in your church may be interested in a new organization which is interested in bringing together the thinking of young people in every land. Young Christians can bring to such a project the insight and the spirit of Christian Faith, and learn to know young Christians in other lands than ours. 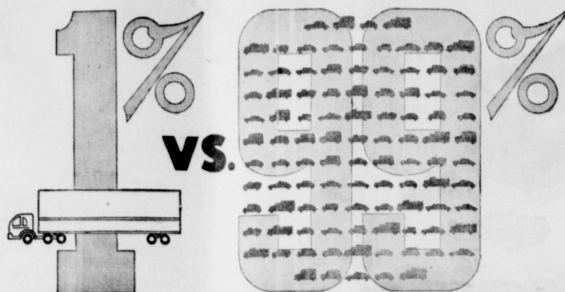

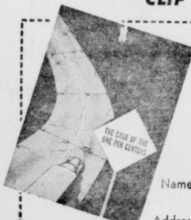

# HOUSEHOLD MEMOS... by Lynn Chambers



Let Turkey Take a Second Bow. (See Recipes Below)

### Turkey Topics

MR. GOBLER can score several triumphs after the big feast is over if he's dressed with the proper trimmings. Even the smaller turkeys which are purchased for small families have much good eating on them, and certainly the large ones do, too, even though you may have had the whole big family around the table.

As long as the bird can still be sliced, serve the succulent slices just as they come from the bird, with salad and for sandwiches. Then when you get to the smaller pieces, put them in delicious pie, creamed dishes, and casseroles.

### \*Turkey Pie (Serves 6)

- 3 tablespoons butter
  - 5 tablespoons flour
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - Few grains pepper
  - 2 1/2 cups milk
  - 1 1/2 cups diced cooked turkey
  - 1/2 cup cooked lima beans
  - 1/2 cup cooked whole kernel corn
- Cheese Pastry**  
Melt butter in saucepan, blend in flour, salt and pepper. Gradually add milk, cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add turkey, lima beans and corn; heat. Pour into 6 individual casseroles and top with cheese pastry cut in turkey shapes. Bake in a hot oven (425°) for about 12 minutes, or until pastry is lightly browned.

### Turkey Pilaf (Serves 6)

- 7 tablespoons cooking oil
- 4 mushrooms, finely sliced
- 3 tablespoons finely shredded green pepper
- 1 tablespoon tomato puree
- 1 cup light cream or top milk
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 2 tablespoons prepared mustard
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 2 cups diced cooked turkey
- 2 medium onions, sliced
- 1 cup raw rice
- 3 cups meat stock or bouillon
- 1/4 cup blanched, fried almonds

Heat three tablespoons of cooking oil in heavy pan. Add sliced mushrooms and cook over fairly high heat for two minutes. Add green pepper and tomato puree. Stir in the light cream or top milk and sour cream very slowly. Add mustard, one teaspoon salt, the pepper and mix well. Add diced cooked turkey. Heat two tablespoons of the cooking oil in a heavy skillet and brown sliced onion until crisp. Add browned onion to turkey mixture.

To prepare rice, heat one tablespoon of the oil in a heavy pan, add rice and remaining teaspoon of salt.

Cover with meat stock or bouillon and bring to boil. Cover pan with waxed paper, then lid. Bake rice in moderate oven (350°) for 25 minutes or until tender. Mound rice on a serving dish and pour hot turkey mixture over. Scatter almonds that have been fried in the remaining cooking oil, over the top.

### Cheese Pastry

- 1 cup flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 cup butter
  - 1/4 cup grated cheese
  - 2 to 3 tablespoons water
- Sift together flour and salt. Cut in butter and cheese until consistency is like coarse cornmeal. Add water, mixing lightly with fork and form into ball; chill. Roll out and cut with round or turkey shaped cutter.

### Turkey Corn Casserole (Serves 4-6)

- 2 cups cubed, cooked turkey or chicken
  - 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
  - 1 12-ounce can (1 1/2 cups) whole kernel corn
  - 1/4 cup chopped pimiento
  - 1 tablespoon chopped onion
  - 1/4 cup fat
  - 3 tablespoons enriched flour
  - 1 tablespoon salt
  - 1 cup turkey stock
  - 2 well-beaten eggs
  - Green-pepper rings
  - 1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs
  - 1/4 cup grated American cheese
- Arrange turkey, celery, corn and pimiento in greased baking dish. Cook onion in hot fat until golden. Add flour and salt; blend. Gradually add stock; cook until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Quickly stir sauce into eggs. Pour over turkey mixture. Top with green-pepper rings. Mix crumbs with cheese; sprinkle over top. Bake in moderate oven (350°) 30 minutes.

### Bones, Skin and Scraps For Rich Stock

To prepare broth, crack the bones if possible. For the cracking use a steak pounder, a mallet or a pair of pliers. If you can't crack them go ahead anyway for you'll still get a good broth. Place bones in a sauce pan. Add water to cover, 1 small onion, a carrot, a few ribs of celery, and soup herbs if you have them. Simmer 2 or 3 hours. Strain, cool promptly, then store in coldest part of refrigerator.

### Creans of Turkey Soup (Serves 4)

- 2 tablespoons butter
  - 2 tablespoons flour
  - 1 1/2 cups turkey stock
  - 1/2 cup cream or top milk
  - 1/2 to 1 cup chopped cooked turkey meat
- Chopped parsley**  
Prepare a sauce of the butter, flour and stock. Set over hot water, add stock and meat. Heat. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve very hot garnished with parsley.

### Turkey in Toast Cups (Serves 4-6)

Combine one 10 1/2-ounce can condensed cream and mushroom soup and 1/2 cup top milk; blend; heat; add 1 1/2 cups diced, cooked turkey and 1/2 cup chopped canned pimiento. Add some of hot sauce to 1 egg yolk; stir into remaining hot sauce. Heat thoroughly over low heat. Serve in toast cups.

## Solon to Regain Prizes Won by Grandpa's Horses

WASHINGTON. — Rep. Brent Spence, Fort Thomas, Ky., is going to get back the cups his grandpa's race horse won more than 100 years ago.

It is all on account of the long arm of the federal bureau of investigation and a little piece of deduction by Police Chief Louis Cook of Fort Thomas. The FBI called the congressman to tell him the good news.

Congressman and Mrs. Spence left their home on Riverside Parkway, Fort Thomas, to return to Washington. Spence figures that one Casimir Zebzenny, alias David Harding, alias David Burton, alias Casimir Zebzenny, must have read about it in the papers. Anyhow, Casimir hurried out and robbed

the Spence home. In his loot were four silver cups. They had been won by race horses, including one named Echo, owned by Spence's grandfather, James T. 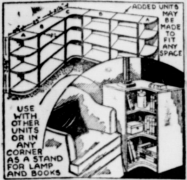

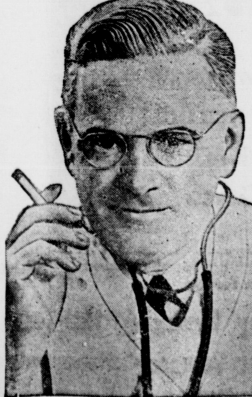
