Richards criticized for appointment

AUSTIN (AP) — George W. Bush's gubernatorial campaign is blasting Gov. Ann Richards after the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse voted to hire as head of the agency a man convicted of a felony a decade ago.

Cindy Rugeley, a spokeswoman for the Democratic governor, said the Republican candidate should be ashamed of such criticism toward Ben Bynum, whom she described as a recovering alcoholic who has rebuilt his life.

The commission voted 5-4 last week to hire Bynum, a former Potter County judge who was convicted 10 years ago of misapplying public funds.


Bynum served 10 years' probation for misusing funds that belonged to a committee promoting a bond issue to build an Amarillo courthouse. He was accused of cashing about \$2,000 in checks designated for the committee without keeping accurate records.

Four of the five Alcohol and Drug Abuse commissioners who voted to hire Bynum were appointed by Richards. Three of the four who voted against him also were appointed by Richards.

"Gov. Richards has some explaining to do," Bush campaign press secretary Deborah Burstion-Wade said Monday. "How in the world would she put a convicted felon in charge as executive director of a major state agency where he'll oversee taxpayer monies?"

Rugeley said, "Ben Bynum is a recovering alcoholic who acknowledged his problem, took steps to deal with it and got his life back in order. He is a role model for a lot of other people with drug and alcohol abuse problems."

Richards also is a recovering alcoholic.

Civil lawsuit awards King \$3.8 million in compensation

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The jury in Rodney King's civil lawsuit awarded him \$3.8 million in compensatory damages from the city of Los Angeles on Tuesday for his 1991 police beating.

The award was significantly below the \$15 million sought by King's lawyers but well above the \$800,000 the city said was a fair sum.

King was not present in the courtroom for the reading of the jury's verdict, which came on the fourth day of deliberations.

Compensatory damages are intended to pay for King's losses. Only the city was liable for compensatory damages.

A second phase of the trial will determine punitive damages.

There will be 14 defendants in the second phase. They include the officers who beat King as well as officers who stood by at the scene.

The civil trial was the third courtroom action following the March 3, 1991, beating that focused national attention on police brutality.

Streisand ticket scalpers face suit

NEW YORK (AP) - Two New Jersey ticket brokers are being sued for allegedly scalping Barbra Streisand tickets.

Attorney General G. Oliver Koppell filed suit Monday, saying the brokers charged \$325 each for two tickets worth \$125 apiece. The most the tickets could be legally resold for is \$137.50, or 10 percent of the face value, he said.

"This is gouging," Koppell said. "This is not legitimate commerce."

The lawsuit names Richard Birnbach of The Ticket Box and T-Box and William Vlasick of A&B Services and N.Y. Theatre Tickets. Calls to those outlets were answered by people who said they could only take ticket orders.

Streisand's June 26 concert at Madison Square Garden has given Koppell a headache. Streisand is going on tour for the first time in more than two decades.

"We have been overwhelmed with complaints from consumers," he said. "The public is outraged. Some of them stand on line for hours and then can't get tickets. We suspect there is massive diversion of tickets to scalpers."
