Fisher campaign wants to carry momentum into general election

In contrast, Fisher overwhelmingly took the more populated counties containing El Paso, Laredo, McAllen and Brownsville. - Three-year accreditation grant to cover mental health, drug/alcoholism treatment

#### Abstract

The Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center was granted a three-year accreditation from the Join zations. "The purpose is to meet high levels of care for dards and criteria," said Rudy Arredondo, associate professor and assistant chairman of psychiatry. "It is a very good status to have a department's program be scrutinized by an outside agency." The accreditation covers the clinic The accreditation covers the clinic's adult and child /adolescent mental health programs and holism and drug abuse treatment programs. The accreditation process includes 1,500 diffe standards that must be met and incorporated into a review. The review process includes two on-site interviews and lists strengths and weaknesses. While inspecting, representatives survey facilities and administrators and interview members of the faculty. Tech Tech qualified for accreditation after the first site visit and only received two minor weaknesses. being visited on the first time," he said Preparation for the visit began a year before the site visit, he said. The results are not final until four to six weeks after the second on-site visit. "Being accredited shows we produce a high level of care and that we have got the faculty, staff and resources to provide high quality mental health for the region," he said. the region," he said Psychiatry department Chairman Richard Weddige said he believes the Weddige said he believes the Joint Commission Ac creditation will distinguish the department by signifying a high standard of patient care, governmental agencies, third-party payers and other facilities in volved in providing health insurance coverage. The accreditation process will have to be repeated every three years with on-site evaluatio tinue being accredited, Arredondo said. ## The great American myth: Domestic Tranquility

 where they livewhere they live. President Clinton said that tion says the same thing in different words - those phrases in the preamble about the government insuring domestic tranquility and promoting the general wel fare.
But every law-abiding American, rich or poor, knows that the right to live without terror is 'so massivel violated every day that the domestic tranquillity of the nation, its general welfare and the government's ability to guarantee either are all being destroyed.
The criminals among us know it too - none better. They can get the weapons of their trade for the asking, plus a few dollars. They know that then they can kill, maim and rob with the chances against their being arrested and tried - or having to serve out thei full terms if by chance they are convicted.
Of all questions and problems facing America, I can think of none more important to answer than this. Why is American society failing so miserably to give its citizens freedom from terrorization by crime, the right upon which all others depend and which is now the primary demand of the American public?
Politicians and budgets are not the basic problems. Politicians like Clinton, Gov. Mario Cuomo, Mayo Rudolph Giuliani, Rep. Charles Schumer and others hear the anti-crime SOS sent by the public. And it is not only money - not in a country where hundreds of bilions are spent fighting crim

Millions who are convinced they are fiercely against crime wind up placing the rights and privileges of the criminal over those of the law-abiding. They do not have the sense of responsibility to re-examine their own intellectual and emotional positions.
On the right, Americans who see themselves as hard against crime still refuse to accept restrictions on buying guns for sport or self-defense They put American criminals forever in their debt.
Among liberals and radicals there are too many who make mean faces at gun lovers while doing their own best to make the trade of criminality easier for its practitioners and survival more difficult for the prey. That is what is happening in the public housing projects of Chicago - some of the most dangerous real estate in the country.
At one project, where 300 instances of gunfire were reported on one weekend in February, the tenants and management wanted to take few safety steps.
They thought it might save some lives if metal detectors were put up, residents carried a photo ID, and visitors were signed in and greeted. They thought it would be nice, in other words, if their lives were considered almost as worth saving as those of Americans who use airports, work in federal office buildings or live in houses wher

to get warrants.

Who decides how to fight crime in the projects - the people who will die under ire in the houses, or lawyers who have never lived there? Now the White House is urging the tenants to give dvance consent to sweeps Good idea; perhaps the ACLU awyers will agree. Perhaps he drug dealers will not kill tenants who sign the advance consent papers.
Of course, neither the NRA nor the ACLU wants to get law-abiding Americans killed. But after all, the Constitution does not guarantee you a metal detector, or a doorman. And certainly there is not constitutional responsibility to try to get your mouth and mind together about domestic ranquillity, or whatever they used to call it.

Three-time world champion Ayrton Senna died Sunday about four hours after crashing into a conrete wall at about 186 mph . Another high-speed driver Roland Ratzenberger.
On Friday, Rubens Barrichello's car became airborn, crashed against the barriers and flipped. The young Brazilian sustained a concussion and Sesia and called his survival a miracle. Senna, the former world champion, had been shocked by Ratzenberger's death and refused to complete qualifying Saturday. On Sunday, shortly after the Grand Prix race restarted following five laps
at slow speed behind the pace car, Senna's Williams Renault car went straight through the Tamburello turn, a spot with a history of bad accidents. "I don't know what happened to Senna," said Michael Schmacher, who won the race. "I was just behind him, he took two or three bumps and went off. I must add however that he oday, from the very first lap.
