The leaves on corn plants tell whether the crop is well fed starved. That can make a lot of
difference at the harvest. For only well fed corn can produce high quality ears. Growers should take a little time to examine those corn leaves in the field. Healthy, well fed corn is
a deep, dark green. Any other a deep, dark green. Any other
color spells trouble. It means that the corn plant is starving for one or more of the three plant nutri-
ents-nitrogen, phosphate or ents-nitrogen, phosphate or pot-
ash.
Figure 1 in the illustration swows a typical case of nitrogen hunger. The signs show first at the tip then leaves. The middle of the leaf turns yellow and dies.
