Truth About Easter

Lesson for April 9, 1950

"UP THIS WAY," writes a friend in a great city, "the hats and the bunny-rabbits have run away with Easter." The fact is, the world has stolen Easter and made something silly out of it. The world will not believe the truth about Easter, yet the world wants a holiday.

The Man from Mars, visiting our planet at Easter time, would have a hard time guessing what the festival means. Rabbits? A day off? The return of spring? Not at all, nothing of the sort. Bunnies and hats are gay; but the right word for Easter is not Gaiety, it is Glory.

God's Victory

EVEN IN churches you will not always hear the whole truth about Easter. You may hear that it is the festival of Returning Hope, or that it symbolizes new life, or that it stands for the triumph of faith over despair, or that it expresses our belief in immortality. In view of all these ideas about Easter are true, but if that is all, then we have not yet got down to the truth about Easter.

The truth about Easter is that something happened on that day that never happened before and never will happen again. Because never before had the Son of God risen in personal triumph from the grave, and never will that have to be done over again.

If it were not for that fact, Jesus might have been remembered as a long-dead Jewish teacher, a hope about Easter is that Jesus is not dead, his hopes were not mistaken, he was not defeated, his Name is above every man! He is the Christian's living Lord!

His Power in Us

THAT STRANGELY TWISTED man Kierkegaard called Christianity "God's attack on man." You could not get that idea from the New Testament.

Marvelous as it is, Christianity is God offering to man the power to rise out of our dead selves, to do for us what we could never have done for ourselves. What has this to do with Easter? Just this: That when the Apostle Paul wants to explain what the power is which God sets at our disposal, what it is like and what it will do, he tells us it is the same power with which God raised Christ from the dead. (See I Cor. 6:14 Eph. 1:19,20; 2:8; Phil. 3:10)

You see the truth about Easter is that it is the day when the Christians celebrate the most tremendous act God ever performed on this planet, or rather that day when God brought to a climax the whole mighty action of the coming and the life and death of Christ.

A Christian Is Supernatural

I'F YOU WANT OF God is to have him do something for you, then you are rather like a baby who keeps crying for someone to bring him more toys . . . but he stays a baby. If you want OF God is to have him do something with you, in you and through you, then you are like a child who really wants to grow up.

But if the Christ is the "first-born among many brethren" then here is this life those who accept him have access to the same power that wrought in him. And at the end of life we shall not be afraid, knowing that we belong to the same God who raised our Lord.

The glory of Easter is not something merely to be remembered or sung about; it is something to be experienced. The same God who conquered death "gives us victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

Aga Kahn Sees U.S. Strength as Hope for World

NEW DELHI, INDIA.—The Aga Khan raised his vast head in bed—to which he had retired with a slight cold—laid aside London and New York newspapers received by air mail and delivered an impressive half hour of opinion on the hydrogen bomb, the world political situation, begun Aly Khan (Rita Hayworth), his personal wealth and the matching of his weight in platinum in 1934 by his religious followers, which will bring in several million dollars.

The hereditary imam (leader) of the Ismaili sect of Moslems said that he tipped the scales at 225 pounds the last time he was weighed and estimated that when his body was balanced against

platinum four years from now in his jubilee ceremonies at Bombay, Karachi, and either Dar es Salaam or Nairobi, he will gain the equivalent of about a million dollars in each place.

He declared that he would contribute the entire amount to various foundations for the betterment of his people in countries where the contributions were made. His weight was matched in diamonds in 1945 on his 60th birthday anniversary.

Aga Khan, who among many other activities of his busy and colorful life has been an international statesman, sees the United States as the present world's "only hope" and he thinks

Americans should build hydrogen bombs and arm to the teeth at once lest some other nation use the superbomb first and start a war that destroys civilization.

"If the United States is suddenly submerged by a war for which it is not prepared the whole world will go down," he declared. Urging that America readopt Theodore Roosevelt's maxim, "Walk softly but carry a big stick," he added: "I beg with my small voice for what it may be worth, America be strong—have a big stick, the biggest stick of all."

The potentate said that a strong United States would "keep all other nations in order" and restore free trade.

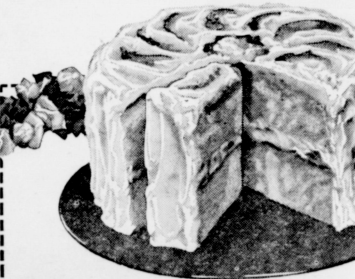
