

# Sports support does not deter anti-arena stance

I also used to play basketball. Back in my high school glory days, I had a mean three-point shot but sat the bench for most of my final year on the team. I remember the long practices, the crowded bleachers and the excitement

of victory. I particularly remember the season that my high school varsity girls' team took their game all the way to the state finals, blowing away the highly touted Houston-area competition.

Once I was accepted to Tech, I took an avid interest in the Red Raider athletic teams. Even though it was before my time here, I remember watching the Lady Raiders in the game that earned them the national championship. It was a proud moment for once and future Red Raider fans.

And since I've been a full-time Tech student, I've been to about every football game at Jones Stadium and try to make as many men's and women's basketball games as I can. Football and basketball are my favorite sports.

However, the Tech athletic programs are not the reasons why I chose this school.

I'm a sports fan, but my education comes first.

Within the past several weeks, The University Daily editorial board has heard a lot of criticism about their United Spirit Arena editorials. The first issue of the year had the editorial board (with a majority vote of 5-1) crying out for more support for Tech's academic programs. The second arena editorial (again with a majority vote of 5-1) asked the community for more student support, not athletic support.

Perhaps the real issue behind the editorials was ignored. Sure, Tech Board of Regents did approve a \$17 million renovation to the library and a demolition project involving Carpenter/Wells Residence Hall. They're also working on some kind of master plan involving the entire university. This includes tearing down the English building and renovating the art building.

Yet, these plans will not be made public until May. Students may be left in the dark until then concerning the future of this university. They need a say in determining the growth and the change of the place they call home.

After the opening hit, McGraw moved the crowd with "She Never Lets It Go to Her Heart," before getting them two stepping again with "Piece of the Pie."



### Aikman rediscovers Dallas' offense

IRVING (AP) — Cancel the burial detail. The Dallas Cowboys finally looked like Super Bowl champions again.

Troy Aikman rediscovered Dallas' lost offense by throwing three touchdown passes Sunday, and the Cowboys, stung by a bumbling loss to Chicago, celebrated their home opener with a 27-0 victory over the New York Giants.

The much-criticized first-team offense, which hadn't scored a touchdown since the exhibition season opener against Oakland, went 50, 81, and 71 yards for touchdowns to lead 21-0 at intermission.

Aikman had missed suspended wide receiver Michael Irvin and injured tight end Jay Novacek. But this was a day of few busted assignments, crisp route running, perfect passes and stout defense that kept the Giants from crossing midfield until late in the game.

### Astros lose, give up three-run ninth

HOUSTON (AP) — Dante Bichette's double highlighted a three-run ninth inning Sunday that sent the Colorado Rockies past the Houston Astros 5-2.

Ellis Burks drew a leadoff walk from Shane Reynolds (16-9) in the ninth and Xavier Hernandez relieved. Bichette doubled for a 3-2 lead, Andres Galarraga hit an RBI single and pinch-hitter Alan Cockrell had a sacrifice fly.

Steve Reed (4-3) got one out in the eighth for the victory. Bruce Ruffin pitched the ninth for his 19th save.

### Rangers slug their way past Brewers

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Bobby Witt pitched a five-hitter and Darryl Hamilton, Mickey Tettleton and Juan Gonzalez homered as the Texas Rangers defeated the Milwaukee Brewers 7-1 Sunday

# Red Raiders nab first Big 12 victory

Texas Tech tailback Byron Hanspard carried the Red Raiders to their first Big 12 victory Saturday, leading the way to a 31-3 triumph over the Oklahoma State Cowboys in Texas Stadium.

Tech (1-1, 1-1) used a school record 272 yards from Hanspard to plow through the Cowboys (1-1, 0-1) and gain an important victory.

"We didn't play well a week ago, and we lost a close game," Tech coach Spike Dykes said. "Sometimes you don't know how your team will react, but I thought the kids reacted real well."


In the first quarter, Hanspard picked up 105 yards on eight carries, helping the Red Raiders to a 40-yard field goal on their opening drive.

With 49 seconds left in the opening stanza, Hanspard broke several tackles around left end and raced untouched from midfield for a 72-yard touchdown run. The play put Tech up 10-0, and from then the rout was on.


