

if under Article 7422 (Revised Statutes) the independent school districts would have the right to collect taxes on intangible assets. "We advise you that only the State and county tax can be run on intangible assets. The article above referred to contains this





LAND OWNERS SIGNING CONTRACTS

For the benefit of those who have no confidence in the great irrigation project, and who are doing their part towards encouraging the proposition, we want to say there never was a project undertaken that equals this in size that developed and which made more rapid progress.

It has been less than a yearto be exact only since last February, since Col. Chas. M. Stanley took hold of the proposition. Today he is in the field presenting his proposition to the people and contracts are being signed, and prospect for the complection of the great task is all that could be hoped for at this early date.

The second meeting of the farmers and land owners was held at Miles last Saturday, at which time the proposition was again gone over thoroungly and much enthusiasm prevailed. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Graves, who acted as chairman and Col. Stanley in a brief statement went over his proposition and stated that everything his contract called for and stipulated was strictly in accordance with the irrigation law, and Col. Stanley called on Judge R. S. Griggs, who was a member of the irrigation committee in the last legislature, explained in detail the full meaning of the irrigation law, and endorsed Mr. tSanley's proposition. He appealed to the land owners to accept, as it was all to gain and noth ing to lose. A number of questions were asked, and Judge Griggs explained these in full.

C. A. Doose, Geo. B. Hendricks. of Miles; Chas. S. Miller, H. W. Robinson were others that made short talks, and most heartily endorsed the proposition as it had been presented. Geo. B. Hendricks in closing his talk called for a contract and in the presene of the large crowd he signed it agreeing to deed Mr. Stanley about 400 acres for placing water at his land line to irrigate and equal amount.

The proposition has been thoroughly presented to the people, and those who do not now understand it have no one to blame but themselves. However, Mr. Stanley stated that he was ready and willing at any time to meet any one where and explain the proposition to them. Several have volunteered and signed the contracts without being solicited, but others seem to be waiting to see what their neighbor is going to do. The irrigation law is such that if the water is carried by a farm, and the supply is not sufficient to later furnish the farm passed, that farmer has no recourse and must continue to cultivate a dry land farm. In other words the man that applies first for water appropriation will be the first served. This makes it very important that the man owning land close to the canal get busy and secure his appropria.
