Eastland County Dairy Association Is Chartered

The Eastland County Dairy Association is chartered under the laws of the State of Texas as this was one of the requirements in setting up an artificial breeding program, according to A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, president of the organization.

Cows within a radius of 30 miles from Carbon can be artificially bred to high type bulls by calling Harry Crow, Carbon, breeding technician for the association, Myrick said.

Contract blanks can be secured from either Myrick, Crow, L. R. Higginbottom at Kokomo or at the County Agent's office in Eastland.

The dairy association cooperates with the North Texas Artificial Breeding Farms at Dallas to make this service available to anyone in the 30 mile radius of Carbon with one or more milk cows. This distance would take in all of the county.

The total cost for the cow to be bred artificially is \$6.00 Myrick said. When the contract is signed the owner puts up \$1.00 per cow. When the cow is bred an additional \$5.00 is paid. If the cow does not conceive with the first service then two additional free services are given.

It is not absolutely necessary to have the contract prior to service as Crow can fix up the contract when he calls at the farm to perform the needed service.

Cows can be bred to either Jersey, Guernsey or Holstein bulls. Should the cow be registered the calf may also be registered, it was said. However, it is not necessary for the cow to be bred to secure the service.

Carbon School Board Calls Meeting July 28

The Carbon School Board has called a community meeting at the school auditorium for Thursday night, July 28. The purpose of the meeting is to explain the financial requirements of the local district under the Gilmer-Aikin law. Under the new law, the local district will have to contribute nearly 50 per cent more in the local funds than heretofore. The local school faces the same problem as hundreds of other schools at this time, the problem of raising more funds. Many have already voted increases in tax rates while others will vote on increases within the next few days.

The voters of the Carbon School District will go to the polls on August 2, 1949, to vote on a rate of \$1.40 on the \$100.00 valuation. The present rate is \$1.00. The action was in response to a petition presented at a recent meeting of the Board.

Can "money troubles wreck a marriage?"

Answer: When combined with other, though perhaps unconscious factors. People to whom lack of money has brought actual hardship may take out their bitterness on one another, since it's natural (if childish) to want to blame someone for your troubles. Self-Demand Infant Feeding

ONE OF THE jokes commonly current is that Mrs. Smith "must" have perfect children because she brings them up by the book. As a matter of fact this bringing up by the book has saved the lives of thousands of children, whereas, before mothers were taught proper infant feeding, about three in every 10 children died at birth or during the first year. Today only about one in 20 dies during this period.

The first great gain in extending the life span began with the change of the lives of children by proper feeding during their first and second years.

In the Canadian Medical Association Journal, Dr. C. K. Rowan-Legg, Ottawa, states what we all seem to forget is that the child has an emotional life as well as just the physical, and needs more than food to keep him healthy and happy. The feeding of infants with a definite amount of food at fixed intervals neglects the emotional side of the child's life. Modern psychiatry feels that peace and physical pleasure make a more sound foundation for a stable personality than does too early ex-

posure to strict discipline and denial.

The infant is born with three needs—satisfaction of hunger, comfort, affection. Food should be given when it needs it and not thrust upon it when it doesn't need it. "When the hunger rhythm or time arrives and the infant is given food, the amount of crying by the child is greatly reduced, which makes life easier for the mother." Your family doctor knows, as do most mothers, that infants must do a certain amount of crying to stretch and strengthen the lungs, so that if well fed and comfortable, a little crying will do no harm.

Dr. Rowan-Legg points out that some infants because of their necessary adjustments as to amount of makeup or personality, need to be fed at other than the regular four hours, and if they are hungry at three hour intervals and not at four hours, the mother should tell this to her doctor or children's specialist, who will make the necessary adjustments as to amount of food and intervals between feedings.

While infant feeding is the most important part in building a healthy infant, comfort and affection closely follow.



Cane Polers Adept

After a recent demonstration, this writer is convinced that there must be scores of cane pole bait-fishermen over the nation who could give the expert tournament casters some real competition.

Everyone knows that the tournament competitors, equipped with 3 1/2 or 4-foot rods, lightning fast, diminutive tournament reels, with no level-wind attachment, are able to hurl a one-half or three-eighths ounce tournament weight the length of a football field, or farther. Light lines also aid the caster in this performance.

But how many know that there are some cane pole fishermen who can cast a minnow and small sinker that same, or greater, distance? But to the tyro, the ability to duplicate the cane pole angler's dexterity and adroitness is singularly difficult, and it is only after a long trial-and-error method that the beginner becomes proficient—if he ever does.

There is no almost-"alive" action of the rod tip here to aid in delivering the lure. In fact, few cane rods have enough flexibility to permit the lure to put an arc in the rod at any step of the casting procedure.

Getting to the performance we witnessed, we saw a cane pole fisherman, with a minnow and small sinker attached to his line, throw more than 100 yards of line off his reel—and this from a sitting position! He did it repeatedly and seemed to think there was nothing unusual in the feat. His line tested 15 pounds and his reel was a beaten up model, with level-wind attachment, which was then more than six years old and hadn't cost more than \$6 when he bought it.

The performance was one of which any tyro fisher cast could have been proud and was of a quality to attract as amazed spectators several fly-rod users and plug casters who happened to be on the lake at the time.

How It Started

According to the legend, the story of how artificial lures came to be invented has an affinity with so many of the gadgets that enhance the pleasures of fishing—they were first envisioned by a country boy.

He was the driver of a six-mule team and was expert at handling the long bulwhip which he carried over his shoulder. One afternoon, the mules



stopped at a creek to drink and the boy noticed that trout were leaping hungrily a few yards away.

He thought, "Gosh, one would taste good for supper!" He climbed off the wagon and began cracking his whip against the surface of the water. Suddenly, a fine trout leaped and struck the red tip, or tassel, of the bulwhip.

The boy landed that fish, then stood in his tracks and by the same method managed to catch a good mess.

And that, they say, was the beginning of the rod and reel, flies and plugs.

'Stratoline' Does Job

Without a lot of technical blather involving obtuse theory and theorizing, the Cortland line company has come up with a triple-taper fly line that seems to be what the doctor ordered in the matter of easy and effective fly casting. The "Stratoline" is made in all the popular tapers, but in sensible dimensions and weight distributions which do not require a perfect fly line is supposed to do.

Cortland has managed to put the "weight forward" principle of line construction in its proper perspective and, as a result, the "Stratoline" almost "casts itself." We tested an HCF line on an 8-foot, 3 1/2-ounce H-line rod, and were delighted with the results. The quick taper of the H-line to C, the length of C-line which tapers quickly to F brought out the ultimate in rod action and ease of casting.

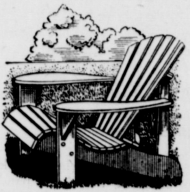

EVEN if you do nothing else with this lesson, it will be a good thing to learn by heart some of the Psalms of Trust which have been selected for your study this week.

Who Can Trust in God? (PSALM 34:16-22) Not every one has a right to trust in God. Those who do not believe in him, do not love him, work against him, try to break down and corrupt those who do believe in him.

If that word means only the perfectly and altogether good person, it would leave all of us out. But in the light of the Bible as a whole, the righteous are those whose dominant desire is to love and serve God.

His service is imperfect, their love is far from perfect, and no man is without sin. But if you can say with Peter, "Lord, thou knowest that I love thee," then you have a right to trust in God.

Why Trust God? PSALM 37 gives one answer: The opposite of trust is worry, and worry never did any good at all.

Trust is really passed on by a kind of contagion from heart to heart. If there are not more people who know what trust means, it is because those who have known have kept it too much to themselves.

When to Trust in God... One of Dickens' famous characters used to make a great point of being cheerful under the most in-cheerful circumstances.

It does mean he will give us all we need. It does not mean we shall be shielded from troubles. It does mean he will save us from troubles greater than we can bear.

Which is the greater thing—to be a weakling wearied by a straw's weight, or to be one of God's athletes, able to bear the worst of the world who can pile on?

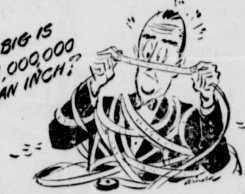
