MANAGERS APPOINTED

CANDIDATES ASSESSED;

It will cost in the neighborhood of \$800 to defray the expenses of holding the primary elections of this county, according to the figures compiled by the Democratic Executive Committee, which met Monday to make up the ticket and assess the candidates, and also appoint managers of the elections.

It will be remembered that the nominating United States senators is being contested in the courts, and if the courts knock ates to pay for, and the money left on hand will be refunded to them. The law provides for the holding of a second primary for nominating county candidates where the majority rule is adopted, on Aug. 12, while the date for holding the second senatorial primary is fixed for August 26th, and the law provides for no plans for paying the expenses of the second senatorial primary and some counties are assessing the county candidates for holding all three of the elections which to say the least of it seems to be an unfair proposition, and upon this ground it is being contested.

In fixing the assessment for county candidates, the executive

committee made the assessment upon a basis of what the office pays, and assessed each office so much, the amount to be pro rated between the candidates for that office. Thus the greater number of candidates for any one office the less expense on each candidate, and where the candidate has no opposition he is left with the entire assessment to pay. 





ADMIRAL MAYO GETS ATLANTIC FLEET

WASHINGTON, June 19 .-When Vice Admiral H. T. Mayo succeeds Admiral Frank F. Fletcher in command of the Atlantic Fleet today, he will be advanced to the rank of Admiral.

Rear Admiral De Witt Coffman, commanding the sixth division of the fleet, will be advanced to the grade of Vice Admiral, succeeding Admiral Mayo.

Admiral Fletcher will automatically become a Rear Admiral. He will receive an important shore detail.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels announced these changes after a conference with President Wilson. The Secretary also conferred personally this week with Admirals Fletcher and Mayo.

"When relieved of the com-mand today," said Secretary Daniels, "Admiral Fletcher will have served a little longer than fleet commanders usually serve-

Admiral Mayo is the man who precipitated the trouble with Huerta which resulted in the occupation of Vera Cruz by American forces. The Admiral insisted that Huerta salute the American flag because of the arrest of American marines at Tampico when they went ashore to get mail. Later marines were landed at Vera Cruz, and Admiral Fletcher was in command of that movement.

In service circles unanimous praise was given today to Mr Daniels' selection of Vice Admiral Mayo for the most coveted of posts. There is a particular feeling of satisfaction at the appointment because of the fear that Vice Admiral Mayo's part in the Tampico affair during the critical days of the struggle with Huerta had placed the officer's star under a cloud.

But Admiral Fletcher proved a strong friend for Vice Admiral Mayo, and when the Atlantic leet was organized, with Admir-Fletcher in command, Rear Admiral Mayo received command of the battleship squadron and of the first division, with the rank of vice admiral.


