"Bailey is Backed by T.L. Blanton"

The above conspicuous headlines appear on page four of The Dallas News of its last Sunday's issue. Following the headlines is the report of the News Staff Correspondent from Albany, Texas, Angust 14th, of the last speech of the Joseph Weldon Bailey campaign of two weeks in West Texas, before an audience of several thousand people, from which report the following is copied:

"It was a veritable Bailey field day with two added speakers, one being Congressman Blanton of this district. The other was District Judge W. J. Cunningham of this Judicial District, who once defeated the late A. S. Hawkins of Midland for the Senate on the Bailey issue."

"Congressman Blanton, (introducing Bailey) said it was a pleasure to accept the committee's invitation to introduce Mr. Bailey, but also it was a duty to his State and his Nation to introduce a man who stands like Mr. Bailey on the great issue confronting the State and Nation. A menace more dangerous than the German kaiser was. The time has come when the people of this State and Nation must decide whether the American Federation of Labor is paramount to the flag and to the Nation. Do not minimize the Nation. Do not minimize that issue. I have differed with Mr. Bailey on National Prohibition and Suffrage, but thank God, those issues have been decided and are behind us, becoming the fundamental law of the land, and the Governor at Austin can not change them. But what are you going to do with the great fundamental question whether this government shall be run by and for the 110,000,000 people of the Nation or by the 5,000,000 of organized labor? Bailey stands four square on the labor issue, and the longshoremen's strike at Galveston is an example of union demoralization where a handfull of men were able to tie up your port as tight as beeswax and sealed up your cotton until it went to \$50.00 per bale.

Blanton complimented Mr. Bailey's Congressional Record and introduced him."

The above report of Blanton's speech is quoted from the Dallas News, which is a bitter anti-Bailey paper. It will be remembered that Blanton was recently re-elected to Congress in this district by a majority more than two to one and carried Runnels County by five to one, on the above mentioned issue, which is the most vital issue with which our State and Nation has ever been confronted.
