## REPUBLICANS ARE ELECTED

DAYTON, Ohio, Nov. 2.—At eleven-thirty, Gov. Cox wrote a telegram from his office in the Dayton News building, where he received the election returns, wiring Senator Harding his congratulations.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—At midnight The New York Times conceded the election of Senator Harding.

DAYTON, Ohio, Nov. 3.—The Dayton Daily News, owned by Governor James M. Cox, Democratic presidential candidate, at ten-fifteen o'clock tonight, went to press with an extra edition, conceding the election of Senator Warren G. Harding, the Republican nominee.

Gov. Cox was in the office of the Daily News and received the election returns as they came in from over the nation. He had issued no statement up to this time, but knew that his paper was conceding the election of Harding.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Chairman White, of the National Democratic Committee, at eleven o'clock, last night conceded the election of Mr. Harding.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 3.—The Globe-Democrat, a Republican paper, issued an extra at eleven o'clock, announcing the election of Harding. The Globe-Democrat says that the returns indicate a big Republican victory in Missouri, and claimed that Harding will carry St. Louis by 50,000 plurality.

## MOVE MADE TO CUT ACREAGE

As a result of the meeting of the bankers of Texas, which was held in Dallas last week, the bankers in the various counties over the state are calling a meeting of farmers to meet with them and take steps looking to the reduction of the cotton acreage next year.

The Runnels county banks have called a meeting for Runnels county next Tuesday afternoon at five o'clock, at which time the farmers are being urged to meet and enter into a pledge to reduce their acreage in cotton at least one-third next year.

The meeting has been called for this date and for this hour for the convenience of the farmers and bankers, it being expected that many farmers will be in town on election day and others will come and remain over to get the election returns.

Pledge forms have been printed.

ed and the farmers will be asked to sign same, entering into a binding agreement to reduce the cotton acreage.

By this plan the tendency will not only be to create a better market for next year's crop, but will have the effect of stimulating the buying of the present crop, according to a statement made by a local banker. If the cotton world can be made to see that there will be a reduction in production next year, the present crop will be in demand, and the farmers will be able to get out from under what is now bankrupt prices.

## MRS. COCHRAN'S FATHER TALKS

BRADSHAW, Tex., Oct. 30.—"Cochran was hiding around from the time of his supposed death on March 10, 1919, until he located at Sterling City about the first of February, 1920," according to a statement made by Sam B. Hancock, who lives on a farm, 5 miles west of Bradshaw, father of Mrs. B. J. Cochran, (deceased). "I knew he wasn't dead all the time. I couldn't help but know it, with him in the family. But I don't think it was any of my business to run and tell it," stated Mr. Hancock.

Mr. Hancock left here Wednesday afternoon for Aspermont, Texas, where he will testify before the grand jury in connection with the B. J. Cochran "empty grave mystery case."

Mr. Hancock said that he was 63 years old and has a wife and one son, his two daughters having died last year, one of whom was Mrs. Byrd J. Cochran.

"Cochran and Ethel were married in 1912, in Washburn county, Texas," stated Mr. Hancock. "They stayed there I believe until 1917. Then he bought a farm in Stonewall county, and soon after moved to New Mexico, where he purchased a 160-acre farm. He sold his New Mexican farm, I reckon in 1918. I think he moved back to Stonewall county in the latter part of 1918. I was living on his farm at the time. I left there in October of the same year and came down here, where I am renting a farm."

"I knew very little of Cochran after he moved back to Stonewall county from New Mexico. My wife and I were present at the time Ethel died in the Kellogg Sanitarium at Sterling City. I offered to take the five children and rear them when their mother died, but Cochran refused to let me have them.

"He said his wife's wishes were for him to keep the children."

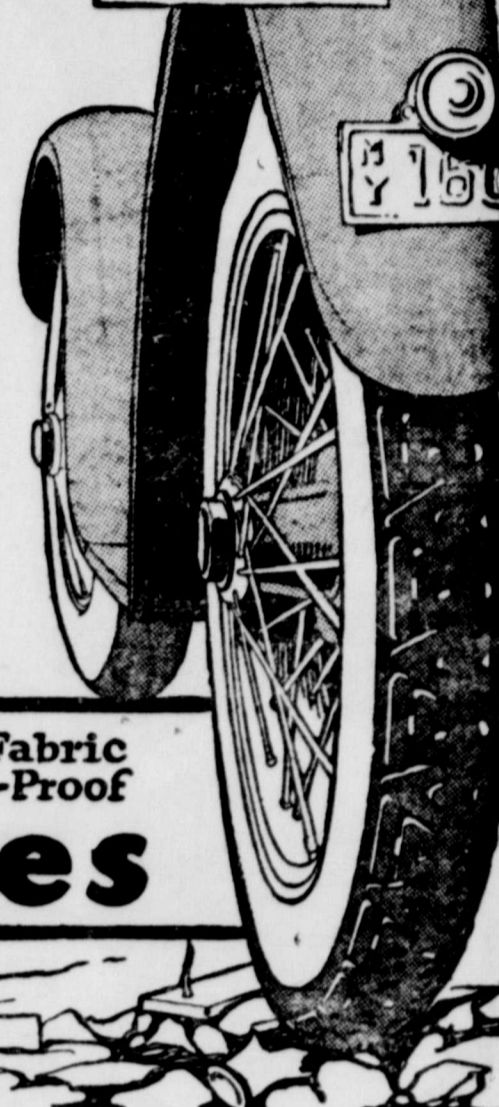

REMAINS SHIPPED NEGRO IN AUTO TO BARTLETT CAUSES CRASH

The remains of Chas. Lindemann will be brought to Ballinger this morning and this afternoon will be shipped to Bartlett for burial. The remains will be accompanied by Hermann and Ed Lindemann, sons of the deceased.

Mr. Lindemann died at his home ten miles East of Ballinger Monday morning at eleven o'clock. He had reached the ripe old age of about seventy-five years and his death was due to a general breakdown.

A Ford roadster, driven by a negro, and a Studebaker car, driven by Herman Spill, son of August Spill of Winters, crashed together at the intersection of Eighth Street and Hutchings Avenue Thursday morning, resulting in considerable damage to both cars.

The accident was caused by the negro driving on the wrong side of the street. He was going South and traveling on the left hand side of the street, while the big car was coming North on the right hand side. The two cars met at the intersection of the street just as the negro was trying to turn, and the Ford smashed into the side of the Studebaker with sufficient force to cave in the fender, break the spring, bend the axle and smash

the radiator. The Ford radiator was smashed and the Ford otherwise was damaged. A traffic officer appeared on the scene and carried the negro before the court to answer for "crooked" driving, and in the meantime Mr. Spill began to figure who was going to pay the damage on his car.

FARMER SAVES DAMAGED COTTON

Max Zieschang was in the city Tuesday and told a Ledger man how he had saved his bad grade cotton and made good grade out of it, and he is doing the same thing this year.

Mr. Zieschang's statement is verified by others who have tried the plan and vouch for its value, and those who have tested the plan say that all farmers should profit by adopting this method of picking their storm damaged cotton.

"I discovered this thirty-one years ago," said Mr. Zieschang, "and it has saved me a great deal in the past years. Thirty-one years ago we had just about such a storm as visited this country last Saturday night a week ago. I picked my cotton, which was badly damaged by the storm, and stored it away in a house. To my surprise when the cotton was ginned, it made a good sample, and classed out what our buyers now call a No. 2 grade."

Mr. Zieschang says that he picked the cotton from the stalks, picked it off the ground at the same time and piled all the cotton in a dry room. It went through a sweating process and turned out a pretty grade, while neighbors who picked their cotton and carried it direct from the field to the gin got a low grade, and lost about \$20 per bale.

Mr. Zieschang says that he will vouch for a saving of at least enough to pay for the picking, if the farmers will store their cotton and wait or some time before taking it to the gin.

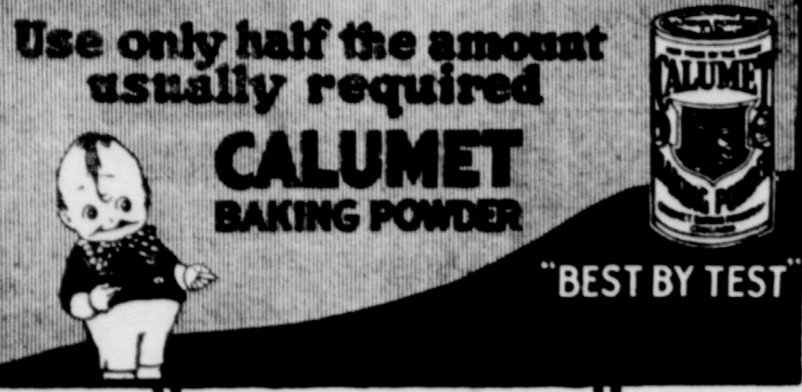

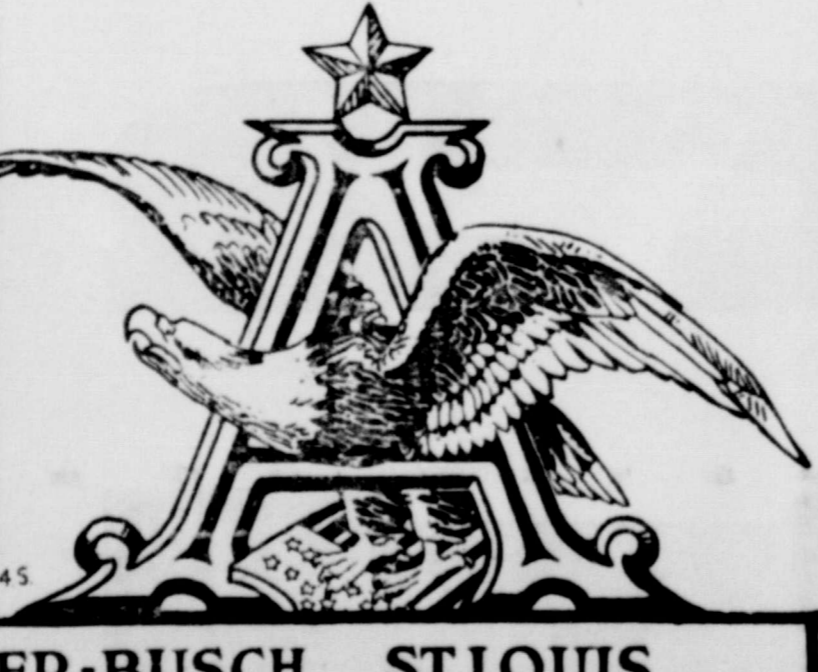

ALABAMA HAS NEGRO TROUBLE

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 1.—Two negroes are dead, the homes of two white farmers, four negro cabins, two gins, ten bales of cotton, much cotton seed, one saw mill, one grist mill, a large quantity of corn, and several barns were destroyed by fire as the result of an outbreak of "night riders" in the "black belt" of Alabama Saturday night. The county grand jury was summoned to meet today to investigate the disorder. Negroes variously estimated to number from twenty to fifty, most of whom were mounted on horses, are alleged to have applied the torch simultaneously to the property of white farmers in the lower part of Montgomery county.

Contrary to the recent customs in other sections of the state, no warning had been given and the black fire fiends caught the country by surprise, and the country became panic stricken when automobiles bearing the sheriff and other officers approached the neighborhood where the fires were raging and were fired upon from the roadside.

The officers and occupants of the automobile leaped from the car to the roadside and shielded by the car, they escaped injury from the assassins' bullets. The officers returned the fire, killing two negroes and putting the others to flight.

Dr. Mitchell, of Norton, was here Wednesday to assist in making an examination of the wounds of Chas. Allen, who was killed by a tenant farmer, Tuesday afternoon. Dr. Mitchell was called to the Allen farm to see the man and was later in Ballinger for further investigation.

1 DEAD 2 MISSING IN HOTEL BLAZE

FORT WORTH, Nov. 1.—The McClain Hotel at Seymour, Texas, burned early this morning. One man was burned to death in the building and two others are missing who may have lost their lives. The building was a total loss.

The man who perished in the flames was H. G. Whiteside, a real estate man of Seymour. Many others had narrow escapes, leaving the burning building in their night clothes.

The fire started in the Majestic Cafe from the explosion of a coffee urn under which a gas flame was burning. The blaze spread quickly, enveloping the entire structure, which was three stories high and built of rock. The building was soon swept clean by the flames.

FORT WORTH, Nov. 2.—The death list in the burning of the hotel at Seymour Sunday night may be increased to two, with the announcement today that A. L. Ballentine, a traveling man from Houston, was missing. The body of G. H. Whiteside, a local real estate man, is believed to be in the ruins of the building.

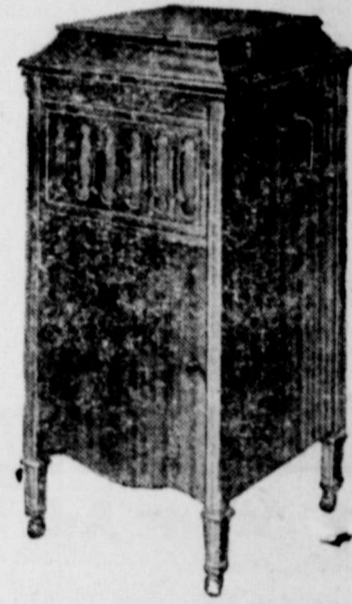
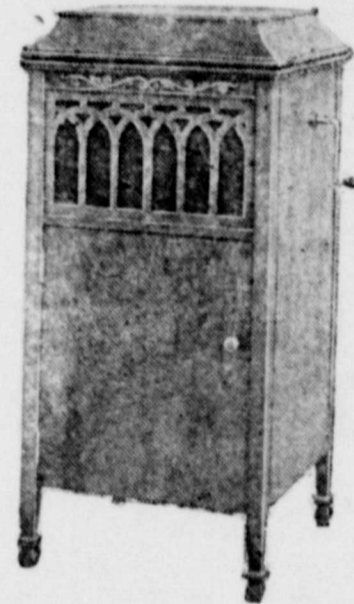

## Many Friends Gather to Honor Judge Jno. I. Guion

Judge John I. Guion was laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery Thursday afternoon, following funeral services held at the First Presbyterian church at three-thirty-five, conducted by Rev. C. L. Ewing, of Brownwood. Rev. Ewing was pastor of the deceased serving the local church for a number of years thirty years ago. The funeral was held in the church where Judge Guion had worshipped from Sunday to Sunday for more than thirty years, and was marked with simplicity. At his request there were no floral offerings.

Judge Guion died at three o'clock Wednesday afternoon. He was 68 years, 9 months and 23 days old, having been born on January 4, 1852. He is survived by a wife and eight children: John Jr., David, Wade, Misses Neil and Kate, and Mrs. D. C. McCaleb, of Wichita Falls; Mrs. Leon Ward, of Austin; and Mrs. Edward Giesecke, of this city; and a large circle of relatives. All the children were here to attend the funeral except Mrs. Ward, who is ill and could not come.

Judge Guion was a native of Mississippi, having been born in the executive mansion of that state while his father was governor of Mississippi, sixty-eight years ago.

He completed his education at Lebanon Law College after the close of the Civil War and was a school mate of Judge Horace Lorton, a member of the United States Supreme Court, and whose education was interrupted by the war between the states.

Judge Guion moved to Texas in the early seventies and first settled in San Saba county. Before he was twenty-five years of age he was elected county judge of that county and on account of his strong stand for law and order, and in dealing with the public in such matters as a taste against office holding was created which prevented him from ever consenting to become a candidate for any office again, although he was petitioned to offer for his state office and was solicited to run for congress.

After living in San Saba county for a number of years, Judge Guion moved to Dallas. He was not satisfied with conditions in that city and he again responded to the call of the West and located in Conejo county, then many miles from the railroad. When the Santa Fe extended its line West from Brownwood to San Angelo, Judge Guion moved to Ballinger, and helped to build this city and devoted thirty-four years of his life to practicing law here and in doing his part toward developing the country.

While always choosing the private life, Judge Guion has always been a leader in the progressive movements for the material benefit of his country. In politics he was a loyal Democrat, always found fighting for the principles he believed to be in keeping with his party, and remained true to party ticket even after losing in the primary conventions of his party. In religion he was a life long Southern Presbyterian, and for more than thirty years was an elder in his church. He was a charter member of the First

Presbyterian church of this city. Judge Guion was born of true blue Southern American ancestors. His grandfather, Major Guion of the United States Army, was detailed as military commander of the territory of Mississippi by President Jefferson. His father was Governor of the state of Mississippi, and was afterwards Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals of that commonwealth. Sergeant Prentiss, the brilliant Mississippi orator, was a law partner of Governor Guion, the law firm of Guion & Prentiss, the senior member being Judge Guion's father, was one of the strongest that existed in the South during early reconstruction days.

During the Colquitt administration Judge Guion was appointed as member of the Board of Regents of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College. Two years later he was made president of the board, and for four years he was at the head of the greatest agricultural and mechanical college in the South.

Judge Guion had his enemies, for no man could take the determined stand for the principles he conceived to be right and fight for them as Judge Guion did without creating the enmity of someone. Yet he was charitable to all, and no man ever lived in this city who will be missed more from among his friends and daily associates than Judge Guion.

The Sheriff went on to say that the probabilities are he would have followed different plans, in regard to unraveling the mystery, had it not been for the public clamor that the woman in the case should be arrested and held. This was the very thing that should not have been done, he thinks.

"You made a mistake when you placed me under arrest," Myrtle Scott told Sheriff Pugh, a day or so ago.

"Why so?" was the reply of the sheriff.

"Simply because if I had not been arrested and had gone back to Oklahoma City, it is highly probable that the man you want would have made an effort to communicate with me, in course of time."

"That was my plan, precisely," answered the sheriff, "but sometimes public opinion brings pressure to bear in such way, that officials often have to change
