



FT. WORTH, April 25 .- At two o'clock this afternoon the death list as the result of last night's storm had reached eleven, and at least 1,500 people are hom eless Property damage on first

inches of rain fell in twenty-four hours. Public utilities are endangered and the city is threatened to be in darkness tonight, with street car service practically at a standstill and interurban traffic compeltely suspended.

FT. WORTH, April 25 .- The death list in Fort Worth as a result of floods caused by heavy rains last night, was increased to seven at 11:00 o'clock this morning, when a boat loaded with men women and children, capsized. The boat load of people had been rescued from the top of a house in the flooded district and was being brought to safety when the boat turned over in the strong


