SHOPMEN FORM PLANS TO SETTLE RAIL STRIKE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Virtual settlement of the rail strike as affecting from thirty-five to forty per cent of the railroads of the county was announced late to day by Secretary of Labor Davis.

Mr. Davis made the announce ment on the basis of reports received from the meeting in Chicago of the general policy commit-tee of the striking shops crafts u nions. He said that he had been informed that the settlement covered the Seaboard Air Line, the Southern, Baltimore & Ohio, Chicago & Northwestern, Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, and others including the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific which it was said would sign the agreement.

The terms of the settlement were not given out in the first report received here late this afternoon.

CHICAGO, Sept. 13. - Peace proposals for a settlement or a partial settlement of the railway shopmen's strike were technically accepted today by the unions' general policy committee, providing that the roads meet certain conditions, it was learned today from the head of one of the striking unions.



fire bazard. According to the supervisor of the 'alifornia, steel horseshoes used in flinty mountain regions may have been the cause of some of the mysterious fires that have started in the forest reserves. Heavy steel horseshoes striking against flint or hard granite may readily be the source of sparks, which, falling into dry grass or othe inflammable material, would quick! cause it to burst into flames if fanned by a breeze.

The new horseshoes were given their first try-out recently in Cala veras county, Culifornia. - Popular Mechanics.

Moth-Proof Wool.

A moth-repellant has been introduced in the German market, which, i is claimed, will positively make the wool fabric absolutely moth-proof. Atadditional advantage of this product. known as Eulan F. is that it does not liscolor the fabric, so that the woo an be dyed in bright shades without any difficulty. The product is a white powder which does not dissolve very easily in water. Acid must be added o make it dissolve. In this condition it is used in the textile mill, and it is preferable to put the woolen fabric through the moth-proofing treatment in the factory. Another form of the product is sold for use in the house hold. In this form the powder will dissolve very easily in water. The woolen fabric is then soaked in the solution and permitted to dry. Only a I per cent solution is required. Eulan is now on the market in Germany .-From the Industrial Digest.



CHINESE NOW CLAIM HONOR

Buddhist Priests Said to Have Discom ered America Long Before Day of Columbus.

He also describes a plant and its fruit which is the species of cactus commonly known as the prickly pear. From the Chinese records, therefore, Fusang was very like Mexico.



COLD DRINKS ON HOT DAYS

Bellef That They Were Highly Dangerous is Not as Generally Held as Formerly.

Medical men have their folklore, as have the people at targe. Mistaken ideas, sanctioned by time, die hard, even among so-called men of science. In the differentiation of diseases and the sorting of causes and effects it is Wittle wonder that there should have arisen confusion of ideas that to a

degree still persist. There is a general belief that it is highly dangerous to drink cold water the support of the work. in warm weather when we are very warm, and in a much recommended book on dietetics of the present century the warning against this practice is down in black and white.

If we trace this teaching to its origin, we find that the fatalities that occurred from this practice always happened when the temperature of the air was 85 degrees or upward. The symptoms described are those of sunstroke or heat exhaustion, and the clinicians of the day had confused, or rather not yet differentiated, the effects of heat suppression and the very different experience of giving the interior of the stomach a cold bath.

So strong was the belief that the taking of a cold drink, and not the inability to get rid of heat, was the cause of those pathological catastrophes of hot weather that in one of our largest cities a century since the humane society placed printed posters on the public pumps, warning the hot and thirsty to pause before imbibling and hold the cup in the hands until some of the dangerous cold was extracted from the water. Very different from what a humane society might be doing in this day.-New York Medical Journal.

BASS ALWAYS A WANDERER

Fish Has No Special Abode, but Seeks Places Where Food Is the Most Pientiful.

The bass, both large and smallmouthed, is a roamer. He is always looking for the place where the most food is, and is fond of variety. You tan fish for him night or day, as he is a 24-hour feeder, but early morning and late afternoon are the surest times to get him right.







MIGRATORY BIRD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. How far will a migratory bird travel in its fall and spring flights? The Biological Survey of the U. S. Government has determined that they make flights of at least 3,000 miles.

An investigation has been conducted for several years by the Survey by trapping ducks and other strong winged fowl in Northern sections, and marking them with light bands bearing a serial number and the legend, Biol. Surv. Wash., D. C numbers on the fowl are recorded and from time to time hunters agging some of those marked, report where and when the bird

More than two hundred such birds were loosed with the bands from Lake Seugog, in Ontario, about 20 miles North of Toronto, and many reports have been received. So far, the record flight is that of a blue-winged teel, killed two months and seven days later in a swamp near Port of Spain, on the Island of Trinidad. The shortest possible flight the bird could have taken to reach this point, which is off the coast of Venezuela, is 3,000 miles.

It, except in the case of the rifles specially designed for bison shooting and ON YOU NEXT TIME called "buffalo guns," never was termed "gun," that word, save for the single exception noted, being consecrated to the pistol.

"Scatter-guns," otherwise shotguns, were occasionally produced by tenderfoots; but they, unless with "sawedoff" barrels, loaded with nails or buckshot, and to the hands of express messengers, served for the westerner only
