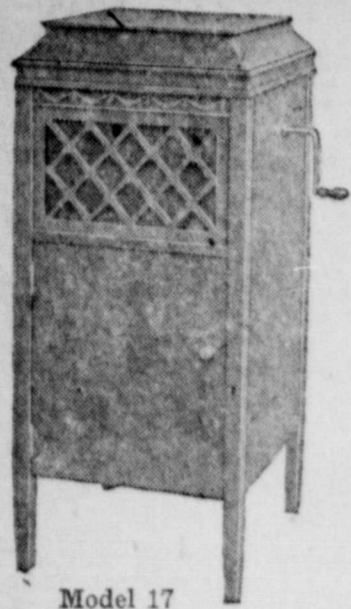

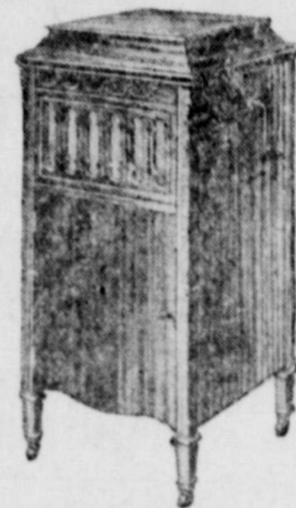

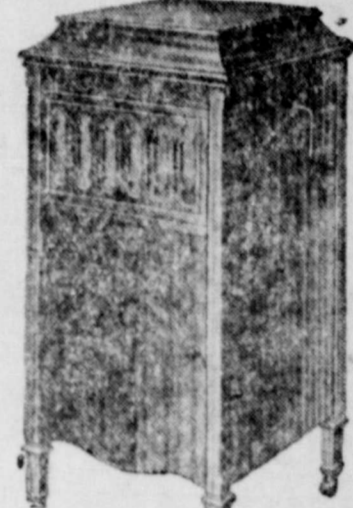

Free for All Foot Race Follows Jail Delivery

Jack Cregg, self confessed auto thief, and a negro prisoner held here for Concho county on a charge of burglary, broke jail here Thursday morning by running rough shod over M. C. Falls, janitor at the court house. The two prisoners were seen recaptured and are now locked in a cell, where it will not be so easy for them to escape.

Mr. Falls went to the jail to get a Mexican, who is working out a fine by helping on the court house lawn and doing work around the court house and jail. The Mexican is confined in jail at night and brought out to work every day. When Mr. Falls unlocked the jail door the white man and the negro grabbed him and pushing him down and to one side, they made a break for liberty.

The prisoners had been given the privilege of occupying the run-around during the day, as they were not considered to be unusual criminals, and Mr. Falls was taken by surprise, and was not armed. He gave the alarm and followed in close chase after the two prisoners, and quite a number of men were soon following.

Dr. F. M. Hale, J. A. Weeks and R. W. Earnshaw made the best time in Mr. Weeks' Cadillac roadster, and overtook the white man near the Elm Creek bridge. The man had just stood off two other men by making fight on

them with rocks, and he made fight on "Ernie," who was the first man to catch him, but Mr. Weeks was soon on the scene and with a gun persuaded the prisoner to be "good."

Leaving the white man with Dr. Hale, Mr. Earnshaw and Mr. Weeks continued the chase after the negro and overtook him near the Abilene & Southern bridge, and the negro had just about run out of "air," and accepted an invitation to return to town with the posse.

In his calls for help and in giving the alarm, Mr. Falls attracted the natives in the neighborhood of the jail, and blocked all possible escape for the fugitives from justice. The parties in the Cadillac car were on close trail of the negro when he left the road and took to the brush, and Earnshaw has run too many bases to be outdistanced by a negro, and he soon overtook the prisoner and persuaded him to have a seat and rest awhile. The negro gave up and returned to jail without offering any resistance. Stating that he had not "done nothing" to his pursuers, the white man armed himself with rocks and was in the act of making fight when a gun pushed into his flanks by Mr. Weeks caused him to surrender.

Cregg, the white man, is charged with stealing Joe Spoons' Ford here during the county fair in September. He was captured

near Alpine and the car recovered. After being brought to Ballinger he made a written confession, and is now being held here to await the action of the grand jury. The negro broke into a house at Paint Rock, and as Concho county has no jail he was brought here for safe keeping.

You are hereby further notified that the said Henry Psenick is to construct a dam of rock, four feet in height, 150 feet in length, thus creating a reservoir having an average width of 150 feet, length of impounded water 6,000 feet, an average depth of stored water three feet, and having a storage capacity of 62 acre-feet, and to impound therein and divert therefrom sufficient water for the irrigation of 53 acres of land described in the application.

He returned to Coleman Thursday night from Foard county, where he went to visit his brother, arriving on a late train about 11:30. He went to the home of Mrs. Peck, where he expected to retire in the room with Mrs. Peck's son.

However, since the young man had left Coleman, Mrs. Peck had rented the room to a Mr. and Mrs. Fred Slaughter. Going to the Peck home young Copeland placed his suit case on the porch and finding the screen latched, went to the window to arouse the Peck boy. Rattling the window he failed to get a response. Mr. Slaughter stated that he called to know who was at the window, but it is presumed that the Copeland boy did not hear him. Young Copeland filled his pipe with tobacco and was in the act of striking a match on the window screen when Slaughter fired. 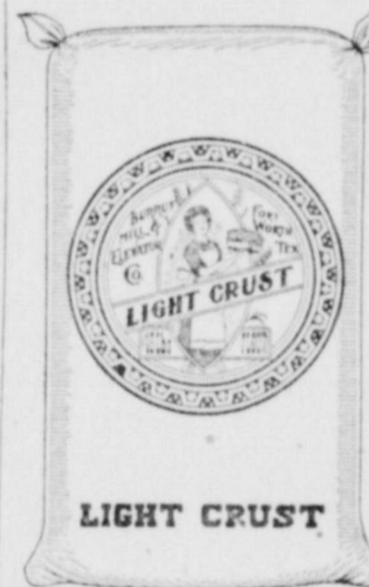

STILL FOUND IN CITY; 1 ARRESTED

Sheriff Flynt and Chief of Police Pilcher raided a residence in the Western part of the city Thursday just before noon and captured a genuine booze making outfit, together with a quantity of liquor and arrested a man by the name of Ray, or Gray.

The still was discovered in what is known as the old Hays place on Ninth Street and near the West Ward school house. The officers were put wise by the existence of such a moonshine plant when Ray, or Gray, approached Mr. Pilcher and offered him a drink of rye liquor just before noon Thursday. The man was drinking and he disclosed the location of the still.

The officers seized a still which was estimated to have a twenty gallon capacity, the equipment consisting of a zinc tub with new copper coils attached, boiler, etc., and nearby was ten or fifteen gallons of "mash" going through the process necessary to put the kick in the liquid. The officers also captured a quantity of the finished product, in addition to what the man had on his person when arrested.

The man first gave his name as Ray, but after being placed in jail he later said that his name was Gray, and that he had been in Ballinger about three months.

It is not known how long the booze maker had been operating here, but parties have been under suspicion of producing intoxicating liquor in or near the city for some time. Imbibing of his own goods caused the man to fall in the hands of the officers Thursday.

NEGRO TRKES BIG ROLL FROM BANK

Richard Green Jr., a young negro old enough to do time in the state prison, is in the Ballinger jail charged with "swiping" a roll of currency containing \$2,070.00 from the cash counter of the First National Bank. The roll of green backs was resurrected from the sand banks of the Colorado River shortly after dark Monday night, where it had remained buried since Sunday night.

Richard Green Sr., father of the young negro, is janitor for the First National Bank, and has been a trusted employe of that institution for a number of years, but the finger of suspicion was pointed at the elder negro Monday when the money came up missing, and Richard Senior was placed behind bars pending an investigation. He was released Monday night after his son had led the officers to where the roll of bills was buried, and after the younger negro had declared that his father was not implicated in the theft.

Theft of the money was made easy for the negro thru the fact that J. Whit Patterson, assistant cashier and teller of the First National, overlooked the roll of currency Saturday afternoon when he went to return the cash to the vault at the close of the day's business. When Mr. Patterson brought the cash tray out Saturday morning, he laid aside the roll of currency, and did not have occasion to use it during the day, and overlooked it when he went to return the cash to the vault. The currency consisted of fifty and one hundred dollar bills, and about seventy dollars in "rags." The package of money was bound together with a rubber band between two pieces of cardboard.

The elder Green reported to Cashier Erwin that he saw the money on the counter after the bank had been closed, but neglected to report it, and did not report it until after the money disappeared.

All suspicion in the case pointed towards the two negroes, and the officers began pushing the case until the younger negro was "sweated" into a confession and carried Sheriff Flynt to where the money was buried.

RUNNELS HOLDS LEAD IN COTTON

The ginners' report announced by the Census Bureau, showing the number of bales of cotton ginned in the respective counties up to October 25th, places Runnels county in the lead in this section of the state, and also shows a marked increase over the 1921 ginnings for the same date. Here are the figures for Runnels and her neighboring counties:

The above figures represent ginnings up to Oct. 25th. Since that date considerable cotton has been ginned and the Runnels county figures are crawling up towards

the 40,000 mark. Williamson, Hill, Navarro and Collin counties led the state with 74,086, 64,454, 61,962 and 59,876 bales in the order named.

The total ginnings in the United States for the present season was announced Wednesday morning, the report showing the number of bales ginned up to Nov. 1, at 8,139,839 as compared with 6,646,354 for the same date last year.

The crop condition was reported at fifty per cent as compared with 42.2 per cent at last report.

Total production for the year is estimated at 10,135,000 bales against the total crop of 6,535,000 bales last year.

The government report had a bullish effect on the market, the price advancing fifty points during the morning trading.

BRYAN—Bell county may become the center for a system of impounding dams for flood

waters if the Brazos Valley flood reclamation project succeeds, according to A. D. Jackson, secretary of the Brazos River Reclamation Association. It is said the loss to Bell County in floods within the last year was over a million dollars.

MAYFIELD LEADING BY OVER 150,000

DALLAS, Nov. 8.—Earle B. Mayfield's majority over George Peddy, republican candidate for the United States senate, will be more than 150,000, according to incomplete returns from Tuesday's election, and which brought one of the most bitterly contested political disputes in the history of Texas to a close.

The result of the election makes Mr. Mayfield, who is forty-one years old, one of the youngest members in the United States senate, and comes following a multitude of court proceedings which were cleared up just the day before the election when the supreme court ruled that his name should go on the ballots.

DALLAS, Nov. 8.—Notwithstanding the overwhelming majority given Earle Mayfield for United States senator yesterday, efforts will be made to keep him from taking his seat in the senate, according to State Republican Chairman R. B. Creager today. Mr. Creager said that the republicans will not permit him to be seated, and indicated that further fights in the state courts will be made in which the charges that Mayfield's campaign expenditures exceeded the legal limit will be renewed.

AUSTIN, Nov. 8.—Application for a writ of error from the decision of the Dallas Court of Civil Appeals in the Groesbeck injunction suit, which sought to keep Earle B. Mayfield's name off the ballot, was received by the state Supreme Court here today. The Supreme Court immediately took the application under advisement.

Out of 24 voting precincts in Runnels county, 21 had reported up to noon Wednesday; Truitt, Antelope, Tokeen, all small boxes, having not been heard from.

Mayfield will have a majority of about 350 over Peddy in this county when the official count is made. The 21 boxes reporting gives Mayfield 1155 and Peddy 823.

Rowena and Offen polled practically a solid republican vote, Mayfield receiving only four votes out of 249 at Rowena, and out of 76 votes at Offen Mayfield drew a goose egg.

Taylor county was running better than four to one for the democratic nominee.

Tench, where Peddy formerly lived, gave Mayfield 233, Peddy 134.

Peddy carried Kleberg, Gillespie, Fayette, and probably one or two other counties in the state, according to incomplete returns. The first returns from Kleberg

dates were running ahead in California, Connecticut, Delaware, Ohio, and Wyoming, while the democratic senatorial candidates were leading in Indiana, Michigan, Missouri, North Dakota, and Montana.

Republican senators were re-elected in Pennsylvania, Iowa, Nebraska, and Wisconsin, and democrats won in the senatorial races in New York, Maryland, Rhode Island, Texas and West Virginia.

Victor Berger, socialist, was re-elected congressman in Wisconsin.

Associated Press figures on the congressional vote tabulated this morning showed the democrats to have elected 178 and the republicans 171.

None of the men in the flogging party were masked, and it is said that the brother of the girl handled the heavy work unaided, the other men making up the party serving only as spectators—and just to see the thing well done.

331 BOOTLEGGERS CAUGHT IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, Nov. 6.—During the month of October, 331 persons were arrested by federal prohibition officers and 7,592 gallons of liquor captured in Texas, according to the October summary of activities issued by David H. Morris, federal prohibition director for Texas. Eighteen automobiles also were captured in liquor raids; 1,150 pounds of sugar; 360 pounds of corn chops and meal; and 900 pounds of malt and hops that were being used for making liquor, the report states. A summary of the federal director's reports follows:

"Federal prohibition officers during October seized in Texas 52 illicit stills and 27 illicit still worms, 303 gallons of 'moonshine' whiskey, 728 gallons of chow beer, 790 gallons of grape wine, 5,771 gallons of corn meal mash, and 173 fifty-gallon barrels used for fermenting mash in making whiskey. All of this was destroyed by chopping to pieces and burning and wasting on the grounds except a small quantity to be used as evidence in conviction of violators.

"The total appraised commercial value of property seized and not destroyed was \$4,238. The appraised commercial value of property seized and destroyed was \$745. The amount of assessable liabilities recommended by this department for collection through the federal prohibition commissioner was \$320,331.76. We now hold in storage in Houston, a German tanker for violation of the federal prohibition act, and the same will be held until a satisfactory bond is made for the release of the ship or the federal court orders the release of the same.

"Reports from district state courts for the past 30 days indicate that the attitude of the juries in the state courts are awakening to the fact that it will be necessary for them to return verdicts of guilty, in order to effectively enforce the prohibition laws, and in many instances, there have been numbers of convictions obtained in the judicial districts of our state during the past month, and the violators have been sentenced to the state penitentiary for terms of from one to four years. In the federal courts, numbers of violators have received heavy fines and jail sentences for their second offense."

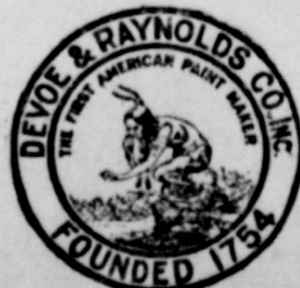

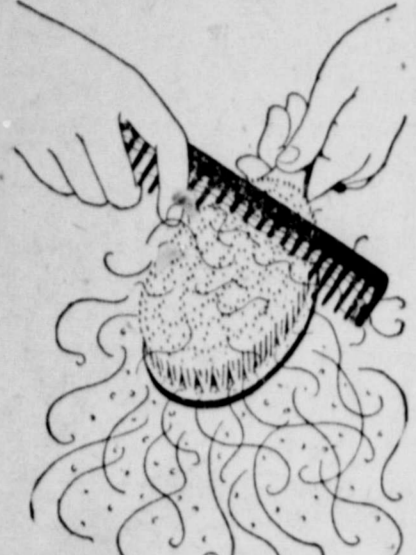

MENNONITES ON WAY TO MEXICO

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 7.—A special train of 31 cars, carrying 125 Mennonites and their livestock and household goods, passed thru this city over the Orient this morning from Manitoba, Canada, en route to Mexico, where they will locate. The special train consisted of 27 cars of livestock and household goods, implements, etc., two Pullmans and a chair car. The train stopped here about thirty minutes.

The Mennonites have purchased 350,000 acres of land out of the Bustious ranch West of Chihuahua City, and will build a complete colony. It is expected that 200,000 of these people will migrate to the Southern republic within the next two years. The Mennonites came to North America from the Netherlands and located in Canada. They claim the Canadian government broke faith with them relative to agreements that they should have their own settlements, churches, schools etc., and that they would be exempt from military service. They are now leaving Canada and going to Mexico.

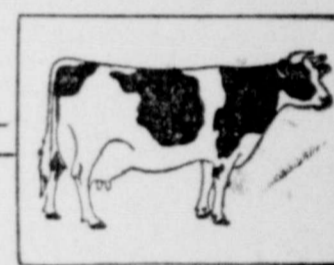
SAYS NEGRO WAS NOT TO BLAME FOR WRECK

SCORES PEDDY FOR DESERTION

Declaring that George Peddy was a traitor to his party, and that he was being supported by the enemies of the democratic party, Rev. J. Pleasant Taylor addressed a crowd which filled the first floor of the court house auditorium Saturday afternoon. The speaker was applauded time and again when he presented argument showing why every true and loyal democrat would stand by his party and support the nominee.

Rev. Taylor charged that Peddy was making the race against Mayfield on strictly a platform of prejudice, appealing to those who are opposed to the Ku Klux Klan, and charging that Mayfield violated the law in the matter of expending more money than the law allows in his campaign. The speaker referred to the enormous slush being turned loose by the Peddy campaign committee, which he said would exceed what Mayfield spent many times over.

The speaker said that while some good men had been lined up against the democratic nominee, that as a whole those who were fighting the democratic nominee were made up of the same old bunch, which he termed the "Muligan Party," saying that the whole mixture of booze fighters, Mexicans, disgruntled, etc., was seasoned with a little "coon."

Rev. Taylor took the Catholics to task, and compared the oath of the Knights of Columbus with the oath of the Ku Klux Klan. He charged that the Catholics to a man were lined up against Mayfield, and he defended the pledge of the democratic party against the pledge of the Knights of Columbus.

The speaker said that the present campaign was not a campaign against Mayfield, but was a campaign to destroy the democratic party in Texas, and as a democrat he would fight them to the last ditch.

(Valley News Bureau) EDINBURG, Tex., Nov. 1.—The Hidalgo county grand jury has returned an indictment against R. B. Creager, republican state chairman, for assault to murder Ben Gordon Whitehead, editor of Fig Leaves, a philosophical magazine published here. Creager has not been arrested, having left Brownsville Friday night, and the report is given out that he will probably not return for some time.

Creager had just returned to the Valley from the North and East, and had given out many interviews regarding his love for law and order and his scorn for jungle judgments. He had insisted that the courts be respected and resorted to to settle all wrongs, and that it is a crime for any man to take the law into his own hands.

Whitehead was seated in a revolving chair in County Attorney Epperson's office when the alleged offense occurred. Creager warned Whitehead before the latter was taken to a surgeon that he would run Whitehead out of the valley if he ever printed Creager's name again. And Whitehead says that the forthcoming issue of Fig Leaves will say it without flowers.

After the affair in the court house Creager, who prides himself on his prowess, was met by Whitehead's young son, Miller Whitehead, and given a severe drubbing, though the state chairman struck the first blow.

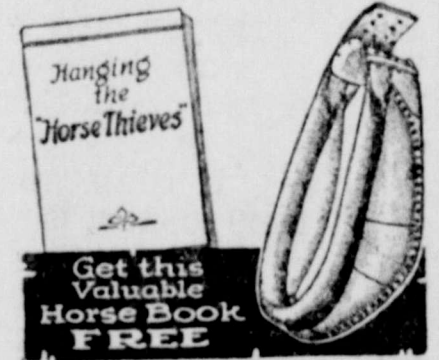

Capt. Cook charged a fee for the part he was playing in the game, or for directing the men how to get in on the big land rush. According to information received here those who kicked in on the proposition just kicked themselves out of so much cash. The land in question has not been put on the market by the government.

R. Gottschalk, of the Norton country, was in Ballinger Saturday and while here sold to James E. Brewer, a local cotton buyer, thirty-one bales of cotton at 25 cents per pound. The thirty-one bales are in the cotton yard at Winters, where it was ginned.

Mr. Gottschalk stated that he made 50 bales on his place this year, and the total revenue from the crop will amount to about \$7,000, including the seed. Mr. Gottschalk received more than \$4,000 for the thirty-one bales sold here Saturday.

If the price of cotton holds up there is going to be a sharp advance in the price of the land which is producing this cotton. There is land in Runnels county which will produce a bale per acre with reasonable seasons, and land which brings \$125 worth of produce per acre will soon reach a higher value.
