RURAL SCHOOLS GET MUCH AID

Runnels county rural schools will receive \$13,305, or at least that much state aid will be apportioned to thirty rural schools.

William Eilers, state supervisor of rural schools, has just completed seven days work in the county, making a survey of the rural schools.

Accompanied by County Superintendent White, Mr. Eilers visited the schools applying for aid, and made a thorough inspection before approving the applications, and after he had completed his work in the county he okayed the applications for the above

Mr. White stated that Mr. Eilers made one of the most thorough inspections ever made since he had been associated with the school work of this county, it requiring seven days to visit the thirty schools.

The inspector not only approved the applications made for aid but commented most favorably on the condition of the rural schools. He expressed himself as being well pleased with what he found in this county.

All the schools receiving aid have sufficient funds with which to maintain a full term.






