Borders was placed in jail about 2:00 o'clock Sunday morning, following a raid made on his storm cellar on the Moncrief farm, three miles from Ballinger, and South of the Colorado River, by Sheriff Earl McWilliams and Deputy Sheriff John White.

As a result of the raid the sheriff's department has in custody one of the largest and most e o mplete booze-making plants ever captured in this county, to-Hick Embler, their brother; and gether with about twenty-five gallons of what the authorities on the subject say is "firstclass" liquor.

Most of the stills heretofore captured in Runnels and adjoining counties have been of crude make. 

#### HOME-BREW BEER NOT LEGAL DRINK

It is a violation of the prohibition law to make home-brew, and homes where such beverage is being made are subject to raid

by the dry enforcement officers. Some folks seem to have absorbed the opinion that they can make home-brew so long as they do not sell it. That is a false idea which may get somebody into serious trouble.

The law is very plain and makes it a penitentiary offense to manufacture what is commonly known as home-brew either for sale or for personal use. It is said that the still captured Armed with a search warrant officers are authorized to raid any home where home-brw is being made, or where any other beverage containing more than the legal amount of alcohol, is being made, and make arrests.

It is said that home-brew is being made in some of the best homes. If that is true the law is being violated in some of the best homes, and the inmates of the best homes who violate the law should be prosecuted just as vigorously as the inmates of the hovel who violate the law.
