FOUR MEN KILLED IN SHAMROCK BLAST

SHAMROCK, Tex., March 16.—Four men were killed and one perhaps fatally injured in an explosion of a gasoline absorption plant of the Columbian Corporation near here today.

The dead are: Jack Todd, P. W. Melton, Lason Chance and C. B. Falk.

The injured man is Bob Griffin. He is not expected to live.

Gas from the plant, which supplies Wichita Falls and many other Northwest Texas cities with natural gas, was shut off as the plant was under construction.

An investigation is being made to determine the cause of the blast.

DOCTOR ENDS LIFE IN JAIL

AUSTIN, March 14.—Dr. C. W. Goddard, city health officer, held here in connection with the shooting of City Manager Adam Johnson this morning, was found dead this afternoon in the city jail.

The man's throat had been cut.

AUSTIN, March 14.—City Manager Adam Johnson was shot five times and seriously wounded in his office here today.

Dr. C. W. Goddard, city health officer, was arrested immediately after the shooting.

No details had been learned early this afternoon.

CARBON MONOXIDE POISON KILLED J. H. HAMILTON

J. H. (Tex) Hamilton, about 45 years of age, formerly of this city, who was found dead in his room, 1485 East California Street, Pasadena, California, died from carbon monoxide poisoning, it has been learned here by Lee Hamilton, a brother of the dead man.

Hamilton had been in Pasadena for some time. His mother, Mrs. T. A. Hamilton, resides at Coleman.

It is believed that he died Saturday night, March 5th, as he was preparing to retire for the night.

A post-mortem examination was conducted and an inquest was to be held later. The findings of the inquest have not been learned here.

MILES MAN HELD ON DRY CHARGE

Robe Williams, of Miles, is in the county jail with his bond set at \$1,000, charged with transportation and possession of intoxicating liquor.

Williams was arrested in Winters Wednesday afternoon by Sheriff R. E. McWilliams, after he had been notified that the man had a quantity of liquor.

Four pints of bonded whiskey and one quart of tequila were said to have been taken from Williams' car by the officer. Williams' wife was with him at the time of his arrest but went on home after the arrest.

It was thought that Williams would make bond some time Thursday evening.

RABBIT DRIVES START TUESDAY

The dinner for the hunters on Tuesday was served by the ladies of the community. They took pies, cakes, salads, coffee, milk and other delicacies while the men furnished the barbecue. Those who were in the drive say they never had a better feed.

It is pointed out that the rabbit-drive plan is a good way to rid the country of rabbits before the young crops come up and are destroyed by the pests. Rabbits in the past have destroyed much produce and have prevented farmers from gathering crops which should have been their best.

It is probable that other drives will be arranged in various sections of the county.

PROF. SUED FOR \$15,000

BRYAN, March 14.—A damage suit between two A. & M. College professors drew the attention of the entire college and faculty here today.

TEXAS BAPTISTS DRIVE EXTENDED

DALLAS, March 16.—The conquest campaign of Texas Baptists for \$2,000,000 to pay institutional debts is to be extended until next Tuesday.

Today had been set as the final day for subscriptions, but Dr. George W. Truett, general director of the campaign, announced that a large number of the churches which had taken collections have not had time to report.

Incomplete returns indicate that considerably more than \$1,000,000 had been pledged, Dr. Truett said.

ESCAPE PLANNED FOR 1200

CHICAGO, March 15.—A plot to empty the Joliet penitentiary of its 1,200 inmates by poisoning the guards has been revealed to the police by Leo Delgoda, one of the paroled convicts of the prison.

He named Nathan Leopold as one of the plotters and said the plot was to have been put into effect next Saturday when arsenic was to have been placed in coffee served the guards.

The plans, according to Delgoda, called for Leopold's escape into old Mexico. Delgoda said he learned of the plot through letters to the plotters and revealed the plans because "I draw the line at a wholesale poisoning."

Captain Carle, assistant instructor of this district, located at Amarillo, will come to Ballinger on March 30th, the last Wednesday in this month, for the purpose of inspecting Company C., 142nd Infantry of the Texas National Guard, for the federal government.

Captain Floyd Moore, instructor of this district, will be here probably before that date and look the company over in a preliminary inspection. He is to inspect other companies of this district about the same time.

Captain W. C. McCarver, commander of the local company, says he has set down fifteen or twenty different drill hours for the company, and on March 30 he expects to have the men in excellent condition for the inspection.

"The public is cordially invited to attend the inspection," Capt. McCarver declared. "It will be open for all. I want the citizens of Ballinger to see a well-trained Guard company in inspection that must be up to now."

Capt. McCarver announced that he is preparing a demonstration squad for this inspection and that the members will all be top-notchers in their drills. They will be under the direction of Corporal Layton Hill. Members of this squad are: Privates Reneau, Lumbley, Allen, Pearce, Jones, Farmer and Chamrad. This squad is being given personal attention by Capt. McCarver.

"I still have openings for several fine young men," declared the company commander, "and I would like to see some of the young men of Ballinger join and take an active part in the organization. By this means the company could be made the best Guard outfit in Texas."

The City Commission of Ballinger, in regular session this week, transacted regular business and looked after several matters that had been called to their attention by various persons.

All bills were ordered paid, as usual, and other matters were considered at length.

A sidewalk across the alley, between the Noyes property and the Central Hotel was ordered built by the city. The Noyes estate is to extend the walk around the corner of the block on Seventh Street.

The Piggly Wiggly sign will remain where it is now, by an order of the commission, although signs attached to structures on sidewalks are not allowed here.

It was decided that arrangements with Mitchell Moore be made for settlement in regard to the purchase of the new fire truck.

An audit of the books, from October 1 to January 31, inclusive, was also ordered. Chapman & Whitsitt of San Angelo have been employed to do the work.

There were no changes made in the salaries of the mayor and commissioners. The mayor's salary is \$500 per annum, paid monthly, while each commissioner receives \$100, paid in two installments.

Other minor business was discussed but action was deferred until another meeting of the commission.

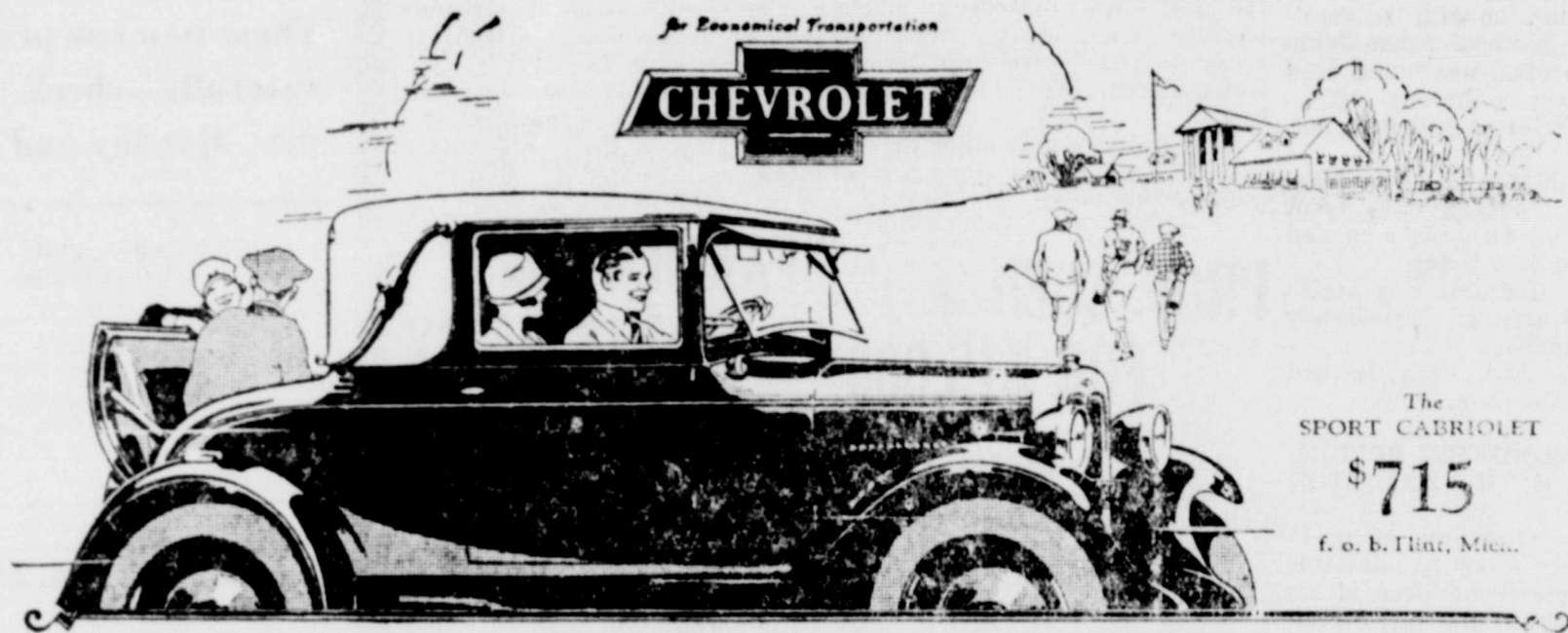
LEGION TO ASSIST IN RECRUITING FOR C. M. T. C.

INSURANCE RATE HERE IS CUT 4c

The Ballinger insurance key-rate is 37 cents, lower than it has ever been, Chief Louis Cohen, of the Ballinger Volunteer Fire Department, announced Thursday afternoon after receiving official notice that a ten per cent credit had been given and that a four-cent reduction was the result.

Credit was given as follows:
Night watchman service, 5%
Methods of fire prevention and principles of fire, as taught in the public schools, 3%
Arson reward, maintained, 2%
Total 10%.

The rate had been 41 cents but the reduction given recently amounted to four cents and the rate has been cut to 37 cents.

It was declared that this reduction would save the citizens of Ballinger several thousand dollars annually.

AUSTIN, March 11.—Because the pecan is "more beautiful, grows more rapidly and in less space, lives longer and produces more money than any other tree," J. S. Woodward, nut expert of the state department of agriculture, has urged Texans to plant more pecan trees.

"It is not an unusual thing," he added, "for one tree to produce from 1,000 to 1,200 pounds of nuts each year which sell at from 75 cents to \$1 per pound."

The annual convention of the Texas Pecan Growers Association at Gonzalez next July is to discuss plans for expanding the pecan industry.

ARREST MADE IN BURGLARY

Three arrests have been made in the burglary of the Motor Inn filling station at Winters on May 9, last year, and all are now in jail.

2 HURT IN CAR CRASH

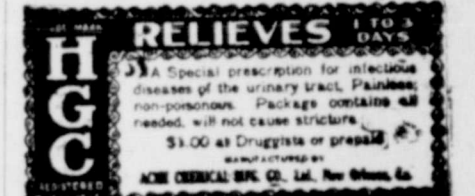

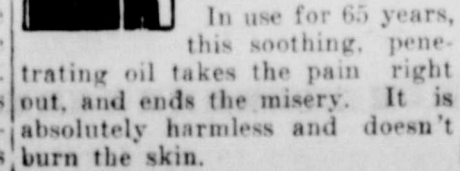

Since announcing that he would spend his summer vacation in the West, President Coolidge is being swamped with invitations from western towns. Come to Ballinger, Mr. Coolidge.

The big oil companies have posted another cut in crude oil, all of which means the muzzling of producing wells and a let-up in wildcatting. Too much of anything makes the stuff cheap; cotton for instance.

With twelve felony cases already on the docket for the next grand jury to work on and the next grand jury seven months off, that body is promised a busy session next October. However, maybe crime comes in waves and possibly the wave has passed.

Four persons were killed in one day in Texas last week by being run over by automobiles. A large majority of the auto fatalities are not persons killed while riding in cars, but persons killed while walking along or walking across the highways. Watch your step.

The egg market at this time is a little discouraging to the poultry raisers, but when we stop to consider that eggs by the carload are shipped into Texas from California during certain seasons of the year, and that eggs by the boatload come from far off China, we say to the old hens, "do your best."

The Supreme Court of this good old U. S. has ruled that the Texas primary law shutting negroes out of the Democratic primary is unconstitutional. Perhaps so, but if so, we predict that Texas Democrats will find some other way to manipulate their political machine without the help of the negro. No, not yet will negroes be permitted to vote in the "white man's" primary.

The U. S. Supreme Court has also held that where court authorities share in the fine; receiving a fee in the trial of a criminal case; that the defendant in such case is not guaranteed a "fair and impartial" trial. Of course the court does not mean to insinuate that an officer would help to "stick" an innocent man for the price of his share of the fine.

Babe Ruth gets \$210,000 for playing baseball three seasons, and the men who shell out the coin to Babe will get their profit from the gate receipts, and the gate receipts come in as a result of the publicity given the baseball hero through the press of the country. Publicity can make or break a man over night, and if it had not been for printer's ink Babe, Tris, Ty and others of the sports world would probably be driving a truck or pumping oil at a filling station for a living.

SMITHSONIAN RELIC

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams left Tuesday for Sherwood, where he went to get a man charged with the theft of a fine horse from the W. L. Lampe farm, south of Ballinger, last week, and who is also charged with the theft of a saddle from the barn at the W. R. White home in South Ballinger.—Ballinger Ledger.

No doubt Sheriff McWilliams went after this person with the intention of returning him for incarceration in the Ballinger quartel, and no doubt, too, presently the prosecutor will rise and endeavor to persuade a jury of twelve good men to confine him for a period of years in the state penitentiary. Sub S. P. has no means of knowing whether the man for whom Sheriff McWilliams is calling is the one that removed the horse from the Lampe farm, but when the identity of that party is assured he can not but feel that the proper place for him is not the penitentiary, but the Smithsonian Institution. In the first place, why should a man

steal a horse? A horse isn't transportation any more, it is a curiosity. And how could he expect to get away with it after he stole it? A man on a horse is as conspicuous as a girl with long skirts. Texas used to be studded as plentifully with boss thieves as with buffalo. Now one is as nearly extinct as the other. Thieves we have—too many of them—car and accessory pilferers, hi-jackers, embezzlers, burglars, defrauders and swindlers. But a horse thief has to be rare because the article that gives him a name is rare, too. A horse thief once upon a time was worth about the value of a hemp cravat. Now he should be worth money on the hoof. Philatelists part with uncounted shekels for an 1804 half dollar. Stamp collectors shell out for a rare Guatemalan or Confederate postoffice issue. An authenticated horse thief could bring a good deal merely on exhibition. If the gentlemen of the jury will give him fifty years stuffed and mounted, in the Smithsonian, it will be about right.—Dallas News.

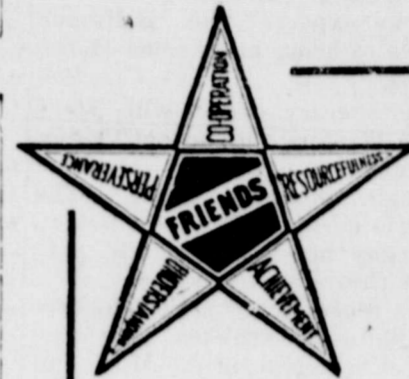
WICHITA FALLS COUPLE MARRY IN BALLINGER
