Local Band Working Hard for Convention

Director H. H. Carsey, of the Ballinger Booster Band, has begun intensive rehearsals in preparation for the trip to the Fort Worth convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The Ballinger music makers will enter the band contest in the four year class and from now until time for the convention will rehearse on the numbers to be used in this contest. The numbers are unusually hard in the fourth year class and much practice will be necessary by the local bandsmen. Only two numbers will be used this year by each band. One of these selections in the history written by mittie, while the director can offer any number he desires for his band's "warming-up."

To warm up Mr. Carsey has selected a march, "The Billboard's Bazaar," by Ed Chenette. Mr. Chenette, composer of this number, will be the principal judge in the competition.

The selection which will require hard work by any band will be a suite of four numbers, "Atlantis," by V. F. Safranek. The four numbers are divided as follows: Part I, "Nocturne and Morning Hymn of Praise"; part II, "A Court Function," (Gavotte); part III, "I Love Thee," (Larghetto); and part IV, "The Destruction of Atlantis."

Atlantis is a continent mentioned in the history written by Plato, and is thought to have extended across the Atlantic Ocean approximately from Europe to Yucatan. It is the subject of an exhaustive volume by Ignatius Donnelly and has also served as inspiration for several novelists. The continent, it is believed, was the home of a great race which conquered and civilized the world. The Azores Islands are considered to be the tops of its lofty mountains, and are all that now remain above water of the great country.

Both the convention selections will be heard in Ballinger in concert before the Fort Worth trip.

Fire Dep't Prepares For Convention

A called meeting of the volunteer fire department will be held here tonight, Fire Chief Louis Cohen announced, for the purpose of perfecting plans for the local delegation to the State Firemen's Association convention at Denton next week. Ten or twelve members of the local department are expected to attend the four-day meet, Chief Cohen said.

According to present plans, the local delegation will leave Ballinger early Sunday morning, and drive to Fort Worth, where they will stop for the night, arriving in Denton Monday. The convention officially opens Tuesday.

Representatives of fire departments at San Angelo, Miles and Menard will meet with the fire chief here Wednesday morning to arrange for the joint trip of the delegations of the four organizations. The group will assemble in Ballinger Sunday morning, and drive, caravan style, to the convention city.

MAN IS HELD FOR FORGERY AND CAR THEFT

A man giving his name as Jack Smith and age as 21, is being held in the county jail here on charges of forgery, resulting in his alleged raising of a check from \$4.35 to \$14.35. Smith was arrested in San Angelo four hours after he had received a check here from Arthur Doose, manager of the Ballinger Poultry & Egg Company.

This man is also wanted in Paducah, Cottle county, for car theft, it was reported later, as the new Buick coupe he was driving had been stolen in Paducah a week or so ago from a cotton man. The young man claimed he did not steal the car, that it was given to him by another man. It is thought, however, that he knew the car was stolen property.

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams went to San Angelo Thursday evening after Smith was arrested there and returned him to the local jail.

Sheriff A. A. Payne, of Cottle county, is due in Ballinger Friday to get Smith and return him to Cottle county to stand trial.

Smith appeared at the Ballinger Poultry & Egg Company plant Thursday with eight hens. He sold the chickens to Mr. Doose and received a check for \$4.35 for the fowls. Ten minutes later, it is alleged he had raised the check and passed it to a garage man in the western suburbs of the city for gasoline, receiving \$13 in change. The check was made out to Joe Smith and endorsed Joe Smith, but when arraigned before the court here, the man told officers his name was Jack Smith.

Pure Co. Makes New Location

The latest development in the Runnels county oil situation this week is the location made for a new well on the H. Giesecke Ranch, about eighteen miles from Ballinger. The location is northwest of the old No. 1 well of the Gulf Production Company. The surveyor's numbers for the new test have not yet been made known.

Gulf No. 1 sprayed oil over the derrick and was considered a real producer in a wildcat field over ten years ago, and other wells in this vicinity seemed to bear out the theory that oil pay is close. Thorough geological studies have been made of the area.

No announcement has been made as to when the new well will be spudded, but it is expected to be started immediately.

4-H Club Members To Visit Lee Model Farm

On June 14th the 4-H Club boys and girls and the Women's Clubs of Runnels county will make an inspection trip to the R. Q. Lee model farm at Cisco.

Mr. Lee has bought a worn-out, run-down farm about two miles out of Cisco and has changed it into a model farm for the people of Eastland county. This farm has been placed under a complete system of terraces in order to conserve moisture and build up the soil.

Mr. Lee has also purchased some fine dairy cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry in order to carry out a truly diversified plan of farming. The houses, barns, equipment have all been arranged with an idea of saving labor, giving the best service and cutting down operation expenses. The sum of \$30,000 has been spent in establishing this farm and those who have seen it claim it is a fine model to adopt.

The trip will be under the supervision of C. W. Lehmburg, county agent, and Mrs. Laura Hollingsworth, home demonstration agent.

The trippers will leave Ballinger at 6 o'clock, arriving at Winters at 6:45, and will be joined there by those going from the northern part of the county. The trip is scheduled by way of Abilene. The rest of the morning will be spent inspecting the model farm.

Everybody is expected to bring lunch which will be spread in picnic style at the big dam at 12:30 o'clock.

In the afternoon the club members will judge some of the live-stock on the farm and visit some of the big poultry farms around Cisco.

This is to be an educational trip as well as an outing for the club members. However, anyone who wants to make the trip is most welcome to go, and especially the parents of the 4-H Club boys and girls are urged to go, said Mr. Lehmburg. It will be an encouragement to the boys and girls and, no doubt will have an educational value for the grown-ups, he added.

Delegations from San Angelo, Miles, and Menard will join the local body, and leave by automobile caravan at 8 o'clock Sunday morning for Fort Worth, where they will spend Sunday night, driving to Denton Monday.

72 NEW CARS HERE IN MAY

Seventy-two new automobiles were registered in Ballinger during the month of May, W. L. Brown, county tax collector, said Friday. This number was swelled by 15 new Fords.

There were 102 cars in all registered last month, the records show.

The total number of passenger cars registered here to date is 4,228, and trucks 414.

Following is a list of the new automobiles registered here in May: Chevrolets, 25; Whippets, 10; Fords, 15; Dodges, 9; Chryslers, 3; Willys-Knights, 2; Oldsmobiles, 1; and Buicks, 1. Six Chevrolet and two Ford trucks were registered.

D. Motley, secretary of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, and chairman of the parade committee.

The executive committee discussed the matter of finances and decided to raise the sum of \$1200, to be used to provide floats for the sponsors from the different counties in the convention parade, the decorating of the Heart of Texas exhibit hall in Fort Worth, and other necessary expenses.

Each county in the district will be called on by the finance committee, the executive committee announces, and the plan of financing taken up with the different counties, so that quick action may be had on this part of the work and everything gotten in readiness to proceed with the convention plans.

Each county will be asked to buy a special uniform cap for its citizens at the convention, according to the plans decided upon Thursday. These caps will be white with a large red heart upon them, and with the name of the

town from which the wearer hails printed upon the band.

Each town will be permitted to enter any special form of advertising in the parade that it may desire, so long as it does not conflict with the general scheme adopted for the district.

Exhibit space will be provided for each of the 17 Heart of Texas counties in the exhibit hall, and where there is more than one city or town in a county desiring to exhibit each will have space, but all exhibits from the same county will be grouped together.

Ballinger's delegation will be arranged for next week, it was stated following a meeting of the convention committee of the local chamber Friday.

This committee has appointed several teams to start a drive Monday morning to raise funds to send the Ballinger Booster Band to the convention. Ballinger's delegation will ride the special train to Fort Worth which is to pass through here from San Angelo.

Delegations from other towns in this section will also ride this special train.

Continuance Is Granted Man In Homicide Case

The regular jury venire for the May term of County Court convened at the court house at 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon. Only one criminal case was on the regular trial docket, styled the State of Texas vs. W. L. Clark.

This was the case in which Clark ran over and killed W. A. Pace on May 29, 1927, after which the grand jury returned a bill of negligent homicide against the former. The case was transferred to the County Court from Winters.

On the call of the case the state attorneys announced ready, while the defense asked for a continuance, which was granted by the court. The case was set for trial on the first Monday in August, being August 6th next.

Young Clark is the son of Deputy Sheriff S. T. Clark of Winters. At the time of the tragedy he was alleged to be slightly past 16 years old.

From 30 to 35 witnesses for both state and defense were in

court Monday afternoon. The firm of Doss & Boynton was employed for special prosecution in the case, and with C. P. Shepherd, county attorney, appeared for the state.

Continuance in the case was granted on the grounds of the sudden illness of the leading defense attorney, Judge T. T. Crosson. A. O. Strother and R. T. Thornton, both of Winters, also represented Clarke in the case.

Considerable interest centers about the case, because of the fact that the victim of the tragedy was a pioneer citizen of the northern end of the county.

The jury was discharged, there being no other business before the court.

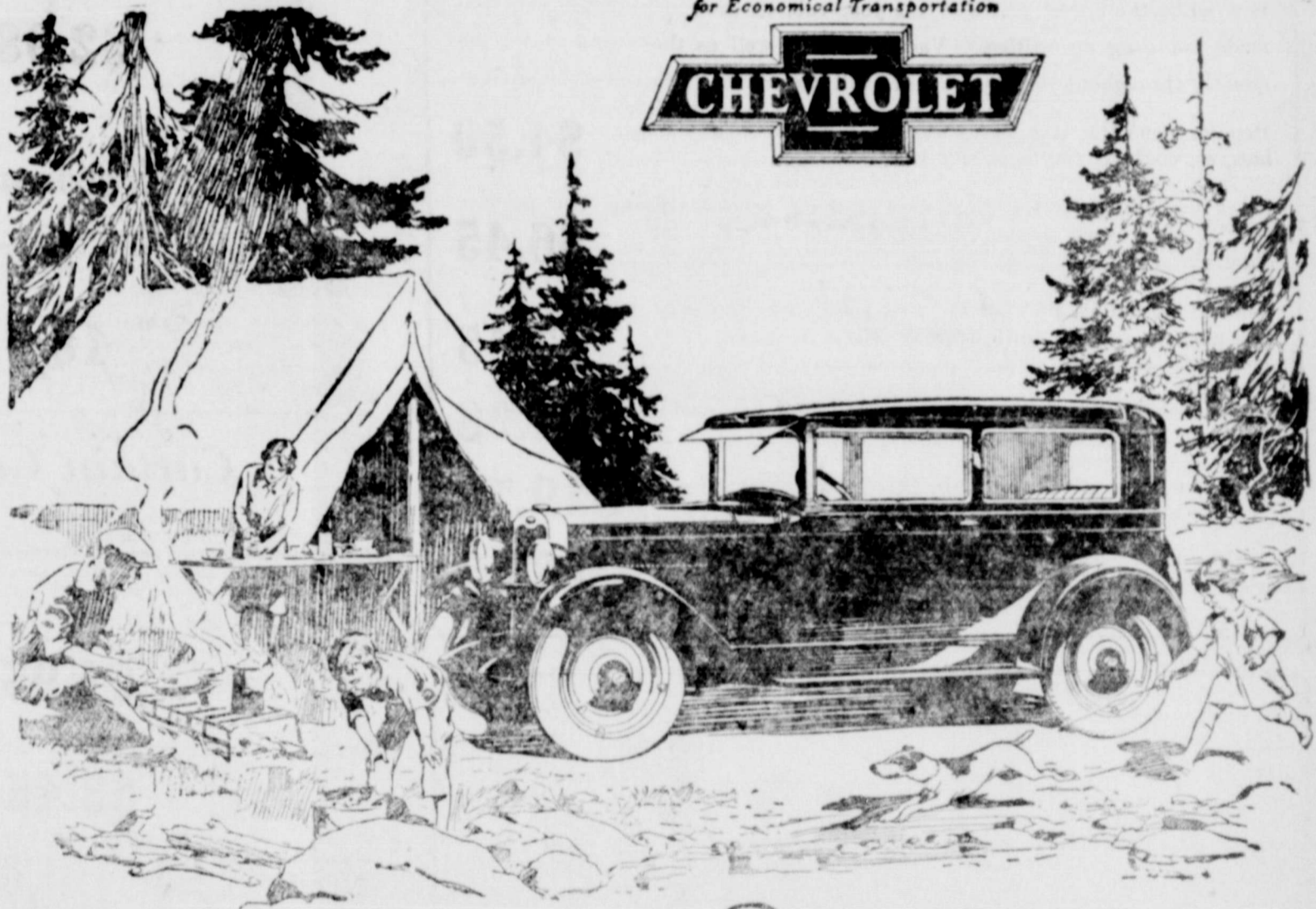

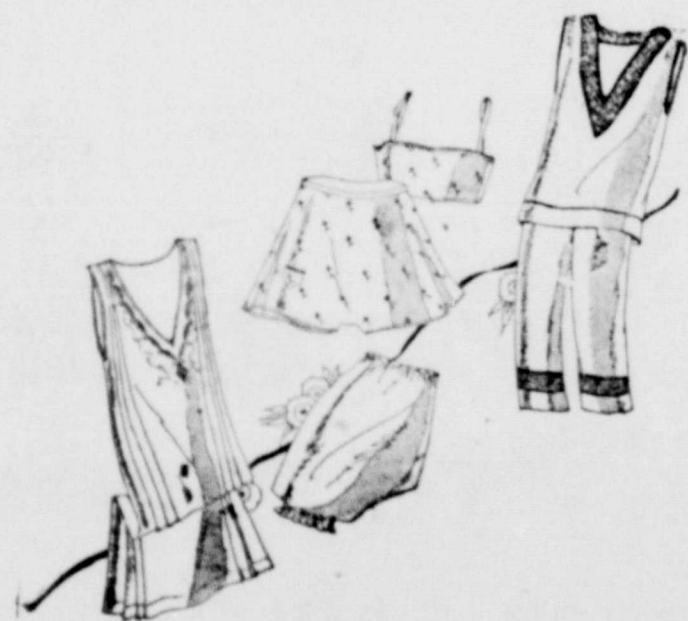

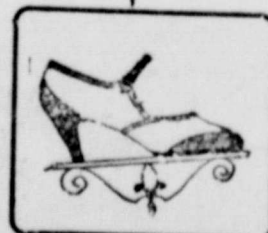

June 1st marks the opening day for the \$10 bounty to be paid for each grown wolf killed in Runnels county, it was announced Friday morning by J. D. Motley, secretary and treasurer of the Runnels County Wolf Club, which was recently organized to rid this county of wolves and coyotes.

Ten dollars per green scalp will be paid for grown coyotes by the club, and \$1 will be paid by the Commissioners' Court. The club will also pay \$3 per scalp for wolf puppy scalps to July 1st, and after that date the bounty on the pups will be \$5.

The organization recently perfected has an executive board as follows: C. W. Lehmburg, president; Feb. McWilliams, vice-president; Mr. Motley, secretary-treasurer; and Bob Corbell and William Parramore.

The members of this club have assessed themselves a tax of one cent per acre, and approximately

\$1,000 has already been subscribed to the bounty fund. This embraces approximately 100,000 acres in Runnels county.

Sheepmen, cattlemen and turkey raisers are all members of this club and since of the ranchmen with cattle and sheep will pay between \$25 and \$5 for coyotes slain on their places, it was stated.

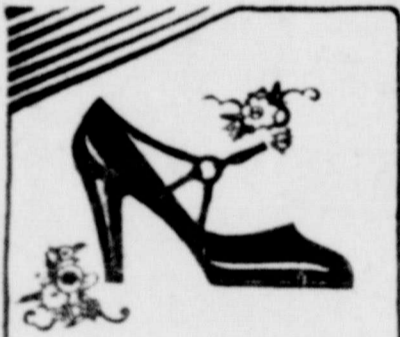
