



Angel Cake Whites of 12 eggs

11/2 cups granulated sugar (measured

1 cup and 1 tablespoon pastry flour Pinch salt

11/2 teaspoons cream of tartar Sift sugar five times. Set aside. Sift flour, cream of tartar and salt together five times. Set aside. Beat whites to a froth, not quite as stiff as for meringue. Sift in sugar, folding it into eggs as lightly as possible. Sift in flour. This also must be done with as light a handling and as much speed as possible. Turn into un-buttered pan and cook in slow oven for fifty-five minutes. Put pan of water in oven with it and keep it there for forty minutes. Do not open the oven door for twenty minutes after cake starts to bake. At the end of forty minutes take pan of water out. At the end of fifty-five minutes take out cake and turn it upside on plate to cool in pan.

Chocolate Sauce 2 cups white sugar

2 tablespoons cocoa 1/2 cup water.

Cook to thick syrup. Add nuts and serve hot over cake.

7,900,000 CARIBOU IN ALASKA START ANNUAL MARCH TO NEW PASTURES

(By International News Service) CIRCLE CITY, Alaska, Oct. 5 -The yearly migration of Alaska caribou herds, estimated as totaling 7,000,000 head, is underway and will continue for some weeks. Eagle Summit, an area of several thousands of acres of tundra-covered grazing land south of Circle City is black with slowly-moving caribou. The Alaska caribou herds rival in numbers the buffalo which roamed the plains of the western states in the early seventies. Already this year steamers plying the Yukon and her tributaries have been held up for periods of twenty and thirty hours while the masses of closely-packed animals cross the streams as far as the eye can see in either direction.

It is believed that the game animals of Alaska will hold their own against the ravages of future hunters and furnish satisfactory hunting for sportsmen of coming generations.

This assurance will now enable the member to make his financial arrangements along definite plans, and the new contract from this view should also prove of more unanimous endorsement and approval on the part of business interests.

"Under the new plan," Mr. Mc-Caughan stated, "the member shipping cotton to the price fixation pool draws the regular authorized advance, and when he fixes the price on his cotton practically a complete settlement is made with him as soon as his cotton is weighed and classed." It is, in fact, he said, the present marketing agreement of the Association made more liberal. Mr. McCaughan is highly enthusiastic over the new features and states that in his mind deliveries to the cotton cooperative marketing association in the future will show a tremendous increase. "The new plan,' 'he stated, "removes factors which in the past have retarded a greater growth." The price fixation pooling plan, it was said, is now in effect in all parts of the various states cotton cooperative marketing associations where it has been highly acceptable on the part of the membership and the public generally, as well as effective in increasing deliveries to the channels of co-operative market-
