**Insurance Agents Explain New Rates**

Local insurance agencies are sending out a letter this week to all policy holders of business property in Ballinger relative to new rates that will apply after February 25th. There have been numerous changes in rates on business property here and a representative of one of the local agencies will call upon each firm before their next policy expires and carefully check the rates to see if any corrections can be made to reduce the rate.

There is at present an additional charge of 10 cents on the \$100 being made on most of the property here that can be eliminated if the firms will have the troubles corrected. Practically everyone in Ballinger using gas stoves are using a rubber connection from the gas pipe to the stove with a cutoff at the stove and another at the pipe. If the cutoff at the stove is sawed off and only the cutoff at the

wall or pipe is used it will eliminate the ten cent penalty and make the use of gas much more safe.

When the two cutoffs are used many people get into the habit of using the one at the stove and this leaves the gas pressure in the rubber hose all the time. Any hose may become leaky or the pressure may blow it from the connection at either place, allowing the gas to escape into the room and cause an explosion. If only one connection is used and the gas cut off at the wall this keeps all the gas in the pipe and the rubber hose is safe.

Many towns have ordinances prohibiting the use of a hose connection as a matter of safety.

The time for filing your federal income tax report is getting short and March 15 will be here before it can be realized. This report is a booger boo to many people but a few hours of work will put it in shape to be filed.

The gauge at Ballinger registered a rainfall of .15 inch Sunday night. This is not much water but following on the heels of the freeze last week it made it muddy here and many thought much more rain fell.

Another matter that shows the city police are watching closely is drunks. The public business streets are a poor place to put on a drunk exhibition and unless those in the habit of drinking too much want to pay a fine they had better not make a public show down town.

Parties arriving in Ballinger from points east Monday afternoon reported heavy rains east of Ballinger and around Cross Plains and Rising Star that hail was still piled up on the side of the highways. The rains were much heavier just east and north of Ballinger and in some cases only a few miles away.

The Abilene Reporter is coming out soon with an aviation edition. This issue of this paper will carry articles from all towns in West Texas telling what has been done towards aviation and what is contemplated. Ballinger so far has done nothing towards an airport. The name of the town was placed on the freight depot a few years ago and this mark is about all we can include from this city in that special aviation edition.

The number of speeding cases that are being filed in city court should cause fast drivers to think before tearing up some street far in excess of the speed limit. There is hardly ever a day that several cases are not filed and it is an expensive proposition for the thrill of speeding on some street. Local city police are watching speeders closely on local streets and fines are being assessed by the court regularly.

Weather prophets here say that the loud thunder Sunday night will mean a freeze in April and the destruction of the fruit crop. This is an old saying that thunder in February means frost in April and we do not know how true it is. Easter is early this year and winter here is usually thought to be over with Easter.

Scientists of New York have discovered that the old saying about the lazy bee is not true. The bees of the United States are being charged with over-production of honey and at present there are large quantities of honey on the market that cannot be disposed of. According to figures given out the bees in this country produce 250,000,000 pounds of honey annually.

Court will begin grinding on the third week of court here for this term. During the first two weeks there were few intermissions and many cases were disposed of. Judge Miller is rushing the work as fast as possible and will clean up many cases from the docket in this county.

Friday the citizens of Ballinger were again reminded of the value of a good fire company and equipment, when the fighters stopped the blaze at the Harry Lynn home and saved the home from burning. Our fire fighters are always on the job and serve without pay to protect the property of everyone. They deserve good equipment to fight with and will soon have a home in the new city hall where they will be able to keep their property. They need a new truck and when the new city administration is elected we hope they give the company a new pumper to be installed in the new building.

The improvements of yards in Ballinger seem to be contagious and there are, perhaps, more trees and shrubs being put out here than ever before in the history of the town. A local nurseryman stated this week that everybody had gotten the fever at the same

time and that he was being rushed with orders for all kinds of nursery stock to beautify yards. This kind of work means more each year to a town and as the trees begin to grow they will add more beauty each year.

The way the rains have fallen lately has made it hard for the road drags to get any work done. By the time the roads are dry enough to start a drag on them another rain sets them back for a few more days and some of the roads are getting pretty badly cut up. The drags have been ready to start several times but each time have been delayed by more rains or freezes.

The county health nurse has finished her inspection in the Ballinger school and will be ready within a few days to make a complete report on her findings. This report will likely open the eyes of many people and show them why a health nurse is needed and in a small way the value of one. Everyone will go to a doctor when they are sick but very few people think of taking their children to a physician for a careful examination when there is apparently nothing the matter with them. This should be done regularly and the county health nurse working in the schools will fill this need and when parents are shown defects in their children they will then see a doctor and try to get the defects corrected.

While the committees from the local chamber of commerce are putting over the budget and membership campaign this week every one should consider what a chamber of commerce means to a town. When a prospective citizen comes to a town the first things that he inquires about are churches, schools and has the town a live chamber of commerce. No one will deny the benefit of an organization of this kind but many people want the work to be carried on without their assistance in a financial way. If an investigation is made they will usually be found the same way about the church, school and other affairs of their town.

The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce is on the job all the time and their past accomplishments merit the financial and moral support of every citizen and business firm in Ballinger.

**Santa Claus Robber Sentenced to Death**

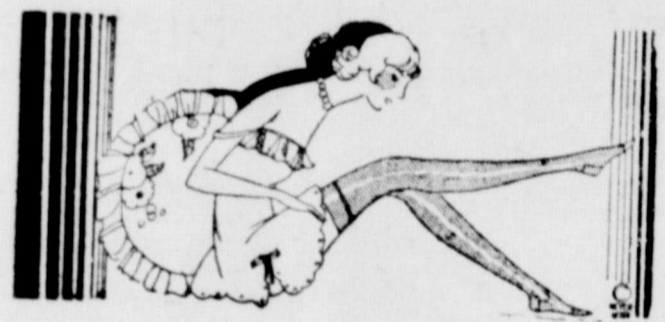
