MECCA FOR TRAVELERS

Mysteries of Underground World Beckon Adventurous

Caves have fascinated man from the dawn of antiquity to the present day. Stories of them abound in history, folklore and mythology, yet these mysterious underground worlds still beckon the adventurous and the weird senses to be discovered there five imaginations.

Three great cave systems in the United States have been established as national parks—Mammoth cave in Kentucky, Carlsbad caverns in New Mexico and Wind cave in South Dakota. In 1945 these three national parks were visited by more than half a million people.

One of the most famous of these caves has been known for more than a century. It is believed to have been discovered in 1799 by a pioneer named John Houchin who followed a wind borne powder into the cave entrance. A few years later salt peter taken from the cave was used in the manufacture of gunpowder for American troops in the War of 1812, and not long after that the great passages of the famed chambers of Mammecca for travelers. There are now five distinct levels in Mammoth cave and during the course of the underground trip, the visitor descends 360 feet to the lowest level where the Echo river winds its tortuous way in eternal darkness. Echo river is probably the most distinctive and interesting feature of the cave and a short trip is made on it in a flat-bottomed boat. Strange eyeless fish live in the river.

There are now more than 150 miles of explored passageways in Mammoth cave and the visitor is offered a choice of several tours which vary in length from 2 1/2 to 7 1/2 hours. On the all-day trip one has lunch at the Snowball Dining Room, 267 feet below the surface. An indication of what one may expect to see is given by the names of some of the formations in the cave: Bottomless Pit, Fat Man's Misery, Ruins of Karnak, Frozen Niagara, Violet City, Jenny Lind's Armchair and Martha Washington's Statue.

Long under private ownership, Mammoth cave became a national park in 1941 largely through the foresight and generosity of the people of the State of Kentucky, who through personal contributions made possible purchase of the cave property and its donation to the federal government.

CARLSBAD CAVERNS was proclaimed a national monument in 1923 and given national park status in 1930. Probably its earliest explorer was Jim White, a cowboy, who entered it in 1901. Seeing a dark, moving column issuing from the top of a mountain, White investigated and found a natural opening in the earth which led him down to the cavern. The dark, smoky column proved to be alive, a moving stream of bats from down in the darkness of the caves. This spectacular flight of bats, may be seen every afternoon at dusk during the warm months of the year.

The descent into Carlsbad caverns from the natural entrance is an unforgettable experience. From a point well below the surface one may look back through the semi-gloom to see an endless procession of people zig-zagging downward amid huge boulders and grotesque rock formations. The scene reminds one of descriptions of the caverns "Inferno." Elevators are available for those who do not wish to descend or ascend on foot.

Everything in Carlsbad caverns is on a vast scale. The rooms are huge and the stalactites and stalagmites are larger than in any other known cave. Some of the stalagmites have the shape and size of church spires. The dominant colors in Carlsbad are varying shades of

tan. The descent from the natural entrance to the 750 foot level is made via the Green Lake Room, the King's Palace, the Queen's Chamber and the Papoose Room. After lunch in the underground cafeteria comes the main event, a tour of the "Big Room." This tremendous chamber is about 4,000 feet long, 500 feet wide and 300 feet from floor to ceiling. In this room many city skyscrapers would seem small. Here one sees the Temple of the Sun and the pagoda-like stalagmite called "Rock of Ages." The trip takes about seven hours.

WIND CAVE near the Black Hills in South Dakota, a national park since 1903, is much smaller in extent. Carlsbad caverns, "mouse" cave or "cave of ages" known as "box work" found in no other caves in the United States. The tour of Wind cave requires from one to two hours and the return to the surface is made by elevator.

An additional interesting feature of Wind Cave National park is a large buffalo herd which is maintained by the park.

MAMMOTH CAVE, Carlsbad caverns and Wind cave are accessible by paved highways, and all have bus or taxi connections with one or more railroads. There are no overnight facilities at Carlsbad caverns, but there are tourist camps near the park entrance and hotels in Carlsbad, N. M. A tree campsite is provided in Wind Cave National park, but the nearest hotels or cabins will be found in Hot Springs, S. D. At Mammoth Cave National park hotels, cottages and park transportation are furnished. Here also National Park service has free campsites and picnic areas.

All three caves are illuminated by modern electric systems; however, in the historic section of Mammoth cave parties still are guided by the traditional lanterns and flickering pine torches. There are no elevators in Mammoth cave and visitors in poor physical condition should not descend to the level of Echo river as the climb to the surface is steep. All trips in the cave are conducted by National Park service guides and rangers.

Wisdom and Understanding For Our Daily Living

LESSON TEXT FOR JULY 27—Proverbs 1:1-5; 3:1-4; 9: 10; James 1:5

EDUCATION is so widespread in our day, and so eagerly sought after, that one might assume that the world would soon solve its problems through the cultural attainments of its people.

Why this is not true appears clearly in our lesson; for it is wisdom that the world needs, and wisdom is quite different from the understanding or memorizing of a mass of facts.

Wisdom teaches us how to use knowledge effectively for the glory of God. We see in our lesson:

I. The Meaning of Wisdom (Prov. 1:1-5).

PROVERBS are pithy, useful sayings, which gather up the wisdom of a people in easily remembered form. They are highly thought of in all nations, but reached their highest development among the Hebrews, because they recognized that they must be related to God and worship of him.

Knowledge must be coupled with discernment (v. 2), which speaks of going beyond and below the surface meaning. This will not be an abstract love of the scholarly, but a practical application of truth to life (v. 3). Wisdom results in right living and proper dealing with our neighbors.

The one who has come to this place is ready to give (v. 4) help to others, especially to the young or those of "simple" thinking, who have not yet reached the place where they can get hold of such things for themselves.

Notice that the wise man does not stop at that point, but because he is wise he goes on to more and more understandings, to further receiving and giving out of "sound counsels" (v. 5).

II. The Value of Wisdom (Prov. 3:13-18).

THE character of a man shows up in the things he holds to be valuable. Some cannot see beyond gold and silver. Others seek comfort and convenience, and do not wish to be disturbed in their easy ways.

The wise man knows that for real pleasure of the highest type, for peace of mind and heart, for riches that will last and not bring him into either sin or sorrow, there is nothing like the cultivation of understanding and wisdom.

This scripture affords us the opportunity to say a needed word to young people who are being so sorely tempted these days to forego their opportunities for an education, and to rush out into the world to make money, more money, yes, the most possible money.

Education seems to be unnecessary. But wait, the years will come and go, and then when it is too late, the realization will come that a golden opportunity was passed, and that doors of usefulness and effectiveness are now closed.

III. The Source of Wisdom (Prov. 9:9, 10; James 1:5).

GOD is the source of wisdom, and it is as a man fears him that he becomes wise. The fear of God is not a matter of fright or terror, but rather remains concerned that one may do his will and never fail to be obedient to his guidance.

God is always more ready to give than we are to receive. He will not turn us aside, or belittle our efforts; but will, if we ask, give wisdom, and that in no little measure.

Let no man think that he can attain unto true wisdom apart from the right relationship to God. He may have knowledge, but not wisdom. On the other hand, let no man who knows God and serves him go through life lacking wisdom when all he has to do is to ask it of his heavenly Father. Why is he poverty-stricken when you can be rich in wisdom and understanding?
