

Marriages in Runnels county decreased in 1930 over 1929 to a large extent. In 1929 there were 247 marriages performed and in 1930 the number dropped off to Divorces also decreased 126 from 30 to 18 during that year. This is not true of Runnels county only but practically every county in Texas showed a decrease in about the same proportion. The total for Texas in 1929 was 63,173 and in 1930 it dropped to 45,158. Much of the decrease is blamed on the new marriage law which went into force on June 12, 1929 requiring three days notice before a license can be issued in this state.
