SILOS AND THEIR USEFULNESS TO THE FARMERS OF TEXAS.

(By Commercial Secretaries) Fort Worth, Texas, March 8 .-There has been introduced in Texas within the past two years one of the greatest boons that has come to modern agriculture since the first reaper was manufactured and the fact has been established beyond a doubt that the silo has secured a permanent place among the necessary equipment of modern Texas farm.

A census recently taken by the Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association shows that there are 214 silos now in use on Texas dairy, stock and other farms where feeding of livestock is practiced to any extent and that the total storage capacity of all the silos in the state is 27,765 tons or an average of 130 tons per

While silos have been in use at the A. & M. College Dairy, Taft Ranch and by a few others in the state for several years the feeding of ensilage and the erection of silos in Texas has only become gen eral during the last two years the majority of the total number of silos in the state being erected during 1912.

There are four silo manufacturing concerns now operating within the borders of the state, three of which are located in Fort worth and one in Houston. The representatives of these concerns

As the silo is always fed from the surface of the stored mass it is necessary that the diameter be such that the surface layer be fed off every day if the feeding in done in warm weather. Therefore the diameter of the silo will vary from ten to fifteen feet to meet the demands of the herd.

The life of the silo is generally dependent upon the initial cost and materials used. A silo might be built for \$150 which would last ten years, the cost exclusive of the upkeep being \$15 a year. With the use of better materials or construction on the same size silo its life might be increased to twenty years at an addition outlay of perhaps \$50 which it is readily seen is much cheaper per year. Quality usually goes hand in hand with price and the farmer who can afford it should not make the mistake of building anything but the best if he wishes to economize to the great advantage.

Sorghum is a sure crop in Texas and produces a fine quality of ensilage. If it is planted early two good crops can be secured on the same ground if the stubble is cultivated after the first crop is cut off. A recent bulletin of the Texas Experimental Station at A and M. College states that the crops most desirable for the silo in Texas are corn, sorghum, cow peas, alfalfa and ribbon cane tape. Indian corn is the most gen erally used while sorghum, kaffir and milo maize are used extensively. These four crops are some times planted in rows together, the result being silage of a high quality.
