Chicago, June 4.-Jack Johnson, negro heavyweight champion today was sentenced to one year and one day in the state prison at Joliet and fined \$1,000 for violation of the Man "white slave" act Sentence was pronounced on John son after Federal Judge Carpenter had denied a motion for a new trial. Johnson obtained two weeks in which to prepare a writ of error and the bond for \$30,000 on which he has been at liberty since his conviction, was allowed to

The defendant is one of the best known men of his race and his example has been far reach-
