Three trucks loaded with peanuts, a peanut dryer, and a barn filled with about 2000 bales of hay were all destroyed in a Tuesday morning fire on the Heppy Jackson farm, two miles from Carbon.

The fire started about 9:30 a.m. Tuesday while Bill Carlton, employee of Chaney Butane Company, was servicing a butane tank at the farm. Carlton was thrown by the blast and received burns. He was apparently not seriously injured.

'Law And Order' Is Key Point In Governor's Race

"Both candidates for governor say "Law and order" is a major campaign issue but there is a difference in approach to this problem" according to Mrs. H. J. Bulgerin of Eastland.

Mrs. Bulgerin is Eastland County campaign chairman for Paul Eggers the Republican candidate for governor.

"Mr. Eggers has said all year that crime is increasing and we must face up to this growing problem.

"He has presented a well-rounded program. It includes modernized police training and education with scholarships and salary incentives for law enforcement officers; steps to curb juvenile delinquency; contingency plans to prevent and control civil disorder; and establishment of a

network of crime control centers.

"Preston Smith said in August he detected a 'definite backturn' in crime. Ten days after he made that statement the Texas Department of Public Safety reported crime increased 15 per cent the first six months of 1968 compared with 1967. The report said a major crime is committed in Texas every 90 seconds.

"It's important for political leaders to become aware and fully informed about the crime problem.

"We're never going to reverse our upward crime trend!" Mrs. Bulgerin said "without an awareness of the problem and unless we all become concerned and support steps to improve law enforcement."

4-H Club Youths Lead Way In Ag Program

The 4-H Clubs of Texas and the United States have just completed (Oct. 6-12) the celebration of their special week, National 4-H Club Week. The role of Texas in the National and International 4-H Club program is unique in that 4-H Club work found its beginning here.

In Jack County, Texas, a Jackboro newspaper publisher, Thomas Merrivether Marks, discovered that youth could lead the way in expanding the Agricultural program. Mr. Marks turned to youth after a corn contest and show in 1907 had failed with only 3 entries. He organized the Corn Clubs of Jack County with one hundred and eleven boys participating. They were told how to grow corn according to the latest recommendations. As a result the 1908 Jack County Youth Corn Show was a great success.

From this sprang thousands of Texas Corn clubs. Soon thereafter girls were encouraged to grow tomatoes, can and sell them as a Canning Club project. This program exploded across the state. These two movements were the beginnings of Texas and National 4-H. An organization that has grown from a meager one hundred and eleven members in one county in one state to 3 million boys and girls in 50 states. World-wide membership of 4-H is over 5 million boys and girls.

The basic organization of 4-

H is on the county level. Eastland County has approximately 250 4-H club boys and girls enrolled. A large number of these boys and girls live in rural areas; however, more than one-third of them live inside city limits. The changing face of 4-H is toward a larger urban membership with projects that can be conducted in the limited space that is available in cities.

The 4-H program is designed to help young people learn practical skills in a wide variety of projects (over 100 in number). They learn to apply the latest scientific facts to discover the "why" as well as the "how" of what they do. At the same time they enjoy friendships and recreation.

Developing character, leadership abilities, and good citizenship are the long range goals of 4-H. The projects are used as a means whereby an individual can acquire these traits. By using this method of teaching youngsters like what is also good for them.

By acquiring good citizenship traits through 4-H boys and girls, influence adults who in turn influence the community and in this subtle way Youth Develop The Nation. Do you or does your son or daughter have some interest or hobby in which more knowledge about the subject would be desirable? Then contact your county agents office and see if you and 4-H can learn from each others experiences.

4-H-ers Place Stock In Show

Eastland County 4-H-ers Larry Farnsworth, Caryn Lee, and Lynne Pippen placed their respective animals in the Junior Livestock Show of the State Fair of Texas held Oct. 14-19. The steers belonging to Caryn Lee and Lynne Pippen were Eastland County bred calves. Jimmie Lee was the breeder of Caryn's steer, and Irvin Pippen was the breeder of Lynne's steer. For the first time all the steers taken to a major show were bred within the boundaries of Eastland County. This is a marked change and foretells of the rise in quality of cattle being raised within the county. Larry Farnsworth's heifer was bred by Luther

McClung at Sipe Springs.

The placings yielded \$66 in prize money and were as follows: Caryn Lee — 3rd place middle weight Crossbred Steer and blue ribbon classification; Lynne Pippen — 20th place middle weight Hereford and blue ribbon classification; and Larry Farnsworth — 11th place Angus Early Senior Heifer calf. According to Bob Cohen, Asst. Co. Agent, the exhibitors did a good job with their calves at the State Fair.

Mohair Industry Is Important In Eastland County

Texas 1966 mohair production totaled 28,770,000 pounds value at \$15,536,000 compared with 31,548,000 pounds valued at \$20,845,000 in 1965. Texas produced 97 per cent of all U. S. mohair.

On Jan. 1, 1967, Texas had 4,053,000 goats valued at \$21,076,000 as compared with 4,222,000 and \$27,710,000 in 1966.

There is over 400 goat ranchers in Eastland County with a production of over one million pounds of mohair produced in the last two years.

The price for mohair now is 35 cents for adults and one dollar per pound for kid.

Eastland County has two mohair dealers to serve the ranchers. They are C.P. Cloud and Rippy Brothers and Ratliff Feed and Seed of Ranger.

These county buyers sell to two major companies in the United States. The companies that buy the mohair are Fortan, Dupond and Sawyer of Boston, Mass. and Collin and

Robath, also of Boston, plus various other smaller organizations.

The average adult goat will produce from ten to 12 pounds of mohair per year and from four to seven pounds from kid goats per year.

What is the future of mohair. The mohair industry has as grand a future as it has present and past. The mohair is one of the diamond fibers of the world, whose qualities are such that the best clothes cannot be made without it.

The preparation of the clip for the market and the system of marketing must be brought up to date to keep pace with the changing demand of manufacturing principles. Given these foundations, mohair can face the future with confidence.
