Safety Rules For Tornadoes Given By Safety Ass'n.

AUSTIN, May 2. — "For most Texans, no time of the year is quite as pleasant as Spring. It is of small wonder, when you consider the beauty of Bluebonnets, Dogwood and hundreds of other typical Texas flora.

"But, along with these signs of Spring," J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, says, "we can be quickly distracted by other signs of Spring — particularly tornadoes.

"Because this is the time of year when these violent and spectacular storms of nature are most likely to visit us."

Musick pointed out that there isn't really much a person can do to insure himself of complete safety when a tornado is around, unless he happens to be near a cave or underground excavation.

But the safety expert did list a few precautions a person might take that will lessen the danger or serious injury when a storm is in the area, they are:

1. If in open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

2. The southwest corner of the lowest floor, or basement, offers the greatest safety at home. People living in brick or stone houses should seek other shelter, preferably in a storm cellar or the basement of a frame house. If time permits, electricity and fuel lines should be shut off.

3. If at school or in an office building of steel reinforced construction, stay inside away from windows, near an inside wall on a lower floor.

4. Businesses and industrial plants should make advance plans. Employees should know where they can go for the greatest protection.

5. KEEP CALM. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado.

Commissioners Pay Bills, Hear Eastland Group

Paying regular bills was the main business of the County Commissioners when they held their regular bi-monthly meeting Monday in the Eastland Courthouse. County Auditor Earl O'Brien assisted the four commissioners.

Two Eastland men representing the Eastland County Livestock Association appeared before the group and asked for help in having their showrooms and facilities on the shores of Lake Eastland where the county livestock show was held this spring.

They asserted that they needed \$1000 to make necessary improvements, and asked for the help and the cooperation of the court in preserving the tradition of a county show.

Judge John Hart summed up the opinion of the court after a short discussion, stating that some could possibly be made in the county budget for 1959 (to be drawn up in September) to allow for extensive repair and upkeep of the showground buildings and equipment.

A special court of commissioners was called in to try a condemnation suit in the process of securing right-of-way for the new Cisco-Moran highway.

The land, 16.8 acres in a 250 foot wide strip, is located on the J. W. Youngren Estate some 10 miles northwest of Cisco. The heirs to the estate were so many and scattered that there seemed no alternative but "friendly" condemnation of the strip of land needed for the highway, officials pointed out.

In correspondence with the only interested heir that could be located, the Highway Department received her approval of the proceeding.





Examinations For DPS Jobs To Be Given in Late May

"Young men interested in becoming an enforcement officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety have an excellent opportunity if they can qualify," said Major Wilson E. Speir today. "There now exists 121 vacancies for patrolmen in the four field services, Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Drivers License, and Motor Vehicle Inspection. The application deadline is May 9 and examinations will be held in Midland, Abilene, and San Angelo on May 19, 20, 21 respectively." Processing time of about two to three weeks for men between the ages of 21 and 35 should submit their applications at once," said Major Speir. Unfilled applications may be obtained at any local DPS office or at the local office of the Texas Employment Commission.

Additional qualifications include being not less than 63 nor more than 76 inches in height, of good moral character and weight not less than two or more than three pounds per inch of height. The applicant must have a high school education and be in good physical condition.
