Savings Bonds," Arthur E. Fogle of Internal Reve-nue Service, Abilene, reminded method.

Asked about Savings Bonds held beyond maturity, Mr. Fogle said, that if a taxpayer owning Series E Bonds wishes to hold them beyond maturity they will continue earning interest for ten more years, or until they are cashed, whichever is earlier.

Omar Burleson Ouotes On Farming

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Last year at the end of the session, Congress passed a Farm Bill filled with "hope." Few people were really for it, and many of us in the Congress involved in the fight were doubtful then, and still doubtful, as to its effects. The fact remained it was the only bill which could be passed and ap-proved by the President. Obviously, something more is needed. Just what we will be able to do in this session remains to be seen.

A few days ago Secretary of Agriculture Benson told the Congress he is ready to toss in the towel and give up the battle to support farm prices and control production. "Why," he asks, "continue a program that is bankrupt?"

It is a perfectly good question he asks, but the question as to "who and what got us this way," is also justified, and that question should be directed to Mr. Benson. The Secretary says the way to

correct this situation is to let farm prices seek their law of supply and demand level. "It doesn't make sense," he says, "to pay farmers to produce for the Gov-ernment."

Both the President's message and Mr. Benson leaves the impression that a large share of the estimated cost of \$7½ billion for the Farm Program this year will go to the farmer.

As a matter of fact, it figures mean anything at all, the farmer himself will receive very little of this huge figure.

Farming costs -- prices paid by farmers for wages, machinery and other necessary production items - are expected to increase this year over.1958 by a billion dol-lars or more. At the same time, income from farm produce is esti-mated to decline by about the same amount. ...

Farm prices have gone down approximately 20 per cent. If farm products had risen by as much as the cost of things the farmer has had to buy since 1952, consumers would be paying at least \$10 hillion a year more for their food and clothing than they pay at the present time.

One thing on which we can agree with the Secretary of Ag-riculture: If the Farm Program is not going bankrupt, the average-size farmer is. It is time some answers are found to this situation.
