Millionaire Claims that He Was Tricked Out Of Fortune

claring that he was tricked out of his entire fortune of six million dollars, William Barth, eightyfour years of age, a real estate operator, filed suit today to recov. er his money, alleging conspiracy between his widow, Barth's son and Frank E. Brookman, her new husband.

Brookman is in charge of Barth's largest holding company and Mrs. Brookman is general trustee of the aged millionaire's estate.

Barth has secured a temporary injunction restraining Brookman and his wife from interferring in the funds of the estate.

To Examine Morgan's Accounts

WASHINTON, May 26.—Every book of J. P. Morgan and the personal accounts of the late J. P. Morgan, touching in any way on the New York New Haver, and Hartford high finance investigation will be thoroughly examined by the Interstate Commerce Com-

Experts are to be sent to New York at once by the commission, thus accepting the offer of Morgan made last night and his beclaration that the books will disprove Charles S. Mellen's testimony before the commission.

Joseph Folk, directing the inquiry for the commission, denied today that President Wilson halt. ed the inquiry, but announced that he will observe Secretary McReynolds' request and not examine persons who might be giver immunity for federal prosecutions.

Presumably to permit an examin ation of Morgan's books, the inquiry was postponed until June 3d. Simultaneously the Lewis Cass Ledyards' subpoenae was cancelled and he accepted the proposition to testify voluntary and waive immunity.



TUNNELS IN HEART

OF MEXICAN CITY

-That the heart of Vera Cruz is a vertable honeycomb has just been discovered by the American forces occupying the port. Subbuildings within several squares! of the Plaza. The blue jackets under Admiral Fletcher discovered on the first day that the roofs of all the houses in a block were so connected that snipers might be a considerable distance away from the spot from which shots were fired by the time the sailor boys entered the house.

The discovery of the underground passages supplementing the inter-roof communications ex plained why the men from the ships were unable to capture the snipers who fired on them. During the two days of actual fighting and the several days of desuitory sniping thereafter, the bluejackets and marines were fre ment ly mystified by the complete disappearance of the men they knew fired on them, or else the sudden appearance of the men in some other house, unarmed, no weapons to be found and smiling in friendly fashion, meanwhile uttering whole volleys of "amigos."

Early in the game it was discovered that there were innumerable passages from roof to roof, by which the Mexicans would scurry away when their sniping point of vantage was discovered. Frequently, when the Americans discovered a roof from which shots were being fired, they would storm the house and search it. 

ELECTED DISTRICT RESERVE ELECTOR

In accordance with the Federal Reserve Act, The Federal Reserve Bank Organization Committee des ignated five member banks, The First National Bank, Shreveport, La., Union National Bank, Houston, Frost National Bank, San Antonio, First National Bank, El Paso, Durant National Bank, Durant, Okla., all located in Dallas District No. 11, and the representatives of said bank met in Dallas, on May 18th, 1914, to execute a certificate of organization, and filed same with the comptroller of currency. The organization committee has classified the banks of each district into three groups, each group containing as nearly as possible one-third the aggregate number of banks, consisting of bánks of similar capitalization.

Each member bank has instructed to call a meeting of its board of directors, and to elect a "district reserve elector" whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates and elect directors for the Federal Reserve Banks in Class A and B. The Board of Directors of The Federal Reserve Bank shall consist of nine members, divided into Classes A, B and C.

Class A directors to consist of three members to be chosen by member banks and to be representatives of the banks, but not necessarily officers, directors or stockholders of any bank.



offer of \$75, for them, and we understand also refused an offer of \$2.50 per head for them, or \$92.50 for the lamb crop from these old cullews. More than that he has clipped from them 336 pounds of wool which we can safely count at 15 cents per yound, making \$50.40 more to be added to the increase. From the original flock he has lost 3 head leaving him 47, and these 47 head of ewes are worth more today than when he bought them because they are all fat enough for mutton and in good healthy condition. So we might say he has his original investment and a profit of \$92.50 in lambs, and \$50 in wool, or from an investment of \$82.50 he has realized \$142.50. The expense has been met by his own labor and with surplus weeds and oat pasture that would have otherwise gone to waste.

That it would pay every farmer to own a small flock of seep is clearly demonstrated by the above statement of facts.—Talpa Post.
