 VERA CRUZ, Mex., May 27.—Emissaries of Dictator Huerta have asked Brigadier General Funston whether the dictator would be allowed within the American lines, is a report which is in circulation here today. ## Another Conference Tomorrow

 NIAGARA FALLS, May 27.—Conversations between the Mediators and the American and Mexican envoys have been so favorable that another full conference will possibly be held tomorrow. This is expected to execute the way for an early settlement of the future of Mexico.

No disagreements have yet occurred, following the reports of differences over land problem. It was stated on the highest of authority that this question is the least of the troubles confronting mediators. It is accepted that land reforms must be enacted in Mexico. Otherwise, pacification is impossible.

Any provisional government which may be established has pledged themselves to land reforms for which the revolutionists have been fighting.

## MAY RAINS BREAK 20 YEAR RECORD

Those who kept an eye on the weather Tuesday night expected to learn of much damage from the heavy rain that fell during the night, and the fall at Ballinger was the greatest for any one time during the year, and the low lands in Ballinger were lakes of water Wednesday morning, and in several houses in the southern part of the town the water swept the floors.

Reports from over the county indicate that the rains were not general and no serious damage to crops has been reported. Perhaps the heaviest rain was northeast of Ballinger and washed out considerable road bed between Ballinger and Taipa, and delayed the trains for several hours. The rain was

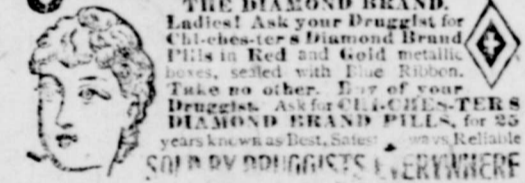
**MRS. ORGAIN ENTERTAINS**

### Jelly Roll Recipe

Only Two Eggs Required

By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine

This Jelly Roll is fast becoming very popular on account of the way it keeps fresh. With proper handling it should keep fresh a whole week, providing it isn't eaten up in the meantime, for it is every bit as good as it looks.



**K C Jelly Roll**  
One cup sifted flour; scant half teaspoonful salt; 2 level teaspoonfuls K C Baking Powder; grated rind of 1 lemon; 2 eggs beaten light; 1 cup sugar; 1/2 cup hot milk; glass of jelly; powdered sugar.

Beat the sugar into the eggs; add the lemon rind, then the flour, sifted three times with the salt and baking powder; and, lastly, the milk. Bake in a buttered dripping pan; turn out on a damp cloth, trim off the crisp edges, spread with jelly and turn over and over into a roll while still warm. Dredge the top with powdered sugar.

Hot milk used in the jelly roll enables it to be rolled without danger of cracking. Have the milk scalding hot, also be careful to have the eggs and sugar beaten together until very light and creamy. Bake in a moderate oven.
