WASHINGTON, May 27.—Gen. Funston has been instructed from the war department to delegate Gen. Pershing to represent the United States in a conference with General Gavia, and to join Funston in discussing with the Mexican governor a plan for withdrawing the American troops from Mexico.

CHURCH STANDS FOR ENFORCED PEACE

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Delegates to the national convention of the militant League to Enforce Peace, which they hope will result in a league of nations, to keep international peace just as a police department keeps municipal peace—by force, will this evening hear James Cardinal Gibbons discuss "What The Churches Have At Stake In The Success of The League."

Philip H. Gadsden of Charleston S. C.; J. Mott Hollowell of Boston and Theodore Marburg of Baltimore, former minister to Belgium, spoke today on organization; Herbert S. Houston of New York, president of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, on publicity, while finance was spoken of by Charles S. Ward, of New York, secretary of the international committee of the Y. M. C. A.

Benjamin Ide Wheeler of Berkeley, California, opened this afternoon a discussion of general league topics. Nehemiah Boynton of Brooklyn closed the discussion. Other speakers are: President Lovell of Harvard; Harry A. Wheeler of Chicago; Franklin H. Giddings of New York and Shailer Matthews of Chicago, president of the Federal Council of Churches.

DESERTERS TRIAL SET JUNE 1ST

SAN ANTONIO, May 27.—Gen. Funston was notified today that the department had agreed upon six regular army officers and eight militia officers, to constitute the court martial to try the Texas militia slackers. The trial is set to begin June 1st.

Major Winshop, of the Texas Militia will preside, Col. Miller, of the regular army, will serve as judge advocate, and a speedy trial will be conducted and proper punishment assessed against the militiamen who failed to respond to the call for the state guard.

Some of the accused are preparing to fight their cases, while others are expected to enlist and make effort to have charges dismissed.

STANLEY MOVES HIS DAM SITE

Robert Lee, Texas, May 26.—C. M. Stanley, the irrigation dam promoter, who has been in the country for the past three years making a survey of the Colorado river valley, spoke here last night. The substance of his speech was, that he had concluded that it is not practical to build an irrigation dam on the river, 13 miles below this place—as he first planned to do. But he finds a sight 15 miles above here, which is a much more desirable place, for the reason that the elevation is 200 feet higher, and the natural advantages are better in every way for such a site. Also a much larger scope of country will get better advantages than they would have, if the large dam had been built near Bronte, where it was first proposed. Mr. Stanley asks for assistance from Robert Lee and surrounding country, to help promote this great cause. Following Mr. Stanley's speech, a mass meeting to be held at the court house on next Saturday, May 20, to determine upon some method of procedure.

If put through, this will be an immense thing for Robert Lee and Coke county. It is presumed that there will be a hearty response to Mr. Stanley's request, for this country cannot well afford to allow such an opportunity to slip by. By irrigating and utilizing the many, many acres of now unused land along this river—it will mean untold wealth to this entire country.

LUCKETT ENLARGES HIS BUSINESS

A. P. Lockett, manager of the Miles Hardware Co., informs the editor that the construction of a large sheet iron warehouse 36 by 111 feet will be under way in a few days on the vacant lot fronting Second street, opposite Floyd Smith's blacksmith shop. The front end of the building will be occupied by the company's tin shop and the rear will be used to store implements in.

Mr. Lockett stated that the building of this warehouse was necessitated by the increase of his farm implement business which has about doubled that of a year ago. Other business changes are contemplated by Mr. Lockett, but which are not ready for publication now.—Miles Messenger.

ATTEMPT TO INCITE MEXICANS

NAMIQUIPA, Mexico, May 27.—A search of the bodies of the bandits killed by the American troops in the attack made by Candelrie Cervantes, last Thursday, brought to light the most bitter proclamation against the American expedition. Cervantes had a copy of the proclamation in his pocket, which was written in terms calculated to incite the Mexicans to an uprising against all "gringos." By the death of Cervantes the Americans feel that it will now be easy to disperse the bandits operating in the Namiquipa district.

J. D. Smith, of the Wingate country, motored over to Ballinger Friday to get young Madison Hinkle who was badly scalded while out on a fishing trip and was left here for treatment.

ELECTRIC ENGINEERS PLANNING NEW LINE

R. J. Irvin, general manager of the Ballinger Light & Power Co., arrived here Saturday and began at once to aid the local manager, W. F. Treadwell to plan for the installing of the new power and light plant for Ballinger. Mr. Irvin is accompanied by Ballinger by Ed. Burrow, chief engineer for the company, and the preliminary work will be rapidly pushed, and actual building began as soon as the material is received.

The new improvements for the local plant consist in the extension cables out of this city to Winters and Rowena, the big high powered transmission lines supplying power to those points.

Gasoline and steam power in this section will be replaced with electric power, a number of gins along the lines leading out of Ballinger having contracted with the electric power company for power to operate the gins, and the work will be completed in time to handle the big cotton crop that now seems to be a certainty.

It is also probable that the city will connect its water supply plant with the power line and use electric power for pumping at a big saving to the city.

In coming into this territory the Interstate Electric Corporation, which owns the local plant, will bring a greater benefit to the small towns than with the city of Ballinger where a continuous current has been supplied for quite a number of years. By extending transmission lines to Winters and Rowena those places will be given the same modern conveniences that Ballinger people enjoy and can press the button for power and lights any time of the day and any day in the year and all the time, and the current will be sufficient for moving anything from a sewing machine to a street car.

When interviewed by a Ledger reporter and asked how soon active work would begin on the new improvements, Mr. Irvin said, "just as soon as the material arrives." Mr. Irvin stated that the material was en route to Ballinger and would be here by the 15th of June, and the transmission line completed into Rowena by July 15th.

"Our deal for the Winters plant and for the Ballinger ice plant is practically closed," stated Mr. Irvin and we will take charge of these within four or five days, probably by the first of the month."

A. F. Roberts, the present manager of the Winters plant and one of the principle owners, will manage the business for awhile at the Winters end of the line, and W. J. Carmony, will continue to manage the ice plant for the present at least.

WAITE'S FATE IN HANDS OF JURY

NEW YORK, May 27.—The fate of Dr. Arthur Waite is in the hands of the jury, the case going to the jury this morning. The state made a strong demand in its argument of the case before the jury asking that he dentist poisoner be given the death penalty and sent to the electric chair. Dr. Waite is charged with the murder of the Peeks, his father-in-law and mother-in-law, killing them in order that he might get possession of their money.

LOCAL PRESS GETS 55,000 BALES COTTON

For the fiscal year ending May first, the Texas Compress Co., handled about 55,000 bales at its Ballinger press, and the year was declared a very successful one for first year of the new press. It will be remembered that the press was destroyed by fire here during the previous year and this was the first year for the new press that replaced the old one.

Manager Calloway stated, when called on for figures, Saturday that about 4000 bales had been pressed on the new year's run, or since May first. The work for the new year is starting out under the most favorable conditions and with the splendid cotton crop prospects for the present year the compress will be able to make a record breaking run.

The local press is one of the most modern and best equipped in Texas, and Ballinger is fortunate in being able to concentrate such a large amount of cotton here for pressing.

Nath Allen was down town Friday afternoon and says he has just finished sheep shearing and will have his wool stored in the warehouse in Ballinger in a few days.

NEWS FROM VERDUN IS CONFLICTING

LONDON, May 27.—The latest reports from the Verdun front says that the French have made good gains around the village of Cumieres. Berlin reports admit that the French gained the control of the village and surrounding trenches, but claims that the French troops were later repulsed and the Germans recovered the lost territory with heavy losses to the French in men killed and wounded.

SLAUGHTERING QUAIL OUT OF SEASON

Preston Dunn, of the Spring Hill community, was marketing fruit in Ballinger Saturday and reported that some one had been killing quail in his community. Mr. Dunn found the feathers and heads of the birds near the road where the hunters had dressed their game. The game law governing the killing of quail is a strict one and is in the hands of both the state and federal officers and it will no doubt be interesting for the guilty party or parties if apprehended. A law should not be necessary to keep a man from killing quail at this season of the year, as it is breeding season, and the killing of one quail at this season means the loss of a whole covey.
