View Greatest Naval Battle Philosophically

The Brownwood Bulletin states that the total pressing for the Brownwood compress for the fiscal year just closed figures 51,000 bales. This is about 3,000 bales less than the Ballinger receipts, but does very well for Brownwood.

5000 LIVES \$60,000,000 TOTAL LOSS

LONDON, June 3.—The greatest sea battle in the world's history, fought May 31, resulted in the destruction of more than \$60,000,000 worth of warships. Of this amount the British loss, according to the London admiral's official report, is \$46,000,000. This is irrespective of the loss caused to ships which were damaged.

The amount of the German loss is indefinite because the cruiser Wiesbaden is not listed in any naval almanac and is undoubtedly one of the vessels constructed since the outbreak of the war. The fact that a number of craft are still missing adds further to the indefiniteness of the Teuton loss. It can be estimated, however, at about \$15,000,000.

The British ships declared lost by London, cost to build as follows:

Queen Mary, \$10,392,455.
Indefatigable, \$7,683,845.
Invincible, \$8,844,975.
Defence, \$6,918,720.
Black Prince, \$5,967,070.
Total, \$39,807,065.

The destroyers Tipperary, Turbulent, Fortune, Sparrow, Hawk and Ardent cost approximately \$1,250,000 each to build. This brings the total British loss to about \$46,000,000.

The German ships lost, according to Berlin, cost as follows:
Pommern, \$6,070,000.
Frauenlob, \$1,500,000.
Total, \$7,570,000.
Wiesbaden cost unknown.

AUTO TURNS TURTLE; YOUNG MAN INJURED

While en route to San Angelo, and when about ten miles from that city Friday afternoon Doyle Parnell was the victim of an auto accident that left him considerably "bumped up," but not seriously injured. Mr. Parnell was in the car with three or four other young men and were said to be driving along at a moderate speed when the car turned over. The breaking of a radius rod was said to be responsible for the accident. The injured man was carried on into San Angelo, and at last report was getting along alright.

REEDER AND COHEN CONSOLIDATE SHOWS

Beginning Monday Ballinger will have only one picture show, but that the best what is. At least the movies in Ballinger will be under one management, and the public entertained at the White City and the Queen, just as the weather and the occasion demands.

A deal was made on June 1st, and made public Saturday morning, in which Roy Reeder and L. Cohen, proprietors of the local play houses, form a partnership, consolidating the Princess, Queen and White City Theatres.

The forming of such partnership will be the closing of the Queen Theatre with the exception of Saturday night, when both the Queen and White City will open as heretofore, and on Saturday afternoon the usual Saturday matinee will be given at the Queen, a continuous show being in progress from two o'clock in the afternoon until late Saturday night. The building formerly used by the Princess will be closed, and probably rented for some other line of business.

For some time Messrs. Reeder and Cohen have realized that two shows operating in Ballinger could not succeed here. The class of pictures used by the local houses were the best possible to get all things considered, and this being true of course were an expensive drain necessitating a liberal patronage for the boys to break even.

By consolidating the two shows the expenses will be cut down, and at the same time a better class program maintained. Both Messrs. Cohen and Reeder will be actively engaged in the business, and will be on the job for the best entertainment possible. The style of the new firm will be Reeder-Cohen Theatres.

While nothing positive has been announced as to what program and features would be used at the White City on the six day run, and the Queen on Saturdays, it is known that several satisfactory offers have been made by manufacturers and distributors of the best motion pictures. Tentative plans for the present will be the completion of existing contracts.

The serials, "The Strange Case of Mary Page," "Peg O' the Ring," "Graft," and "The Iron Claw," will be completed, and other good serials will take the places of these running.

Tempting offers have been made the new concern by Paramount, Mutual, Universal, General, V-L-S-E, World, Metro, Fox, Kleine, and others to furnish a much better program than is now being run by either house, and it is likely a picked program from several of these will be made.

HALF MILLION GERMANS TO SALUTE FLAG

NEW YORK, June 3.—To demonstrate their patriotism 500,000 German and Austro-Hungarian Americans and their friends will go to Sheepshead Bay Speedway, tomorrow and salute a gigantic American flag composed of 2,000 girls attired in the national colors.

The event is under the auspices of the American Liberty Day Committee and, is intended to impress the country with the love these citizens of foreign birth have for the flag and the welfare of the United States.

There will be exhibitions by turners and mass calisthenics of 3,000 men and women members of the clubs in the North American Turner Band and chorus singing 18,000 children of German congregation.

A special program of daylight fireworks is listed, and a parade with floats will illustrate a number of great examples of Germans who, from Revolutionary days have been of great importance in shaping the course of the American Republic.

PITTSBURGH HONORS MEMORY OF COMPOSER OF "OLD BLACK JOE"

PITTSBURGH, June 3.—Not the least interesting part of tomorrow's celebration in this city will be the formal opening of the Stephen C. Foster home, dedicated about a year ago to the city in perpetuation of the composer's name and works.

All day and far into the evening a band will play his songs on "The Lave," "Old Black Joe," "Swanee River," "Nellie Gray," "My Old Kentucky Home," and other favorites he wrote will be played.

The piano that Foster frequently used and a score of other interesting relics have been loaned indefinitely to the city by his descendants and will be attractive ly placed in the house.

SMILEY SELLS HIS BIG FARM NEAR WINTERS

34 BRITISH VESSELS IN NORTH SEA FIGHTING

BERLIN, June 3.—Admiral Scheer commanded the Germans in the naval battle of the North Sea on May 31. Admiral Scheer has reported to the German government that thirty-five British vessels engaged in the battle, and of this number nineteen were lost. No statement has been made as to the number of Germans lost.

It is expected that the Kaiser will personally decorate Admiral Scheer and his sailors for their heroic and successful work.

LONDON, June 3.—The British Admiralty announced today that the British superdreadnaught Warspite was not destroyed in the naval engagement with the Germans.

The British view the battle in the most philosophical way, as the German ships in action on this occasion outclassed the British cruisers, making their escape when the heavier English vessels appeared on the scene of action.

London, June 3.—Four thousand English were lost in the German-British naval battle in the North Sea May 31. The dead include Admirals Hood and Arbuthnot. The men all lost their lives in defense of the Battleship Indefatigable and the Black Prince. It is feared the total dead will number five thousand when the smaller vessels are heard from.

The British Admiralty also admit that the torpedo destroyers Shark, Nomal and Nestor are also lost in the battle.

The German superdreadnaught Hindenburg, the greatest of all fighting vessels, is reported to have gone down in the battle.

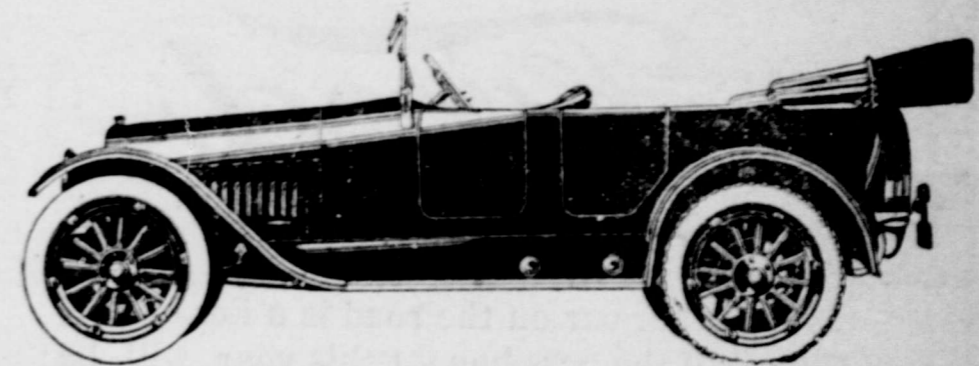
The German cruiser Ebling has been added to the list of ships destroyed.
