T. R. MAY SUPPORT GEN. WOOD

NEW YORK, June 6.—Visitors from the Republican National Convention at Chicago today say that Colonel Roosevelt has declared that he would support Major General Wood for the presidency if the latter was seriously mentioned at the convention. This announcement is causing a great deal of speculation here, and some believe that Roosevelt is preparing for his defeat.

CHRISTIAN REVIVAL

It is generally understood that Monday night is a bad night in a meeting, but the order was reversed last night, at the open-air meeting place where the revival is being conducted by the Christian Church; for there was not only a good attendance, but the interest was fine, and the audience seemed very appreciative of both the song service and the sermon.

Attention was also called to the fact that God the Father made its appeal to men through prophets of old; then through His Son in His personal ministry; and, now, He has made His complete, last, strongest appeal through the Holy Spirit, presentation of a crucified redeemer for men, and when this has been rejected, there is no other appeal to make, and man is lost.

An earnest appeal was made to the careless and indifferent not to allow themselves to drift into this condition, and a striking illustration was used to show the great danger of doing so, and to warn them against such danger.

TORNADO IN ARKANSAS KILLS 80

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

HERE'S MORE TALK ABOUT THE DEVIL

EL PASO, June 6.—Things went to the Devil in Texas newspaper offices today, while the editors flocked here for the annual convention of the Texas Press Association. While the Devil, the urchin of the print-shop held sway in the editorial sanctum, welding the shears and paste brush the "bosses" got down to a course of business and social engagements arranged during the last few weeks by busy committees.

Speeches, about forty of them, on subjects of deep interest to the pilots of the Lone Star Press are carded for delivery during the three days the editors are to be in session.

Joe J. Taylor, of the Dallas News, will deliver a talk expected to touch the true spirit of Texas newspapermen, both as to editorial policy and as to the handling of news. "Characteristics of the Texas Press" is the subject of Taylor's address.

Advertising, editorials, circulation, plant management, and news problems will be thoroughly covered in an address by other speakers, some of them invited from other states. C. H. Abbott of Dallas, has prepared a lengthy discourse of the newspaper to the corporation. Abbot takes the point of view that such institution has not entirely the other's good. He will encourage more cordial relations between the press and corporation as a means of mutual benefit.

C. B. Gillespie of the Houston Chronicle, A. M. Lukor of the Grapeline Messenger and John E. Cooks of the Rockdale Reporter, are the men assigned to discuss news problems for the convention. Their addresses are expected to present a comprehensive review of the news situation in the small town and the large city.

PRESIDENT CHINA DEAD FROM POISON?

WASHINGTON, June 6.—According to official dispatches emanating from Peking today President Yan Shi Kai of the Chinese Republic is dead. It is also unofficially reported that the Chinese president was poisoned by revolutionists.

Other towns may arrange to have the film shown by applying to the State Board.

Fort Worth, June 6.—The Ft. Worth Central High School will hold the annual commencement exercises tonight in the school auditorium.

One hundred and four graduates will receive diplomas from Dr. Clay Johnson, president of the School Board, and a number of scholarships awards will also be made. The High School orchestra will render a musical program.

LONDON, June 6.—

General Kitchener and his staff who were killed this morning on board the British cruiser Hampshire were en route to the Russian capital, Petrograd. The passengers perished when the vessel was either mined or torpedoed according to the British official report, which does not state how the ship sunk.

The news of the disaster has stunned London, and strong invectives mingle with tears over the casualty. The Hampshire carried a crew of six hundred and fifty-five men. Kitchener was war minister for Great Britain.

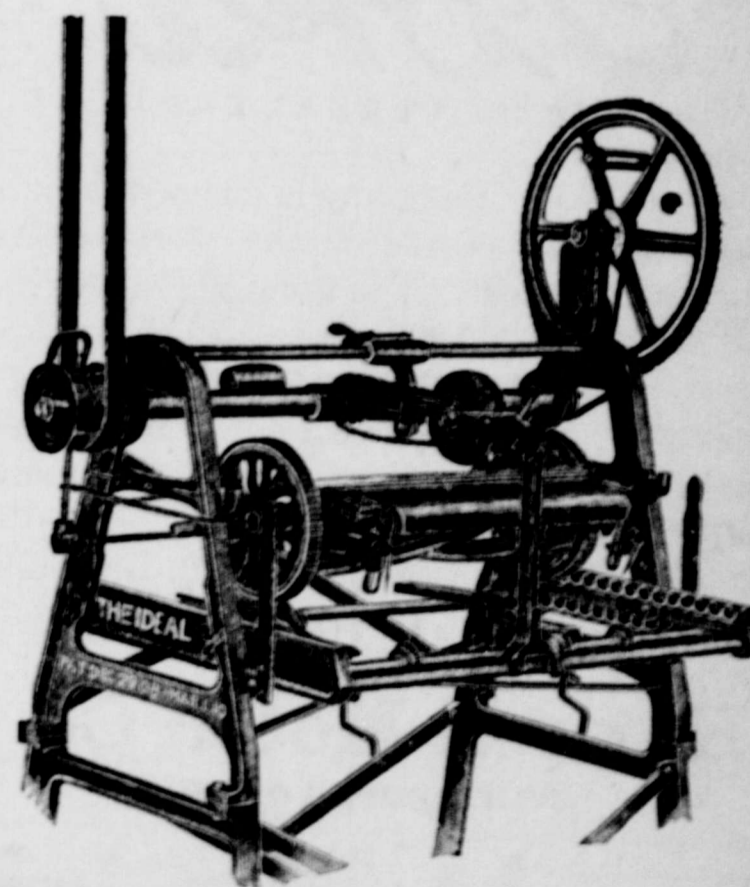

WILL CUT RED TAPE FOR WAGE EARNERS

NEW YORK, June 5.—A night court where wage-earners can secure the prompt settlement of suits involving small sums will be opened in this city tonight.

It will be held hereafter four times each week, on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, from 8 to 11 p. m. Branches will be established in the various boroughs as needed.

This aid for persons who can least afford to suffer from the law's delays was finally secured without the passage of a bill from Albany which would make it mandatory.

Mayor Mitchel recognized that the authority to set up such a court was already vested in the Board of Justices.

Directly the Judges took definite action to provide the court for all the boroughs the Mayor vetoed the Albany bill.

There are enough Justices to divide the work in such manner as shall prevent the extra duties from weighing too heavily on them.



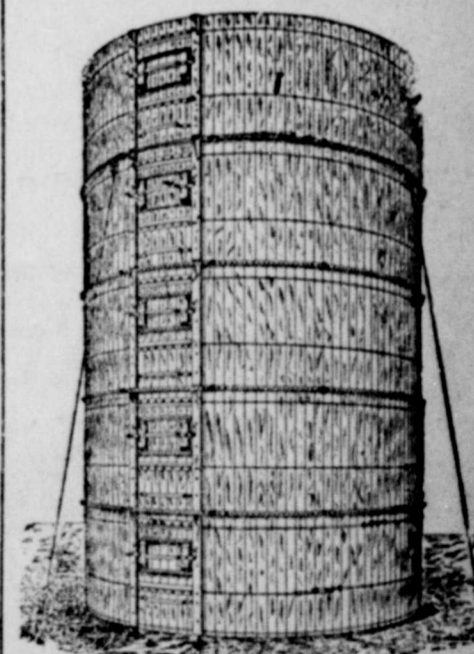
