82,000 Veterans' **Widows Are Due** Pension Increase

More than 82,000 widows of U. S. Veterans of wars before World War I will receive increases in their Veterans Administration pensions next month, Mr. Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA regional office in Dallas, Texas said today.

The wars concerned, Mr. Onstot explained, are the Spanish-American War, Indian Wars, Civil War, and the Mexican War of

The increases, which will range from \$7.27 to \$12.50 per month and will be reflected in the pension checks mailed out at the end of July ,are authorized by Public Law 85-425.

Slated for increases are all didows of veterans of the Spanish-American War or the Mexican War of 1846-1848, who are receiving VA pension.

Also charing in the increase

will be most -- but not all -- widows of Civil or Indian Wars veterans. Mr. Onstot pointed out that the law does not provide an increase for such widows who are less than 70 years of age.

Mr. Onstot emphasized that widows already on the agency's pension rolls need take no action to get the raise. It will be paid automatically.

Caution Urged In Driving During July 4th Weekend

CHICAGO. JUNE 19 - Fortyfive million blind drivers - mo-mentarily blind, that is - will be on the nation's highways over the Fourth of July weekend, the National Safety Council said to-

The Council explains that the average person blinks his eyes 25 times a minute and the blink lasts an average of one-fifth of a second. So, if a driver averages 40 miles an hour on a 10-hour motor trip, he will drive almost 35 miles of the trip with his eyes closed.

"Such statistics don't mean a thing," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council, "except that an accident can happen in the wink of an eye - as 371 persons who died in traffic over the Memorial Day weekend found out too late. The toll dramatically points up the need for extra driving caution when traffic is at a peak. The fourth, which comes during the peak of the threemonth vacation season, usually brings more deaths from traffic

accidents than Memorial Day." The most dangerous period for

Increased Pay Due Some Under New Military Pay Bill

Many widows of veterans who died of service-connected causes will receive increased survivor benefit payments from Veterans Adminstration as a result of new military pay bill which became effective June 1, 1958.

Mr. Edward P. Onstot, Acting

manager of the VA regional office in Dallas, Texas said that, in most cases, such widow's benefit payments are related to the basic pay of a serviceman whose rank and years of service are the same as those of the deceased veteran.

However, he pointed out, the new military pay bill does not increase basic pay of all servicemen; thus it will not affect surivor benefit payments to all idows whose veteran husbands ed of service-connected causes. Of widows entitled to increases,

Mr. Onstot estimated 90 percent vould receive an additional benefit of from \$1 to \$3 per month. Since each case must be indi-cidually examined, it will take everal months to adjust accounts of all widows entitled to the in-

reased payments. Widows already on VA rolls need take no action to receive any increase to which the new law may entitle them. It will be paid automatically he emphasized, and will be retroactive to June 1,

Therefore, he urged, widows should not write to VA about their cases.

Widows receiving VA posion for the nonservice - connected deaths of their husbands are NOT affected in any way by the new law, he added.

While the rice is cooking, melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Add the onion and celery. Cook until tender, stirring occasionally. Add onion and celery mixture to the rice and mix in the bread crumbs, egg, salt, poultry seasoning, pepper and broth or water. Stuff lightly into the bird. Do not pack as the stuffing expands during the cooking. Stuff the bird just before it is placed in the oven. Do not stuff and refrigerate. This stuffing, however, may be prepared ahead of time so long as the liquids are not mixed with the dry ingredients until the turkey is to be stuffed and cooked. Extra stuffing can be baked in a separate pan or made into balls. The recipe makes about 6 cups of stuffing. Allow ¾ cup of stuffing for each Allow 4 cup of stuffing for each pound of poultry, dressed weight, or 1 cup for each pound ready-to-cook weight.



Outdoor Cooking

A quick, easy way to prepare the main dish for a pienic or out-door meal is to cook on skewers. "Shisk-Kabobs" are delicious and different.

There are many possibilities. You may have all vegetables or mam, or pore may be used. Allow 1/2 lb. per person. Prepare the meat by brushing with lemon juice and olive oil. Now string the cubes on your skewers — If you like the meat rare, push the cubes closely together. For all around crispness, separate the chunks on the skewer. Broil over coals. It will take from 10 over coals. It will take from 10 to 16 minutes. Serve immediate-

It's June again — and the spotlight is on milk and dairy foods. It's almost impossible to have an adequate diet without milk. All dairy products pro-vide some calcium, but it takes more than one serving of some to equal the calcuim you get in a cup of fluid mild. So eat some dairy food, and drink milk, too.


