PREPARING CALL FOR MORE MEN

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The administration is considering a call for 500,000 volunteers.

Secretary of War Baker, who attended the cabinet meeting late yesterday, declined to make any statement on the subject, but high officers said the announcement of the plan awaits upon news from Gen. Pershing's headquarters.

Officials declared that there are only two alternatives for Carranza. Either he will submit tamely to threats of physical force contained in Secretary Lansing's note or he will call on all Mexicans to make war on the United States.

In the first event the federal army now in Mexico or along the border supplemented by the 100,000 or more national guard troops to go there, will be sufficient to carry out any further waiting and watching policy.

In the second event, officials have decided, it will require probably 500,000 more men to face the situation in Mexico. Reports from General Pershing stated that Mexican people within the sphere of influence of the American army are opposed to Carranza. This condition does not obtain, it was admitted, in territory really controlled by Carranza.

Military experts pointed out that a campaign in Mexico today would not be like that of Gen. Winfield Scott, in which from 6,000 to 10,000 men reduced the country. At that time the peons were not in arms and swearing vengeance against the United States and victories were so decisive there was little guerilla warfare.

The conditions have entirely changed. Various boards have estimated the number of men necessary for a Mexican campaign. The head of one board declared he would not go into Mexico unless he had an initial army of 250,000 and 500,000 volunteers to draw.

TROOP MOVEMENT HELD UP

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Orders for sending new forces to border camps today were held up.

The delay is due to incomplete mobilization of the state militia from points where the war department had indicated that troops would be moved from to border points today. The movement, however, will begin by Thursday.

CANDIDATES PAYING UP READILY.

Judge Doss, chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee, reports that the candidates are coming in with the assessments made against them for expense money for holding the primaries, and that by the end of the week all will have paid their assessments. The time limit in which to pay this assessment is June 25th, Sunday night at twelve o'clock. The assessment must be paid before the candidates can get their name on the ticket.

BLANTON SPEAKER ISSUES CHALLENGE

Hon. Fred Coekrell, of Abilene, is billed to speak at the Queen Theatre in Ballinger Saturday at eleven o'clock. In a letter to The Ledger, Judge Blanton says: "While Judge Coekrell is not seeking a joint debate, yet, if the Smith people should want one and desire to put up a man against him, I feel sure that it would be all right with Judge Coekrell, and he will approve any arrangement made along this line."

BAND BOYS TO PULL NEW ONE

Friday night several little innovations will be handed the Ballinger music loving public by Joe Ward's aggregation.

First the new uniforms bought for the band will be on hand and on "back." Every band boy is to dress up in the regulation blue-black uniform, with the caps to match. Caps will have a tinge of color on them with gold braid the enlivening influence. About thirty new uniforms were secured for the band.

The second important announcement to be offered by the band is that their director, Prof. Joe T. Ward, has composed a new song, a true "blue" song "The Ballinger Blues." This is one the series of blue music numbers and will very likely prove as popular as the others. Prof. Ward has been receiving congratulations on the new piece, and all the boys are boosting it strong. First public appearance of the "Ballinger Blues" will be Friday night.

Next in important announcements given out today by the musicians, is that a new big horn has been purchased by Mr. Troy Simpson. This monster horn is called an Eb base horn, measures 35 inches long, with bells attached and is a satin finish silver lined fellow. J. Harold Tucker will manipulate the new instrument on Friday night's concert at the court house lawn.

REFUGEE TRAIN DELAYED

MEXICO CITY, June 21.—The special train ordered by the American Special Agent Rogers, to take all Americans from this city to safety will not leave today for Vera Cruz as was announced yesterday. The Mexican government officials say that preparation for moving the Americans has not been completed. The delay is causing much anxiety among the Americans who have at last become alarmed at the situation.

AMERICAN TROOPS OUT NUMBERED

EL PASO, June 21.—Gen. Pershing has reported that his scouts have sighted two divisions of the Carranza army advancing slowly in the direction of the positions occupied by the punitive expedition. One division is approaching the line of communication near El Valle. Another is moving westward in the direction of Namiquipa.

The scouting parties have halted and reinforcements are being sent to strengthen their positions. Any further advance by either of the Mexican columns will be resisted by fighting, if necessary.

Lieutenant Colonel Cabell, chief of staff to Gen. Pershing, asking for an additional supply of provisions, has stated that open hostilities are inevitable.

The troops referred to by Gen. Pershing as scouts are in fact two well equipped, well mounted cavalry brigades which have been deployed for ten days as an advance guard for just such an emergency. Each command is supported by a battery of mountain artillery. No serious anxiety is felt here as to the outcome of an engagement, although the Americans are greatly outnumbered.

The Mexican division which is approaching El Valle is estimated at 7,000 men. They mobilized at Villa Ahumada, one the Mexican Central railroad, and began the advance from that point.

In the event of a clash, Gen. Bell will move from El Paso to Juarez and down the line of the Mexican Central railroad to Villa Ahumada. He will cut the railroad at that point to prevent Gen. Trevino from sending reinforcements to the column which is menacing El Valle and Dubian. This Mexican command will not be able to get assistance from any other quarter, as the route they have taken is through a deep canyon.

The Pershing forces on the northern end of the line of communication at Ascension and Corralitos will make a drive for Guzman and cut the Mexican Northwestern railroad as soon as Gen. Bell crosses the river from here.

This plan of campaign will completely bottle up the forces now in Juarez unless Gen. Francisco Serrana, the new commander, makes a hasty exit. And it appears that the Mexican general has already received the tip.

RE-OPEN SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN

BERLIN, June 21.—It was made known here today that Germany would reopen its campaign for a more effective use of its submarines in the war with the British. The submarine advocates of a stronger submarine policy are taking advantage of the growing indifference to American opinion for urging the German government to again use its submarines in blocking British commerce.

The German government depends on its submarines to do its most effective work, it was stated in the German parliament.

MRS. KUYKENDALL WILL RECOVER

The latest report from Brownwood Wednesday stated that Mrs. Kuykendall, the lady who was cut by a Mexican Monday night, was getting along as well as could be expected, and would recover. While the good lady will recover, we regret to note that she will be disfigured for life, the gash in her face being of such nature as to leave her blind in one eye, and with an ugly scar.

Sheriff Perkins returned from Brownwood Wednesday morning where he went to join in the hunt for the Mexican, and he reports that while the people were greatly wrought up over the unfortunate occurrence, that quiet now prevailed.

The Mexican was killed while attempting to shoot Arch Ratliff, a ranchman, ten miles South of Brownwood, who attempted to apprehend him. The first bullet from the ranchman's gun pierced the Mexican's heart, killing him instantly.

LIGHTNING STARTS PRAIRIE FIRE

An electric flash from a little cloud which formed over the Gross ranch on the South side of the Colorado river above Ballinger, late Tuesday afternoon, started a prairie fire that destroyed about 2,000 acres of grass for Judge W. H. Gross.

Wm. Doose Jr., was in that section of the county on business, and was near the point where the lightning struck and saw the fire sweeping across the prairie destroying the grass, but he was helpless to fight the fire alone. He hurriedly reported the fire to the ranch hands and the men battled with the flames until about twelve o'clock Tuesday night before the fire was put under control. In the mean time the fire burning in one direction had reached the road, and burned out, while the hands were fighting the fire from the opposite direction.

Funston Recruiting Six New Regiments

SAN ANTONIO, June 21.—Gen. Funston received instructions from the war department at Washington this afternoon, to recruit four regiments of infantry and two regiments of cavalry for regular service immediately.

Gen. Funston officially denied that a detachment of Pershing's forces had clashed with the Carrancistas at Namiquipa.

COLUMBUS, N. M., June 21.—Carranza troops and soldiers of Gen. Pershing's expeditionary command south of Namiquipa are on the verge of hostilities, according to reports from the field last night. A dispatch from Col. D. C. Cabell, Pershing's chief of staff, said the attitude of the Mexicans was such that American motor truck supply trains are in danger of being fired upon.

The Mexicans are said to have mounted artillery in positions menacing the Americans and dispatches indicated that with the two commands in close proximity, the danger of a clash is increased.

Persistent rumors were current here today that General Pershing has split his command into three columns with each prepared to move in the event of hostilities, while others said that truck trains had been fired upon.

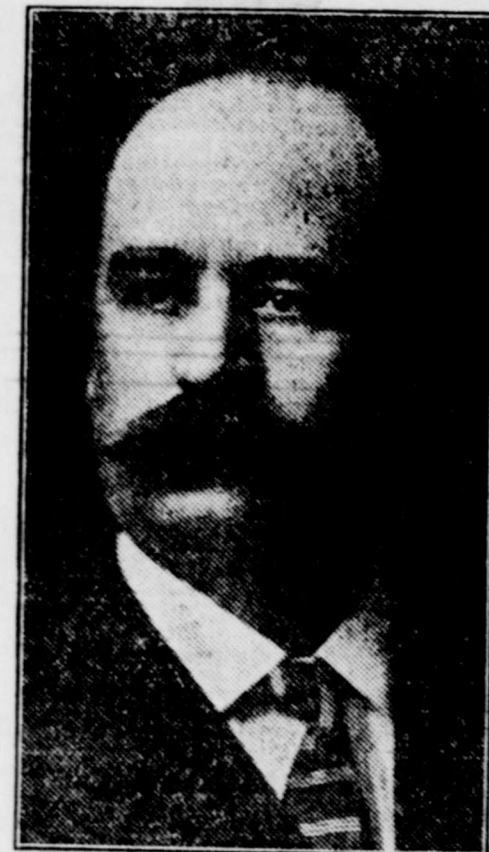

Brooks Opens the Fire Works.



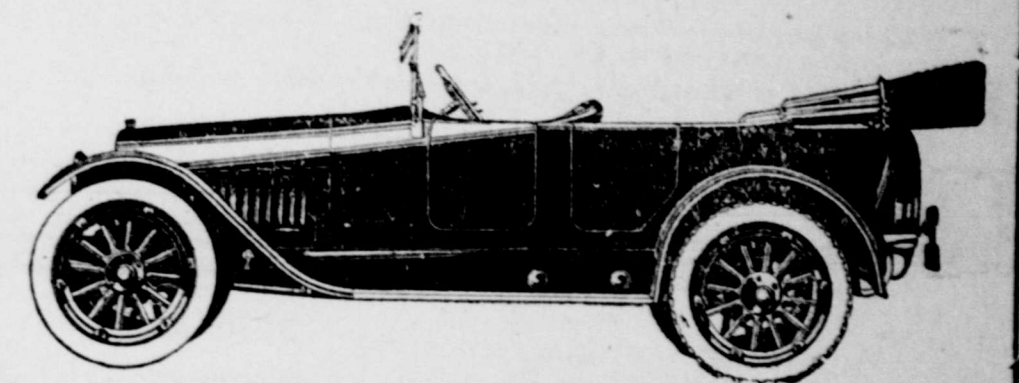
DR. S. P. BROOKS

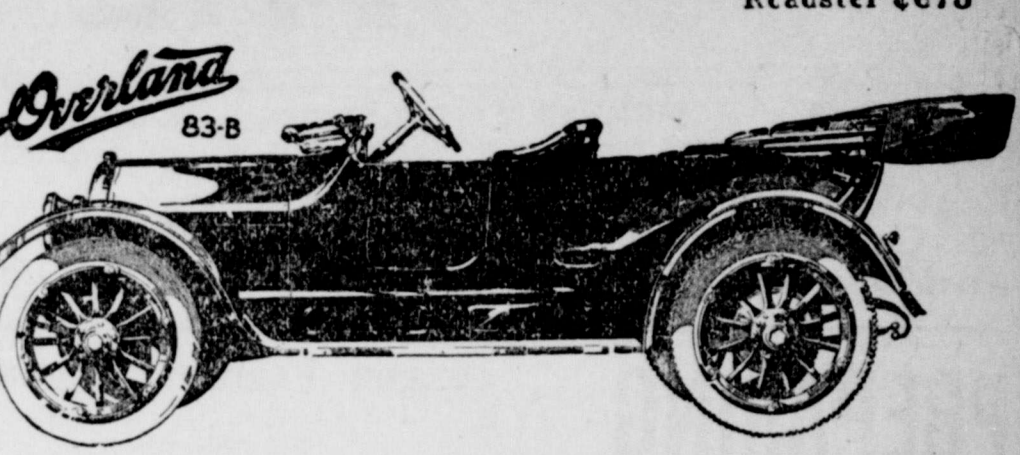

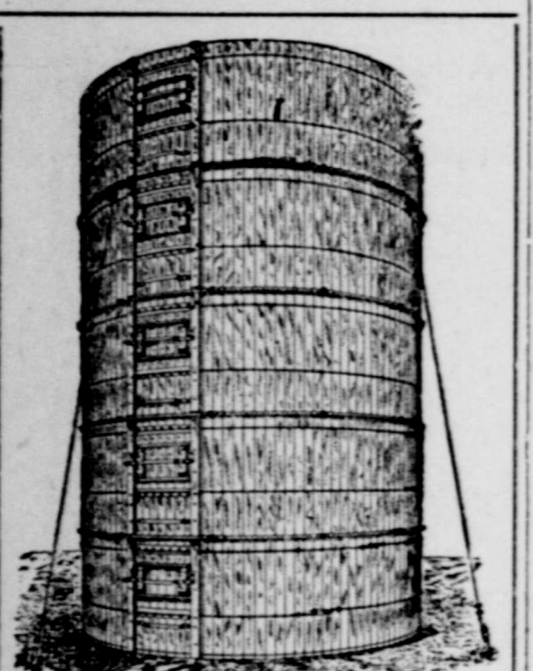

50,000 ACCIDENT CLAIMS SETTLED WITHOUT LAWSUIT

GENERAL MANAGER OF TEXAS EMPLOYERS' INSURANCE ASSOCIATION GIVES FIGURES.

Back for Workmen's Compensation Law Discussed.

FORT WORTH, Texas.—The Texas Economic League has given out for publication the following article by Heiner R. Mitchell, general manager of the Texas Employers' Insurance Association, concerning workmen's compensation laws:

"The economic basis for workmen's compensation insurance laws is much more easily established than the legal basis. It does not need the support of the facts and figures developed by investigation into the subject. Practically all men are ready to agree that the economic insecurity of workmen and their dependents justifies the fundamental principle involved in such laws, namely, that industry should be taxed to provide definite, fixed and certain benefits for injured workmen and their dependents, rather than that the recovery, if any, of an injured workman should be determined by juries on mixed questions of law and fact as to who may have been at fault for the injury and economic loss resulting from it. The legal basis for such laws is of interest, principally to the legal profession.

"The paramount questions with employers subject to the law now is: How has its administration turned out in Texas? The answer is that more than fifty thousand accidents have been reported, and that the number of law suits resulting has been absolutely negligible. More than one hundred thousand working men are protected by insurance, providing statutory benefits. More than five thousand employers have become subscribers, notwithstanding the very material increase in premiums for compensation insurance over the cost of old-fashioned employers' liability insurance. Employers to whom the act is not applicable have individually and through their organizations, expressed a desire to be included, rather than excluded as soon as the law can be so amended.

"Whatever dissatisfaction may be found among employers is due to the fact that the cost to the employer is out of all proportion to the benefits to the employee. The companies reporting to the Insurance Department of Texas under oath disclose the collection of more than two million dollars in premiums, and the payment of only about one-third that amount in losses. It is essential to the success of the plan that the funds be accumulated and disbursed through an insurance organization, but it is not necessary that it cost \$2.00, or even \$1.00 to provide, adjust and pay \$1.00 to an injured employee. Economic waste was the outstanding objection to the operation of the old law. Economic waste must be eliminated from the law before it can receive the approval of all those who are subject to it.

"If the insurance companies exploiting the field of workmen's compensation insurance were for a moment regarded by the public as the public now regards public service corporations, an investigation into their books would hardly be necessary preliminary to vigorous restrictive statutes, limiting their operating expenses and profits to such a figure that they would not be permitted to collect \$2.00 from employers in order that \$1.00 might be paid to employees.

"The Texas Employers' Insurance Association, created by the Act as an agency of the State to enable employers to discharge their obligations toward injured employees at the least possible cost, has, after reducing stock company rates approximately one-third, and writing only a portion of the entire business of the State in less than two years time accumulated undivided profits of \$85,000. The total business of the State would have enabled them to accumulate over half a million dollars. Had they collected the premiums which many of the commercial companies have charged their policy holders, its profits would have considerably exceeded one million dollars.

"It is time that those affected adversely by these uneconomic methods should be looking into available statistics and co-operating with those who have recognized and adopted plans to escape the excessive cost reflected by insurance rates paid to the regular companies." 51
