## BOTH SIDES CLAIMING VICTORY

PETROGRAD, June 30.—Kuropatkins entire front line from Riga to Dvinsk, is the target for a series of sudden and violent attacks by the Germans. It is believed that Gen. Hindenburg is launching a new offensive movement in an effort to divert the Russian troops from Galicia and Volhynian campaign.

**Russians Get Railway Center.**  
Paris, June 30.—Dispatches to the Echo De Paris, a French newspaper, says that the Russians have captured an important Galician railway center, and gained strong outer trenches on the opposite side.

## GERMAN OPERATIVE ACQUITTED.

New York, June 30.—Captain Hans Taucher, alleged German secret service operative, was acquitted today of conspiring to inaugurate a military movement against Canada by German-Americans in the United States. Capt. Taucher was also acquitted on charges of attempting to blow up the Welland canal.

## WANT WILSON TO SAVE IRISH REBEL

Washington, June 30.—Senator Martin today introduced a resolution in Congress, asking that President Wilson intervene to ask that Sir Roger Casement's life be spared. The resolution was referred to the foreign relations committee.

## WORK ON HIGH POWER LINES BEGUN

R. J. Irvine, manager of the San Angelo Water, Light & Power Co. is spending a good part of his time in Ballinger directing the building of the high power transmission line from Ballinger to Rowena and from Ballinger to Winters.

Nine earloads of material have arrived for this work and with a force of about forty men on the job the work is well underway. The first line will be constructed between Ballinger and Rowena, and the poles for this line are being distributed.

Mr. Irvine announces that the Inter-State Electric Corporation, which owns the San Angelo properties, the Ballinger plant, and also recently purchased the Winters plant, will spend about \$100,000 on the extensions, and it will require about four months to complete the work.

In order to supply current for Winters, Rowena and the intermediate points, the plant at Ballinger is being increased. The Interstate Corporation takes over the ice plant tomorrow, also the Winters light plant is turned over to the new company tomorrow. At Ballinger the ice and power plant will be operated in the old ice plant building, while the old plant at Winters will continue to supply the power until connection is made with the power plant at Ballinger. When the high power transmission line to Winters is completed that city will have continuous current while at present they only have power certain hours of the day, and no day current during the winter season.

## GERMANS REPULSE BRITISH ATTACKS

BERLIN, June 30.—The war office today announced that British attacks at various places along the Belgian front had been repulsed. British moves in this sector of the Verdun line were menacing the German line of communication.

The Germans also progressed near Hill No. 304 northeast of Verdun, it was claimed today.

## DANGER OF WAR WANING

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Secretary Robert Lansing this afternoon asked the Mexican ambassador Arredondo to "speed up" Carranza's reply to the Wilson note containing the latest American demands. Mr. Lansing told the ambassador frankly that the patience of this government in this matter was about exhausted. It was pointed out that the United States originally asked that Carranza's statement of his attitude be made at once, and that since that several days had elapsed with no answer from the Mexican chief.

Carranza's delay in sending the reply is partly explained in official quarters here as due to an effort on his part to let things calm down. Time was also gained by this delay to allow Carranza to frame up with his cabinet a satisfactory answer.

These facts were learned after the cabinet session in Washington today.

Only a brief consideration was given the Mexican situation this morning as President Wilson was rushing to catch a train for New York City, where he will make an address before the Press Club tonight.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—As President Wilson awaits a reply from Carranza to the note addressed to the Mexican chief threatening him with the "gravest consequences" if Americans were attacked in Mexico, the danger of war seems to be waning. News reports reaching here bring the news that Mexican authorities have expressed a willingness to return the bodies of the American troops killed at Carrizal, and the quick release of the American prisoners is cause of optimism among administration officials, and buoys up hope for a peaceful settlement.

Despite belief of administration officials that war may be averted, militia continues to pour steadily towards the border and Sunday will find about one-third of the new forces on the border, or at southern mobilization points.

United Press dispatches from Mexico City stating that the Carranza reply was about completed was read with interest at the White House this morning. Mr. Wilson hopes to receive communication before he delivers an address before the New York Press Club tonight.

## MEXICAN BANDITS HANG AT DEMING

DEMING, New Mexico, June 30.—Four bandits who participated in the Columbus massacre and raid, were hanged at this county seat jail this morning. The bandits seemed unconcerned at their fate and displayed unmovable stoicism.

Deputies sworn in from the state militia surrounded the jail to prevent any interference from the Mexican population.

## SCOTT TELLS W. O. W. NOT NEEDED NOW

DALLAS, June 30.—General Scott today wired Texas Woodmen of the World in reply to their offer to enlist in the United States army, saying that if volunteers were called for he would consider their request. The general stated however, that he thought it likely the states' militia would be sufficient to cope with the situation.

## MAKING COMPLETE SURVEY OF TEXAS.

Austin, Tex., June 30.—Texas will know all about itself when the bureau of economic geology of the University of Texas completes a survey now underway.

The survey will show the geological structures, natural resources, water, formations favorable to oil or gas, building stone, road materials, clays of economic value, gypsum and other minerals, of every county in the state.

Francis L. Whitney, James P. Nash and T. D. Trask are now in Hays county working on the survey. They are traveling by private conveyance and living in the open. Dr. Emil Boese will join them later in the summer.

Very few counties have been thus surveyed and the work is expected to take several years. The party expects to spend most of the summer in Hays county alone.

## SAYS VILLA JOINS WITH CARRANZA

EAGLE PASS, Tex., June 30.—Juan Rodriguez, a Mexican resident of Texas, on arriving from Torreon, Mexico, this morning stated that the bandit Villa has joined Carranza forces at Montecova with several hundred thousand men under his leadership. Rodriguez claims he knows Villa and can not be mistaken in his identity.

This Mexican also says that about eight thousand Carrancistas are mobilized between Piedras and Montilova.

## WILL RETAIN GARDS- MEN ON BORDER

New York, June 30.—Even should the Mexican situation ease up the national guardsmen now mobilizing along the border will be kept there for service for some time. Awaiting their release the guardsmen will receive military training, according to high army officials.

## SHIPS CARRY HOME AMERICANS

Vera Cruz, June 30.—The United States battleship Nebraska and the Ward liner Monterey arrived at this port today to take off eight hundred American refugees.

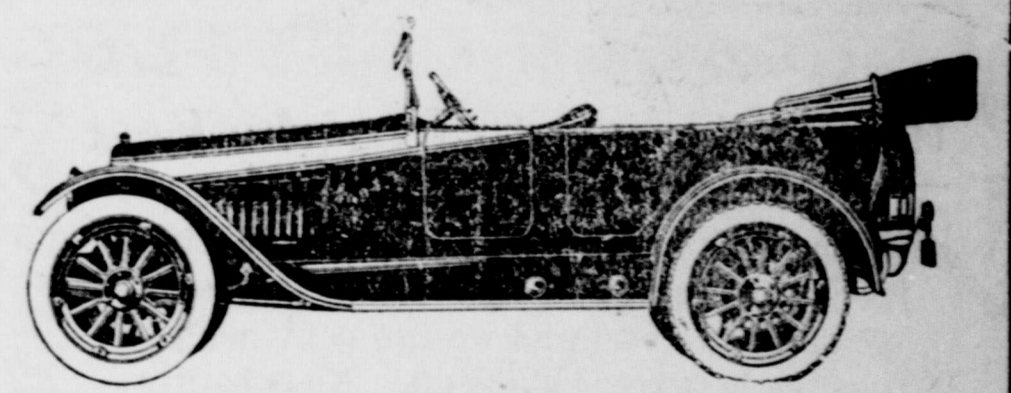
## PRESIDENT'S DETROIT SPEECH JULY 10TH.

**WILSON AND HUGHES**

Woodrow Wilson is a school teacher and affiliates with the Presbyterian church. Charles E. Hughes is a lawyer and affiliates with the Baptist church. Should he win the presidency Mr. Hughes will be the first Baptist to hold that office. An eastern magazine writer has been making a study of presidents and their beliefs. There have been eight Episcopalians, seven Presbyterians, four Methodists, two Dutch Reformed and four Unitarians, Thomas Jefferson the founder of the Democratic party, called himself a liberal in religion, but his political and personal enemies said he was an atheist. Jefferson was a powerful champion of civil and religious liberty and for the education of the masses.

The Episcopalians made their big presidential record in the early days of the republic, while the hold of the Church of England was still strong. Garfield was ordained a preacher in the Church of the Disciples. Hughes would make the twentieth lawyer to occupy the White House. Only eight presidents so far have not been members of the bar.

Eighteen of our presidents out of the twenty-seven were college men, and as Hughes went to two colleges he will strengthen the forces of the sheep-skin holders. Hughes is a member of the Delta Upsilon Greek letter fraternity, as was Garfield. The average age at which men have been elected president was 58. Hughes is only 54. Roosevelt was 43 when he succeeded McKinley, and he was our youngest president. "Tippecanoe" Harrison was 67.

Hughes is just ten years younger than his running mate, Charles W. Fairbanks.

All our presidents except two—Van Buren and Roosevelt—were of British extraction. Jefferson however, was the only Welshman, and Hughes' ancestry also goes back to Wales.

The father of Justice Hughes was a clergyman. Three other presidents—Wilson, Cleveland and Arthur—were sons of preachers.

If you want your son to be president you had better buy a farm. An even dozen presidents were sons of farmers, and farmer boys beat all others in the race to the White House.

Lincoln was the first president to wear a full beard, but since his day Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Arthur and Harrison have worn extensive facial adornments. Hughes has plenty of precedents in his aversion to patronizing a razor.

The nomination of Hughes proves once more that the best stepping stone to the presidency is a governorship.

Wilson, Roosevelt, McKinley, Cleveland, Hayes and Johnson were state governors.

Thomas Riley Marshall is a Presbyterian, Vance McCormick is a Presbyterian and William Jennings Bryan is a churchman of the same denomination. By the way, Mr. Bryan is the editor of the Commoner. The Commoner says the Republicans have presented "a ticket composed of men of high character, acknowledged ability and large experience." "They represent," says Mr. Bryan "the stand-pat Republicanism, the Republicanism that looks after the captains of industry and

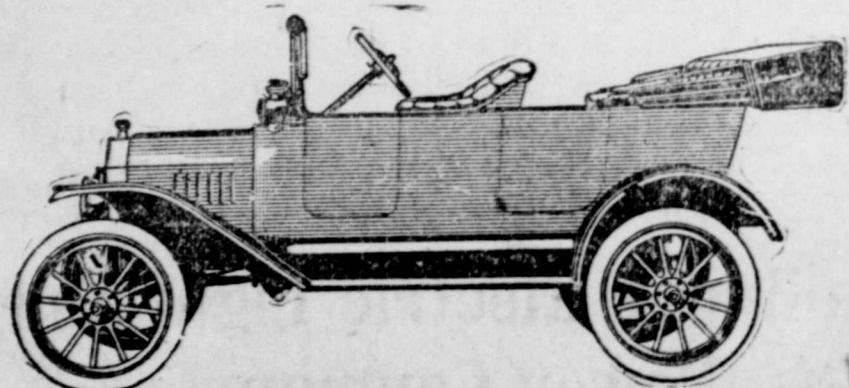

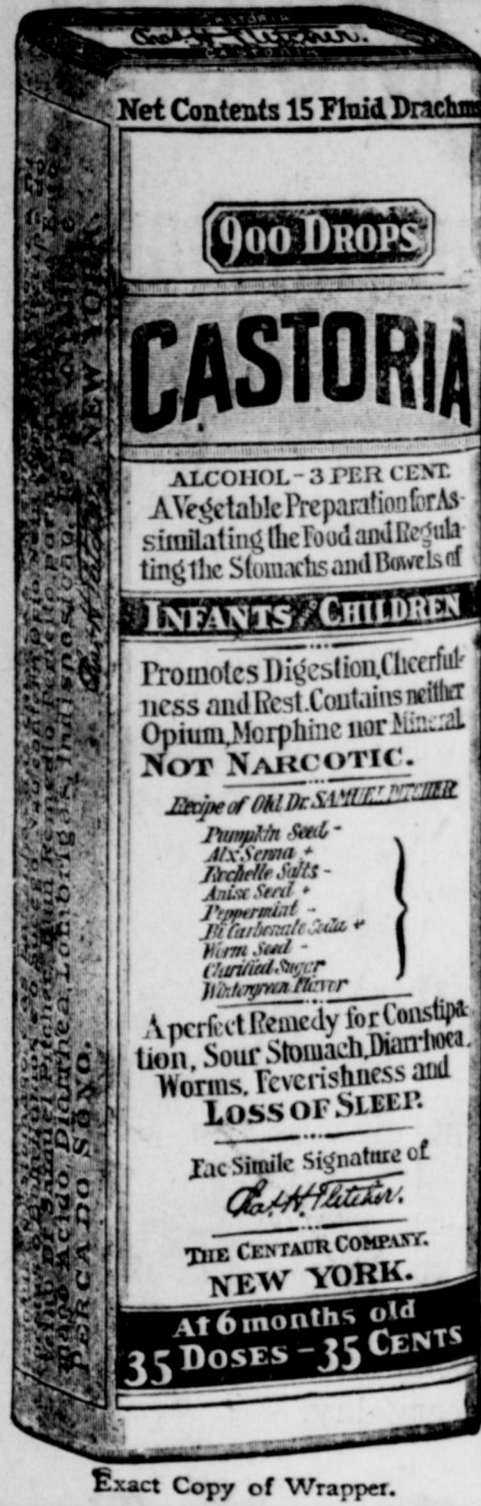

**THE BED IS TOO SHORT  
AND THE COVERING IS

The evangelist in the revival on Ninth street spoke in part as follows:

Isa. 28:20. "The bed is shorter than a man can stretch himself on it and the covering narrower than he can wrap himself in it." In order to appreciate the force and application of the above passage it becomes necessary to view the context in the sixteenth verse of the same chapter says, "Therefore, behold, I lay in Zion for a foundation a stone, a tried stone, a sure foundation." Previous to this statement the Lord unfolds in prophetic vision the abolishing of the covenant with death and agreement with hell that the men of Jerusalem purposed to thwart the purpose of God by putting Jesus to death and sealing the tomb with the Sadducean Seal and set a watch of Roman soldiers in order to make the sepulchre sure and prevent the Christ from rising from the dead and when the Christ arose from the dead they said, "Tell while we slept the disciple stole the body away and if this comes to the Governor's ears we will persuade him." Mat. 27.

In this they made their bed in the refuge with lies and covered themselves with falsehoods for God said in Isa. 28, "For they have made lies their refuge and falsehoods. God says as quoted ves." We observe in this that in the idea of refuge they make their bed and cover, themselves with falsehoods. God says as quoted above Isa. 28:20, "The bed is too short and covering is too narrow."

All mankind has at sometime in the progress of the human race and the life of each individual have made their bed somewhere and covered themselves with some kind of a covering.

The Jews made their's in Judaism and rejected Christianity. They cannot obtain the promises of God through Jesus as long as they cling to Judaism. Therefore their bed is too short and covering too narrow. Some make their bed in morality alone but the Lord gives an example of a just man devout, alms giving, praying to the Lord always, fearing the Lord with all of his house. I am certain if there ever was a man who could have rested with sweet refuge in his bed of morality covering himself with moral righteousness it must have been Cornelius as referred to Acts 10. But the Lord told Cornelius saying, "Send for Peter who when he has come will tell three words whereby, thee and all thy house may be saved." And the Apostle delivering this message showed him the way of life and salvation through Jesus and commanded him to be baptized in the name of the Lord Act 10:48-48.

Some endeavor to make "their bed" in one or more of the various secret orders of the day saying their morality and deeds of charity are good enough for me, however, much good in a temporal and moral way the various secret orders may have been or may be to humanity if one is contented with their initiation, grip and pass-word to pass them into the City of God, they will wake up to the realization when it will be terribly too late, their bed has been too short and covering too narrow.

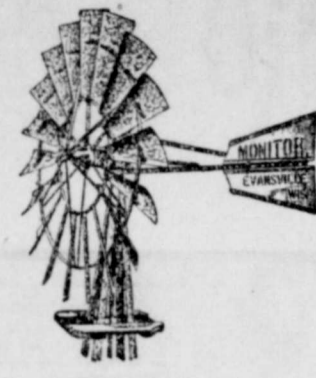

"Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord, henceforth. Yea, saith the Spirit, they do rest from their labors." Rev. 14:13.

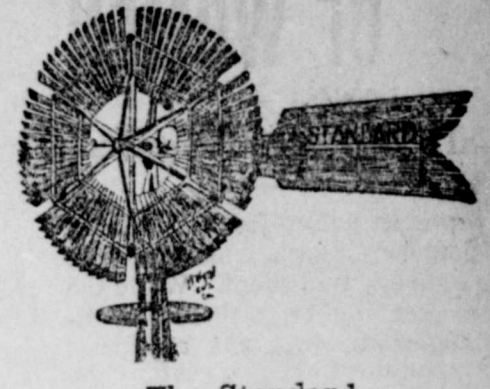

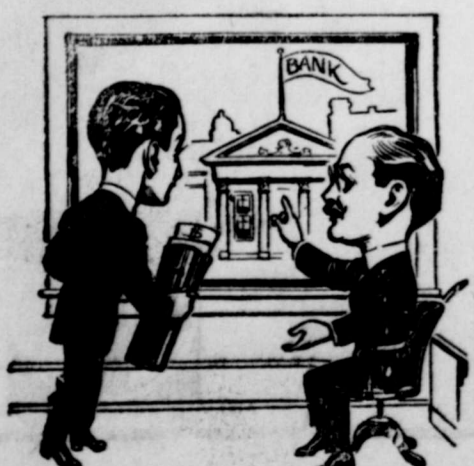
