Bandits Cross River and Attack United States Troops; Seven Dead

EL PASO, July 31.—A gang of Mexican bandits crossed the river near Fort Hancock last night and early this morning attacked a detachment of Company F of the Eighth Cavalry, killing Private John Twomey, Customs Inspector Robert Wood, and wounding Sergeant Louis Thompson. The American troops engaged the bandits in a running fight, following the attack, and five Mexican bodies were found on the battle field after the bandits had been chased across the river. As soon as the report was received here Gen. Bell rushed troops from the Eighth Cavalry to the scene of trouble in a special train from El Paso, with instructions to follow the bandits into Mexico if necessary and do everything possible to capture them.

SUBMARINE ARRIVES AT NEW ORLEANS

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 30.—The German submarine Bremen is this morning lying off the mouth of the Mississippi river, according to reports received from Port Eads and Pilot Town, the two lowest spots on the Mississippi river. Whether the boat will enter the river or not is not certain, since she is too far out to be spoken to. Pilots, however, reported her presence off the mouth of the river, and brought the first news. It spread like wild fire in New Orleans and has the whole town excited.

France Ready For Peace Bearing French Brand

This is the third of a series of European anniversary articles direct from the war zone, and deals with peace as viewed from each nation engaged in the great conflict. We will hear from Germany tomorrow.—Editor.

PARIS, July 15.—(By Mail)—France is open to the consideration of a peace imposed by herself and her Allies. None other. Within the last three months, or the last quarter of the first two years of the war, France four times officially has said so.

A formal declaration by her president, a formal statement by her prime minister, a spontaneous outburst in her Chamber of Deputies and a great manifestation by the French people themselves all have said this and France closed the second year of the war with an absolutely solid front for a peace for all time to come.

May 14 at Nancy, President Poincaré delivered perhaps the most remarkable address that ever fell from the lips of a French President. It crystallized the sentiments of the French on peace.

"We do not want our enemies to offer us peace," he declared, "but we want them to demand it of us. We do not want to accept the conditions they have to offer; we want to impose on them our own. We do not want a peace that will leave Imperial Germany mistress to recommence the war when she chooses; we want a peace based on restored right with serious guarantees of equilibrium and stability. And until that peace is assured; until our enemies recognize themselves defeated, we will never cease to fight."

The French press without a dissenting voice upheld these words. Prime Minister Briand within a week publicly confirmed the position of M. Poincaré as that of the French government itself.

In refusing to accept the olive branch of diplomacy as a means of settling the war France did not fear that in diplomatic negotiations with Germany she might be worsted. She is willing to let her victory in the Agadir case stand as a witness to her diplomatic superiority. Germany refused in July and August of 1914 to accept diplomacy to settle the controversy. She insisted upon war and France insists that Germany must finish with war.

Following these declarations there came within a week a spontaneous outburst in the French chamber as still further affirmation that France does not want even to discuss a negotiable peace.

M. Raffin-Dugens, social member, had just returned from Kienthal, Switzerland, where in a private capacity he had attended the Second International Socialist Conference to Bring About Peace. Arising, he demanded the right to speak on "certain discourses pronounced recently in the name of France, some of which were not calculated to bring about peace. The two blocks of nations that have rushed at each other's throats."

He got no further. The Chamber to a man rose in a storm of protest. It was long before President Deschanel could make himself heard. "I am astounded," he finally managed to cry out, "that any Frenchman could even intimate that the provocation for the present war did not come solely from the side of Germany." M. Raffin-Dugens apologized and the only chance ever offered to the French chamber to discuss peace was buried.

The people themselves followed

quickly, within a week, with one of those manifestations that mark epochs in the life of nations. Before the present war France was not united on the question of preparedness. If a regiment of troops passed it was certain someone would applaud and cry "Vive l'armée"; and that someone else would shout "Vive la Paix." Noisy groups would form and riots were likely to follow.

On June 1, in honor of her dead General, Gallieni, Paris witnessed the first great military display that has taken place since the war began. Ascension day is one of the great national holidays of France. Representatives of all France lined the streets through which the funeral cortege passed.

Ordinarily people do not applaud at funerals. But the French, waiting until the body of Gallieni had passed, applauded and cheered the troops representing every branch of the French army.

A quiet handclapping began at the sight of the troops. It grew louder and more prolonged until it extended down the lines of thousands upon thousands of people from the Invalides to the Gare de Lyons. It continued until after there was not a soldier in sight. There was not one note of opposition.

Among the thousands of applauders there were hundreds of women wearing small bunches of violets, women whose mourning garments showed they had lost a son, a father, a brother or a sweetheart in the war. Many of them had spent almost their last money to purchase themblematic flowers.

The violets had been intended for Gallieni, but when the cortege began moving, these women suddenly saw broader and larger. They saw in the death of Gallieni the man who had merely saved Paris, while in the troops that followed they saw what must ultimately save all France. And as if by some sudden, subtle instinct the hands raised to shower the violets.

CULBERSON MEN HOLD MEETING

DALLAS, Tex., July 31.—Friends of United States Senator Charles A. Culberson met at the Oriental hotel here this morning and discussed ways and means for his campaign for the nomination in the "run-off" or senatorial primary, August 26th.

Judge Barry Miller, Culberson's campaign manager, ventured the prediction that hundreds of Texas voters who did not support Culberson in the first primary would support him in the "run-off" against Colquitt.

The Culberson supporters are organizing the entire Panhandle, Amarillo as a center. The suggestion that Colquitt be given the nomination because he received a plurality of the votes cast in the July primary is not finding favor with the supporters of Culberson, Campbell, Henry, Brooks, or Davis. They insist that the intent of the "majority election law" be carried out, and that the nominee from Texas for the United States Senate be supported by a majority of the Democrats of the State.

Walter Parker left Sunday afternoon for Dallas and will go on to Texarkana where he will install machinery for an oil mill or flour mill.

MAY DEAD IN CANADA FOREST FIRE

MONTREAL, Canada, July 31.—Reports received up to noon today from North Bay, Ontario, says one hundred and forty four bodies have been recovered from the forest fire district between Cochrane and Hearst, where millions of dollars worth of timber were destroyed. Heavy rains came in time to stop the raging fires before the flames were swept into a more densely populated district where greater number of lives would have been claimed. The rescuers are at work and other bodies will be recovered from the burned districts.

Englehart, Ont., July 30.—Forest fires raging in northern Ontario are believed tonight to have resulted in the loss of from 150 to 200 lives. Other scores of persons have been injured and it is feared many of them may die.

Several small towns have been wiped out by the flames that have been raging for forty-eight hours.

Reports thus far received show that fifty-seven perished at Nushka, French Canadian settlement and four at Matheson. Cochrane has eighteen dead and thirty-four injured. Iroquois Falls has fifteen dead and many injured and Ramore fifteen dead. The number killed at Iroquois Junction is not known but the entire town was destroyed except the railroad station.

Cochrane, in Nipissing county, is the largest of the towns burned. It had 1,700 inhabitants. The other towns named are in the same section in Nipissing or Sudbury counties, within a radius of twenty-five miles or so. The population in each of these towns is composed of only a few hundred persons.

REPUBLICANS HOLD COUNTY CONVENTION

On July 29th the Republicans held their county convention. Elected delegates to state and senatorial conventions. Also elected county chairman. The Republican state convention meets in San Antonio, August 8th.

EASTERN PEOPLE ENDORSE WILSON

(San Angelo Standard)
Woodrow Wilson, the nominee of the Democratic party for the presidency in 1916, is strong in the East, where Republicans are generally supposed to be as plentiful as are cactus on a West Texas prairie. This is encouraging information which Judge Wm. A. Wright, local attorney, has brought back from Tennessee the first of the week.

"While I was away I saw a good many lawyers who had been east," said Judge Wright Friday. "They told me that to their surprise the East was where Wilson was strong. Many Republicans there believe in his foreign policy and are going to support him."

The object of Judge Wright's trip was to represent the plaintiff in the case of E. V. Bateman et al vs. E. P. Ross, executor of an estate, which Bateman and others wish to see divided. A motion for a change of venue to Nashville was made, but lost. An appeal to the Supreme Court of Tennessee was made by Judge Wright on the motion, but no action had been taken when the local man left on the return home. The point in question is one which has never been definitely settled in Tennessee, states Judge Wright. Mr. Bateman, whose home is in Ballinger, accompanied his attorney on the trip.

Explosion at New York an Accident

NEW YORK, July 31.—After a hasty investigation the federal agents announced this afternoon that there was nothing to indicate that the great explosion on Black Tom Island was the result of any plot or work of criminals and stated that everything pointed to accidental causes.

Up to noon today only four bodies had been recovered, but score or more are missing, many of whom are believed to be dead, and one hundred and sixteen injured, and the property damage figured at from thirty to fifty million dollars.

Two parties are held under bond charged with criminal negligence, and were arraigned at Jersey City, where the cases were postponed until Friday and the two men released under five thousand dollar bonds. These are Albert Dickman, Lehigh Valley railroad agent on the Island and Alexander Davidson, superintendent National Storage Company's warehouse.

New York, July 30.—An unknown number of dead and injured, thirty-five to seventy million dollars in property loss; five states shaken and millions of persons within a radius of 100 miles frightened to distraction is the partial total of the damage wrought by the explosion of war materials in Jersey City early this morning.

While very few bodies have been found, the loss of life is believed to have been considerable. In the excitement following the explosion, little or no effort was made by any one to take a census of those known to have been in the vicinity.

The disaster was by far the worst of its kind that has ever taken place in the country. Black Tom Island, an area of reclaimed land, which projects into New York bay from the Jersey shore, immediately behind the statue of Liberty, was the scene of the explosion.

Six Lehigh Valley railroad piers and the National Storage warehouses, comprising twenty-four three-story brick buildings, about 100 feet deep, were the principal sufferers.

Between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000 worth of property belonging to these two companies was hurled into the air by the series of explosions. Thirteen storage warehouses and their entire contents were blown up, eighty-five loaded freight cars were burned, a dozen barges and their contents burned or blown up, and probably three tugboats sunk.

The New Jersey Central railroad pier, half a mile from the

source of the explosion, also was damaged considerably. Three tugboats, with an aggregate crew of about twenty-four men, are listed as missing. These boats are the Geneva, a Lehigh Valley boat, and the Bridgeton and Ithaca, Jersey Central boats.

When last seen, the little vessels were bravely forcing their way into the blazing barges in an effort to remove them.

Then occurred the big explosion. It is feared they were torn to pieces and lost with their valiant crews.

About \$1,000,000 worth of damage was done on Bedloe's island, and Ellis island suffered severely.

Countless homes and business places running up into the hundreds of thousands, were more or less damaged in Jersey City, Hoboken, Manhattan, the Bronx, Queens, Brooklyn, Bayonne, Staten island and adjacent cities and towns.

Smashed plate glass windows was the principal loss suffered. A conservative estimate of this loss is \$1,500,000.

The cause of the earth shaking catastrophe was the explosion of hundreds of tons of high explosives on the "explosive pier" of the Lehigh Valley railroad.

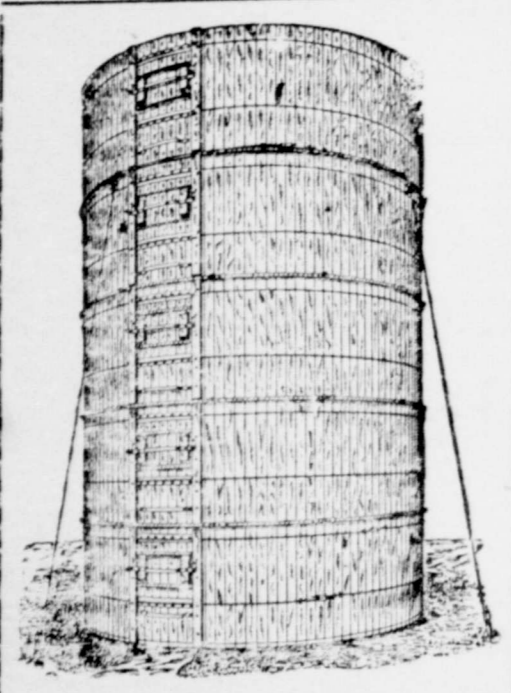

SELL COTTON AT 13c SAYS VETERAN DEALER

"Sell your cotton."

That is the advice that S. Samuels, successful cotton merchant for 44 years offers the people of Texas.

"Cotton at 12 1/2 cents per pound and farmers seeking loans to aid in holding; it seems almost incredible to me," said the cotton merchant.

"In all the years of my life I have never seen cotton higher at the opening of a season than right now, with the exception of the famous Sully year when gambling was gone mad, and to think that the farmers of Texas are figuring on borrowing 6 per cent money and holding their cotton. It's folly, it's worse than folly. Why, if I was a younger man I would go on the stump and urge the farmers to sell their cotton as fast as they can haul it to market at present prices. It may go a little higher, that's possible; it may go much lower, that's probable, but it is gambling and I suggest that if the farmer wants to gamble let him be satisfied with the biggest price he ever received for his cotton and cotton seed and gamble in Texas farm lands.

"Why, think of it," said the emphatic cotton man, "a bale of cotton with his seed will net the farmer today close to \$90, and the total crop of Texas at that price will be close to \$400,000,000 this season. A sum equal to the entire value of the crop of the South up to 1910. I can't scarcely believe it. It is almost incredible that the farmers of Texas will refuse present prices for cotton. If they do they will probably be glad to get 9 cents for it later on.

"What if it should go temporarily higher, and that's an awful gamble, the interest on the money, the insurance and warehouse charges will make big inroads into the profits the farmer may make over present prices, and there are other considerations. Cotton at 13 1/2 cents per pound brings a splendid price, a price at which the cotton farmers can speedily become independent, and when farmers raise the price to figures higher they will drive many manufacturers from the usage of cotton to cheaper substitutes. Bags, paper twine and numberless other products now made of cotton will be made of cheaper material. The farmer will kill the goose that lays the golden egg by such inordinate greed.

"To us old timers in the cotton trade 13 1/2 cents looks like a dream. For a quarter of a century I saw the price of cotton range around 6 and 7 cents per pound with the seed thrown away into the fields for fertilizing purposes. I saw the farmer get \$30 for his cotton and go home satisfied, and when he is not satisfied with \$30 for his cotton and seed I fear he is making a serious mistake.

"I want to say right now and with all the emphasis that I can command that the farmers of Texas should market their cotton as fast as they can haul it to market as long as the price stays above 13 cents. Texas has produced a splendid crop. The total output will be something close to 4,000,000 bales and the inflow of gold into Texas from this one crop alone this season will be close to an average of \$100 apiece for every man, woman and child in the state, and to market the crop at present levels means that Texas will be in the midst of a period of the greatest prosperity this state has ever known, and for that reason and the other reasons that I have stated, as a cotton man who has been engaged in the business for nearly one-half century, I urge the farmers of Texas to sell their cotton as long as the prices stay on the long side of 13 cents."

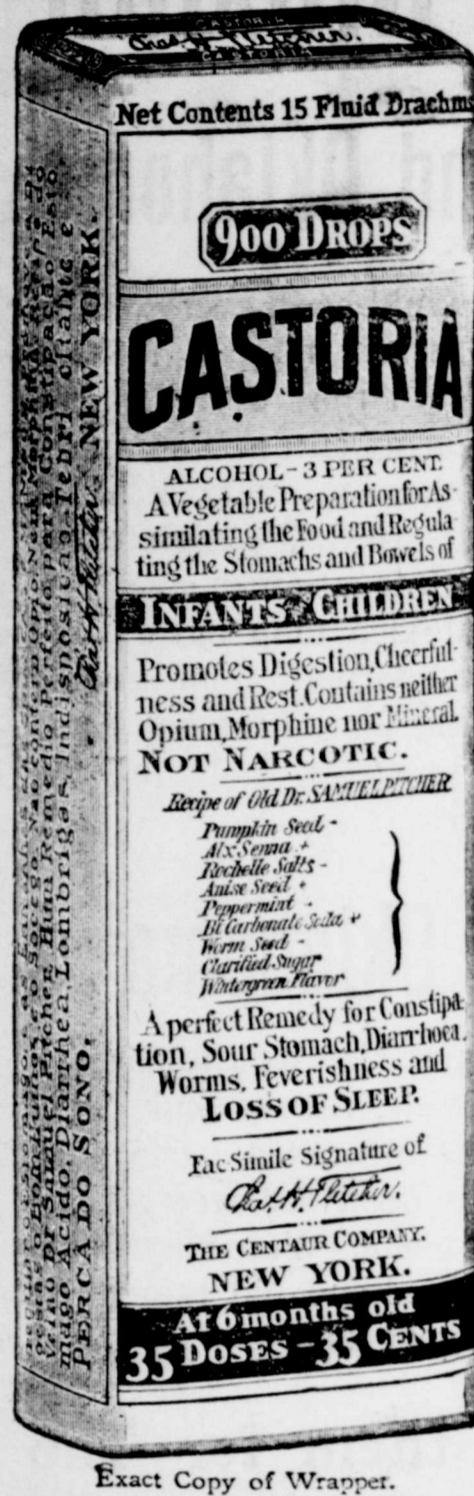

E. F. KREBBS NAMED COUNTY CHAIRMAN

The Runnels County Democratic Executive Committee was in session from ten o'clock until five o'clock Saturday, working throughout the time without stopping for lunch in order to complete the work of canvassing the election returns and making their report to the county convention.

The name of J. H. Baugh had been placed on the election ticket for election as county chairman. After being elected it developed that to hold such office would conflict with some other work Judge Baugh had in hand, causing him to be exempt from certain privileges he now enjoys, and for this reason he resigned, or declined to qualify. This made it necessary for the committee to elect a chairman, and E. F. Krebs was elected to succeed A. K. Doss, the present chairman, who is now winding up the affairs in hand preparatory to turning the job over to Mr. Krebs before the second primary is held.

The committee found only few votes difference in making the official count from the vote as previously given out on the Ledger's bulletin board, and the nominees were found to be as announced Saturday night following the election.

The new chairman will begin at once preparing and sending out the supplies for the second primary which will be held on Saturday week, August 12th, and the same election officers who presided at the first primary will be in charge of the second election, and also for the third election which will be held on August 26th to name a United States Senator.

BLANTON NOMINATED WITH 2400 MAJORITY

Judge Thomas L. Blanton, who went to El Paso last Thursday to look after his interest in the final count of the votes in that county, and if possible learn why the returns were being held back, wired the Abilene Reporter late Saturday afternoon saying: "I am elected by 2400 votes."

Blanton was leading Smith about 1700 votes, without the El Paso vote, and this was known to be a Smith county. Complete returns from Eastland, King, Palo Pinto, Schleicher and other counties, increased the Blanton majority, and with the complete returns from El Paso the majority was reduced to 2,400, which it is claimed is complete.

El Paso county gave Smith a majority of 1869 over Blanton, with Grisham polling 558 votes. Smith's vote in 29 boxes in El Paso county was 2,545, Blanton 676 and Grisham 558. One precinct failed to vote, another failed to return the count and the third did not count state officers, only counting county candidates. ARMY HORSE BUYER IS OVER STOCKED

(Brownwood Bulletin)

A congestion that is threatening in this state is resulting from an order recently issued by the United States government prohibiting their buyers from accepting over 100 animals a day. This order was issued because it was thought that the maximum limit would result in closer and better inspection of the animals submitted to the government's representatives. A. F. McAlister, who holds a government sub-contract for 2000 head of horses and mules here, says that because of this ruling he has about 200 head left here that the inspectors failed to touch.

Capt. E. A. Keyes, who with the assistance of C. C. Tucker and Dr. Brown, has been busy for the past week at the Brownwood horse and mule barn on Fish Avenue, left last night for Fort Worth. This morning he was scheduled to begin inspection there. Ross Bros. of that city hold a big contract from the government, and have contracted a large number of horses there.

During the inspection here 524 animals were passed by the government men, and these have already been shipped to San Antonio. Several hundred more animals, which were left in the local yards will be kept here until the inspector come back and begin their third local job.

According to Mr. McAlister, about fifteen hundred head of horses and mules are now held in San Antonio awaiting examination by government authorities. Many buyers have been called in by the contractors on account of the congestion caused by the recent order of the government.
