Sir Roger Casement Executed this Morning

Giant German Submarine Slips By Patrol Boats; Going Home

NORFOLK, Aug. 3.—The German freight carrying submarine, Deutschland, is off for the return trip to Eremen. The vessel made its way safely past the allied boats which were lying off the three mile line waiting for it to come out. The Deutschland submerged before it came within reach of the British patrols and has not poked its head above the water since it passed the Virginia Capes at eight thirty last night. If the British ships observed the Deutschland they made no effort to block its passage.

FORMER BALLINGER BANK ER DIED AT BROWNWOOD

W. C. Parks, a pioneer and wealthy citizen of Brownwood died suddenly at his home in that city Tuesday night. Deceased had lived to a ripe old age and had been in feeble health for some time, and his death was the result of heart trouble.

At one time Mr. Parks was interested in this city, being at the head of the W. C. Parks Banking Co. He also owned extensive land and cattle interests in this county. Concho, Crockett and Coke counties. At one time he owned the famous Matador ranch comprising about five counties.

The funeral services were conducted this (Thursday) morning by Rev. C. L. Ewing and the remains were interred in the Greenleaf Cemetery.

AUTOS AND PRINTERS GET CANDIDATES CASH

Incomplete reports filed with the county judge of campaign expense accounts of the various candidates residing in this county, shows that a total of \$3883.95 was spent by the office seekers. This amount does not include the expenses of those who are in the "run-off" in the second primary, as County Judge Kleberg advised the candidates yet in the running that they could wait and file their accounts after the second primary.

The accounts are itemized, and the expensive items on the bills are for printing and auto service, with the assessment made by the executive committee to cover the cost of holding the election coming in third place. Only in one or two accounts is it shown that candidates spent any money for cold drinks, while several list miscellaneous expenses, which no doubt includes the treats to the boys.

State Treasurer J. M. Edwards who claims Runnels county as his home, and under the law must file his account in the county, where he claims as home, spent \$1274.70, according to the report filed here. Joe Turner, candidate for assessor, parted with more cash than any other county candidate, spending \$211.50, while J. E. Powell, candidate for surveyor making the race without opposition, only spent \$5.

Under the law each candidate is required to file with the county judge within ten days after the primary, a sworn statement of his campaign expenses. There are several candidates who have not complied with this law, perhaps having overlooked it. There is a penalty for failing to comply with this provision of the Terrell election law. The delinquent candidates will no doubt get busy and square themselves with the law. Following is the names of the candidates with the amount spent by each, as sworn to before a notary public:

LITTLE DAMAGE BY AIRMEN

LONDON, Aug. 3.—There was little damage done by the German airship raid over eastern counties this morning. This was the fourth raid within the last week, but no serious damage has resulted from any of them.

London, Aug. 3.—German airships have again flown over the eastern counties of England, dropping bombs. An official communication, just issued, says:

"A number of airships crossed the coast of the eastern counties shortly after midnight. Their objective has not yet been definitely ascertained, as the raid is still in progress. Some bombs were dropped at various places."

Another official communication issued this morning said:

"The raid appears to have been carried out by six or seven airships. A considerable number of bombs are reported to have been dropped at various places on the eastern and southeastern counties but no definite reports have been received. No military damage has yet been reported."

"Many anti-aircraft guns were in action and at least one of the airships is reported to have been hit."

BUILDING ROADS NEAR WINTERS

The writer was a visitor to Winters yesterday, and we passed a busy road crew on the work of improving the road two miles out from Winters. Commissioner Meadows was on the scene supervising the work and was putting up a good road bed that will no doubt induce trade south of Winters and do their trading at that place. The road leading into Ballinger, known as the Johnson lane, is in bad condition.

NEW COTTON FIRM ORGANIZED HERE

W. C. Penn & Co., is the style of a new cotton firm for Ballinger. The new firm was organized Wednesday of this week when W. C. Penn, formerly of the Ray-Penn Co., announced that Sim Cottelle, who had been bookkeeper and office man for the old firm for the past five or six years, had joined him in a partnership business.

The new firm will occupy the offices on Eighth Street in the second story of the building occupied by D. Reeder, and just in front of the Bartlett Studio. Mr. Penn stated that he would continue to carry on the same kind of cotton business as that in which he had been engaged heretofore and that Mr. Cottelle would have charge of the office work.

Both of the gentlemen are experienced cotton men and we predict will get their share of the cotton handled in this section of the state.

CLOUD BURST KILLS FORTY

MIDDLESBORO, Ky., Aug. 3.—As the result of a cloud burst it is believed forty people have lost their lives in a flood that is sweeping through Caliborne county, Tennessee. Up to noon today nine bodies had been recovered and thirty are missing. The cloud burst occurred on the barren valley in Claiborne county, Tennessee, early this morning, and every house in an area of six by one miles was washed away.

President May Stop Big Strike

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—President Wilson called a conference of the federal board and commissioners Mexican conciliation today, presumably to discuss the threatened railroad strike of the four big brotherhoods of railway men. It has been expected for several days that Mr. Wilson would take some steps to bring about a settlement of the grievances between the brotherhoods and the railways and do everything possible to avert a strike.

DID NOT STOP WORK ON NEW GIN BUILDING

In reporting the result of an injunction suit tried here Tuesday The Daily Ledger erred and published just the reverse of what are the facts in the case.

The injunction suit was brought by Dr. Fred Tinkle et al against L. C. Newton, in which the court was asked to grant an injunction restraining Newton from building and operating a gin on certain lots in Winters. The objection to the building of the gin was that the location selected for it was such that it would damage the rights of others.

Judge Goodwin denied the injunction and ruled that under the law and the facts in the case, the defendant, Newton, has the right to construct and operate the gin upon the ground in question.

Mrs. Cicero Smith and daughter, of Fort Worth, passed thru Ballinger Wednesday in their auto en route to their ranch up the Colorado river.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Sir Roger Casement, convicted of treason in connection with the Irish revolution, paid the death penalty at nine-seven o'clock this morning. The execution took place in the Pentonville prison where Casement was hanged. Death came in ten minutes and the body was immediately cut down and turned over to relatives.

"I died for my country" were the last words uttered by Casement, and he faced death calmly, helping to adjust the noose about his neck. A few minutes before the hour for springing the trap that sent the condemned man to his death, several Irish women gathered outside the prison and attempted to make a demonstration. Guards who had been placed on duty quelled the women after threatening to shoot them.

All hopes for a reprieve for Casement was given up late yesterday when Robert Cecil announced that the man would be executed this morning, and Garvin Duffy, counsel for the convicted man, stated that Casement had seen and bade farewell to his nearest relatives.

In explanation of the govern-

ment's refusal to reprieve Roger Casement, Lord Robert Cecil, parliamentary under-secretary for foreign affairs and minister of war trade, gave out the following statement:

"No doubt Mr. Casement's guilt exists. No one doubts that the court and jury arrived at the right verdict. The only ground for a reprieve would be political expediency, a difficult ground to put forward in that this country never could strain the law to punish a man for the same reason that it could never strain the law to let one off.

"The Irish rebellion began with the murder of unarmed people, both soldiers and police. No grievance justified it and it was purely a political movement organized by a small section of Irish people who still hate England, and who were assisted by Germany.

"There was and is in this country the greatest possible indignation against these people. There is no doubt that Casement did everything possible to assist this rebellion in co-operation with the Germans. There can be no doubt that he was moved by enmity for this country.

HIGH POWER LINE NEARING WINTERS

The poles for the transmission line from Ballinger to Winters are about all set and ready for the wires. The crew of workmen were within two miles of Winters yesterday and expected to complete the work by Saturday. The working of stringing the lines will be pushed as soon as the wire arrives and a strong string of "juice" will be flowing from Ballinger to Winters at an early date.

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 3.—A bomb made from gunpowder, exploded under the home of William Connor, a negro living in the restricted district of Deer Park, a Dallas suburb, early this morning. A negro woman and two negro children escaped from the building unhurt. Connor fled from the district about one week ago when the white residents ordered him to move his family.

Deer Park suburb was declared to be a "white man's" district in an election held some time ago, and most of the negroes had moved out. This negro declined to move. There is no clue as to who fixed the bomb. It is believed that the negroes will not wait for further orders to move.

Nothing short of a general clean up with Mexico will put an end to the feeling that is causing the continued attacks.

Each member provides himself with a pick, shovel or spade; they climb into the car, motor out, fill every hole, bad bridge approach, and any other bad spot that does not require the work of a regular road gang. Each member agrees to fill at least one hole a month and to encourage others to help improve the roads. Join a chuckhole club and be popular.—Holland News.

A good suggestion. Why not organize a chuckhole club in Llano, we believe it would be one of the most beneficial clubs yet organized and we might begin our work on the street fronting the south side of the public square. We are in, who's next?—Llano Searchlight.

It is interesting to note that prohibition, so far as the individual candidate is concerned, has been taken out of general politics in Texas. Submission carried. Men voted for individuals without regard to their stand on prohibition and then voted their sentiments on prohibition separately.—San Angelo Standard.

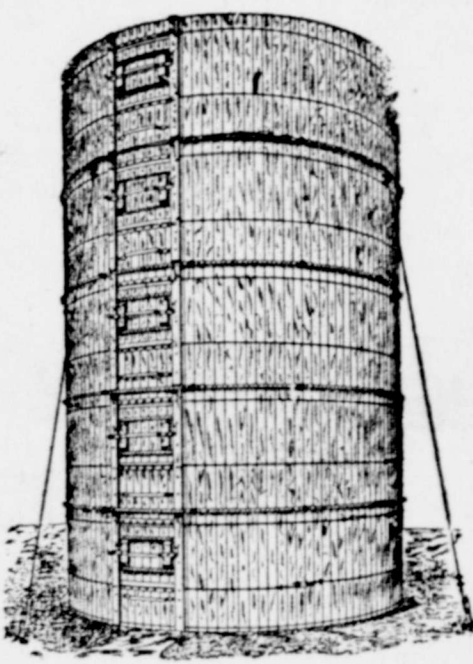

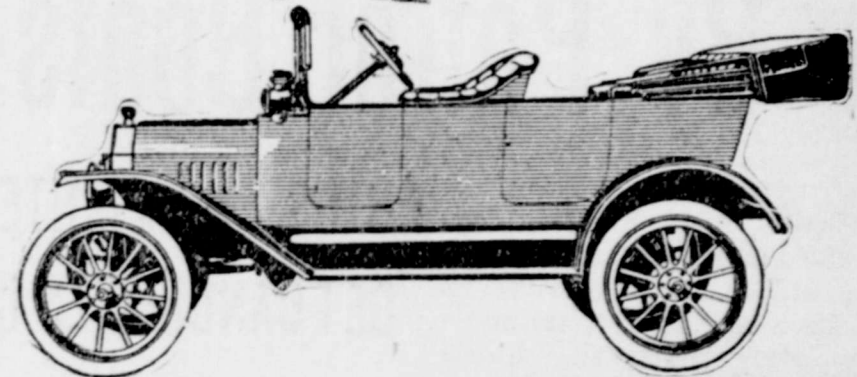

DENVER BUSINESS MEN APPEAL TO CONGRESS.

They Want Interstate Commerce Commission to Stop Railroad Strike.

Denver.—Alarmed by the prospective strike of railway train employees to secure higher wages, the members of the Denver Clearing House association unanimously passed the following resolution:

Whereas, At a recent meeting in New York between managers of the railroads and executives of the trainmen's brotherhoods, called for the discussion of wage schedules, at which conference interested parties were unable to agree; and

Whereas, Subsequently the brotherhood representatives refused to consider arbitration and are now taking a strike vote which may end in a general strike, such as would paralyze the industry of the country;

Therefore, be it resolved, That by this resolution the Denver Clearing House association, regardless of the merits of the controversy as between the railroads and their employees, does hereby express its disapproval of a strike as a medium of adjustment, and we hereby call on our senators and congressmen to interest themselves in the passing by congress of such a measure as will have the effect of instructing and empowering the interstate commerce commission to take cognizance of these conditions and effect a fair and equitable adjustment as between the railroads and their employees, thereby preventing a nation wide railroad strike.

A general strike would effect every individual in the country. It must not occur.—Philadelphia Inquirer.

A strike such as is threatened would be a calamity to all the people of the United States.—Brooklyn Eagle.
