LONDON, Aug. 5.—Fourteen thousand Turk troops are attacking British strongholds near Romani, 23 miles east of the Suez Canal, this afternoon.

The battle is still raging with fierce onslaughts by the Turks, but the Ottomans have been unable to pierce the British lines.

## BIG BUSINESS DONE BY BOARD

Much important business was transacted at a meeting of the board of trustees of the Ballinger Independent District, held Friday evening. At this meeting the opening day of school was placed at September 11th, and to that end and also toward the securing a full term, every effort will be bent.

Probably the most important item of business which took up the time of the trustees was that of remodeling the High School building. Tillie Carter was the successful bidder on a contract to enlarge a study hall, to consist of most of the space now taken in the second story by the 10th and 11th grade rooms and the old auditorium. This study hall will have dimensions of something like 39 by 79 feet, and will be used by all the classes of the high school when not at recitation. The old stage used now in the auditorium will be removed and desks will take the place of the chairs there. It is stated by Superintendent Fleming that this improvement will greatly facilitate the handling of the classes. The science room will be moved to the lower floor.

An order was passed by the board Friday making it a rule for parents from outside districts sending children to the city schools, to agree to the superintendent having "parental jurisdiction" over their children. All boarding house keepers where pupils are staying will come under the restraint of this regulation.

The tax rolls as compiled by E. D. Futch were passed upon and accepted at this meeting. Some further changes will probably be made in the faculty as it now stands, prior to the opening of school but no word could be obtained concerning these plans. The board is making preparation for a full term of school owing to the new compulsory education law, which will add greatly to the enrollment.

## PARIS RAPIDLY REBUILDING

Paris, Tex., Aug. 5.—Architects, draughtsmen, contractors, and builders are busily engaged in the task of rebuilding the city of Paris. The fire which nearly wiped this city off the map March 21 destroyed practically the entire business section, and this is being replaced. Nearly \$1,500,000 worth of building permits have been issued since the fire, and all buildings being replaced are of the most substantial structure, and are mostly fireproof.

The Lamar county courthouse, a new granite building, which was ruined by the fire, is being rebuilt, much of the original material being used in the process.

Residences, especially small cottages destroyed by the fire are being rapidly replaced.

## Equip Dining Cars With Fountains.

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Sodawater fountains are now part of the equipment of passenger trains. Ices, sundaes, sodas, frappes and other delicacies, accessories of the fountain are being served on thru trains of the Burlington railroad running out of Chicago.

"Dining as well as lounging cars are supplied with these fountains," said P. S. Eustis, passenger traffic manager, today.

"The fountains are proving very popular with tourists and travelers. They have already proven a financial success."

## 2000 RAILWAY EMPLOYEES ON PICNIC

Sulphur Springs, Tex., Aug. 5.—Two thousand employees of the Dallas and Shreveport divisions of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway enjoyed a joint picnic here today.

The railroad employees had a feast of barbecue, chicken pie and all the usual picnic edibles at noon. Two thousand watermelons, a gift of the citizens of Sulphur Springs, were served for desert.

A baseball game between Sulphur Springs and Greenville, tennis matches between the Greenville and Dallas "Katy" employees, a fifty yards swimming race for women, and other athletic games and contests featured the afternoon program.

Many prominent M. K. & T. officials attended, including J. W. Chatham, division freight and passenger agent, who was in charge of the picnic arrangements.

## Ballinger Band Boys Return; Praise Brady for Royal Time

Returning Saturday at noon from Brady, where a successful U. C. V. reunion has been held for the three days of Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, the Ballinger band boys are unanimous in their praise of the Brady people and their entertainment.

The Ballinger musicians say they were literally given the keys to the city of Brady, and after their arrival the old Confederates were abandoned till the band could be provided for. Every convenience and aid that could possibly be given Joe Ward's bunch was provided by the Brady town turned out to make the pilgrims from Ballinger welcome. Friday was said to be the big

day at the U. C. V. meet at Brady and over 20,000 people gathered to make gay with confetti and cold drinks. The Ballinger aggregation were permitted to leave Friday night, and the boys say hosts of fair young things accompanied them to their train. Each and every band boy wishes through The Ledger to thank the Brady citizenship for their courtesies.

A stop-over was made in Brownwood on their way to Brady, and a short open-air concert was listened to by an appreciative audience. An auto ride over Brownwood was furnished by the Brownwood chamber of commerce. No concerts were played on the return trip to Ballinger.

## BALLINGER-WINTERS POWER POLES UP

"Fifty of our workmen will arrive today at noon from Winters, where they have completed the work laid out for them there," said M. F. Treadwell, manager of the Ballinger Electric Light & Power Co., Saturday morning. All of the poles for the transmission line between Ballinger and Winters have been put up, and the completion of the high line awaits only the arrival of wire from the supply houses.

Immediately upon the arrival of the wire and other supplies, which are on the way here now, the poles will be strung and the local plant will be put in shape to give current to the near by consumers.

## VASTNESS OF GRAND CANYON

Few persons can realize on a first view of the Grand Canyon that it is more than a mile deep and from 8 to 18 miles wide. The cliffs descending to its depth form a succession of huge steps, each 300 to 500 feet high, with steep rocky slopes between. The cliffs are the edges of hard beds of limestone or sandstone; the intervening slopes mark the outcrops of softer beds. This series of beds is more than 3,600 feet thick, and the beds lie nearly horizontal. Far down in the canyon is a broad shelf caused by the hard sandstone at the base of this series, deeply trenched by a narrow inner canyon cut a thousand feet or more into the underlying "granite". The rocks vary in color from white and buff to red and pale green. They present a marvelous variety of picturesque forms, mostly on a titanic scale, fashioned mainly by erosion by running water, the agent which has excavated the canyon. (U. S. Geological Survey.)

## REPUBLICANS RESPONSIBLE FOR BANDITS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Senator Lewis is a speech on the floor of the Senate today charges that the Republican party is responsible for the loss of lives in the Mexican troubles.

Lewis declares that Mexican bandits have been encouraged to commit outrages on Americans because the Republican leaders in their anxiety have embarrassed President Wilson with their campaign talk. The senator stated that G. O. P. heads have been trying to make a campaign issue out of the Mexican imbroglio, and given Mexicans impression that this country is not united in its support of the chief executive.

## ADVANCE RANK OF MURDERED OFFICER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Rank of "Lieutenant" was conferred by the United States Senate on Colonel M. C. Butler, who was killed at Alpine, Texas, recently, by Harry Spannell. Col. Butler was killed at the same time Mrs. Spannell was fatally shot, being in company with Spannell's wife and others in an automobile.

The Senate also allowed Butler's widow a larger pension in the resolutions adopted today.

## Wisconsin Prohibits the Importation of White Pine.

Madison, Wis., Aug. 5.—Wisconsin has placed a strict quarantine on the importation of all pine nursery stock, according to an announcement made by J. G. Sanders, state entomologist. The white pine blister rust, a danger pest to forests, which has been attacking pine forests in the east, has made its appearance in this state.

"If this disease should escape into the native timber it would rapidly spread and in a few years the growing of white pine and the propagation of new plantations would be hopeless," said Sanders, who is conducting the fight against the blister rust. "By the quarantine order importation of white or other five-leaf pines from outside the state into Wisconsin is absolutely prohibited."
