Working Soil At Proper Time Is Important For Best Result



CKUMBLY OR CLODDY - Crumbly pleasure to work. Cloddy soil is hard to work and restricts plant growth. Good management makes soil crumbly easy to work and allows maximum plant growth.

Tillers of the soil enjoy working crumbly friable soil in good . tilth. It is disheartening to have to work soil that is cloddy and run together. Good tilth is of major importance to the back yard gardener as well as to the large scale farmer.

Maintaining good soil tilth is one of the most serious soil management problems in this area. Soil management at this season is of utmost importance in build-ing good tilth. The chief causes of the accelerated breakdown of the structure of the soils by grazing when the land is too wet, and, cropping systems which return too little plant residue to

The plastice soils found here in the North Central Prairie Land Resource Area have an inherient nature, causing them to "puddle," especially if they are worked when wet. Moreover, they are prone to become hard and clodd when dry, due to the cohesi tendancies found in these soils.

Plowing these soils when they are wet breaks down their natural aggregation, and plowing when too dry may turn up great clods which are difficult to break down for a seed bed. Plowing dry also causes the firmer particles in the soil to sift to the bottom of the furrow which is a partial cause of plow pans. Proper timing of all tillage operations is of utmost importance to encourage

natural granulation in the soil.

Grazing cropland fields while
the land is wet is a major cause of much soil puddling in this vicinity. Compaction by livestock hoofs on wet soil has about the

same effect as plowing too wet. Many soils even on native grasslands of this area show "hoof pans" resulting from wet grazing. A good litter of grass residue on grassland will do much to cushion livestock trampling.

The stability of soil structure can only be built up and main-



For Land Loans To Texas Vets

More Money Due

AUSTIN — arther speed-ups in the already accelerated Vet-thans' Land Program are antici-pated when a mey is received from the April 1 sale of \$12½ million worth of Veterans' Land

bonds.

So says Bill Allcorn, chairman of the Veterans' Land Board and Texas land commissioner.

The board had already speeded up its buy pre ram as funds became available on January 16 from \$12½ million worth of bonds sold in December, 1957.

The bonds sold on April 1 went at 2.89 per cent interest, well below the three per cent limit provided in the State constitution.

The board is now sending out application forms to 300 veterans each week. Allcorn notes that money now available is expected to carry the program through May of 1959.
