PATTERSON SLAYER GETS HABEAS HEARING

WACO, Sept. 7.—T. R. Watson, president of the F. & M. State bank of Teague, Texas, who is in jail here charged with the murder of State Banking Commissioner Patterson, has been granted a habeas corpus writ and the hearing has been fixed for tomorrow. A strong array of counsel is representing the defendant and efforts will be made to secure bail.

Patterson's two sons who were charged with being parties to the killing of Patterson, were allowed bond in the sum of \$5000 each Monday of this week.

COMPROMISE IN RAILROAD DAMAGE SUIT.

The suit recently filed against the Santa Fe by the heirs of J. E. Wild, who was killed on a crossing two miles from this city when Mr. Wild's car was struck by a passenger train, and J. W. Chestnutt, who was seriously injured at the same time, has been settled out of court.

In the compromise the wife of deceased received \$5000 and Mr. Chestnutt received \$1250. The accident occurred last spring while the two men were en route from a business visit to San Angelo, the nine-thirty passenger train striking the car while it was stalled on the crossing in the sand west of this city.

VILLA WITH 1500 MEN COMING

EL PASO, Tex., Sept. 7.—News received here today from Columbus, New Mexico, says that Gen. Pershing is hurrying back to his field headquarters from a visit to Columbus because he has been given irrefutable information that Villa with fifteen hundred men are within less than one hundred miles of the American outpost and are threatening the American troops.

Official Mexican information also received here this morning says that one thousand Yaquis are on the warpath between Navaja and Guaymas and they had killed nearly one hundred ranchmen. It is reported that the Indians will join Villa, which will give the bandit chief nearly three thousand men, but it is known that he has little ammunition at present.

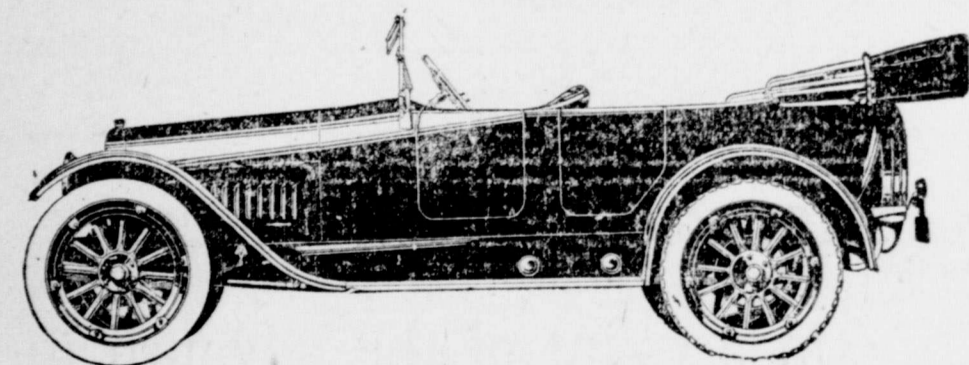
RETURNS FROM PRESBYTERY

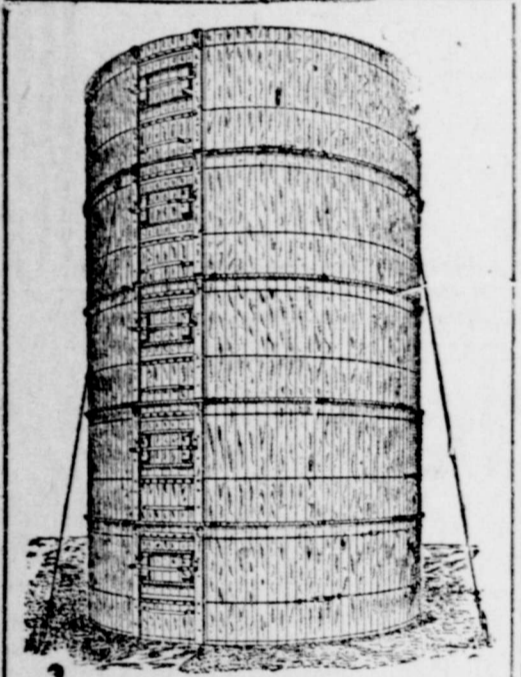

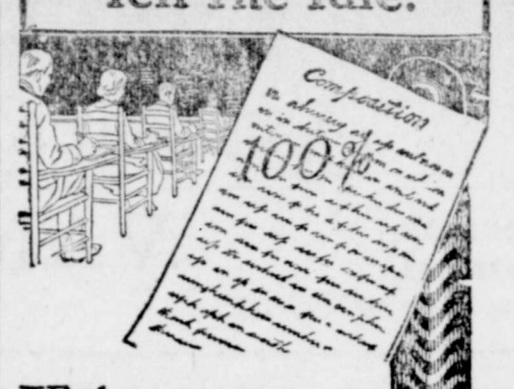

CANDIDATE FOR GOV. TALKS IN BALLINGER

Without making any pre-arranged plans or announcements, Dr. H. W. Lewis, nominee of the Prohibition party for governor of Texas, arrived here shortly after noon Wednesday and was soon addressing a crowd of about 75 men on the corner in front of the Ballinger Loan Co. office.

Dr. Lewis has been assistant to one of the pastors in Dallas for the past four years, and he has had charge of the downtown work, and shows from his talk that he has experienced some pitiful scenes as a result of the liquor habit.

The candidate for governor devoted much of his speech to the recent Houston convention and Gov. Ferguson's relations with the liquor traffic, and claimed that the liquor traffic was responsible for about 80 per cent of the crime in the city of Dallas.

In referring to Gov. Ferguson, Dr. Lewis stated that he held no grudge against the Texas governor personally, but that he paid his compliments to the crowd that is backing the governor in an attempt to override the expressed will of the people at the polls in the July primary. He appealed to the people to fight for the purity of the ballot, saying that the foundation of this government rests upon a pure ballot box and not for the greedy gain of gold it might bring them.

Dr. Lewis also told why he favored woman suffrage, and said that the women of this country were being denied the right to vote for the protection of the home while the ignorant Mexican and negro were allowed to go to the polls and help to fix the laws under which the women were to live and raise their children. He thinks the women are better qualified to pass on the adoption of questions that affect the happiness and prosperity of the home than the henchmen of the liquor traffic and the ignorant class who are today holding the power of the ballot.

Dr. Lewis was accompanied on his trip to Ballinger by E. M. Thomas, Charles E. Rose and T. P. Williams, all of Dallas, the party traveling in an auto. After delivering an address here the party left for Abilene, and are filling what is a two weeks schedule before they will reach Dallas, and on arrival at Dallas they will begin another trip to Southeast Texas.

Several cards were handed out by the candidate after his speech and parties signed them agreeing to vote the prohibition ticket at the November election.

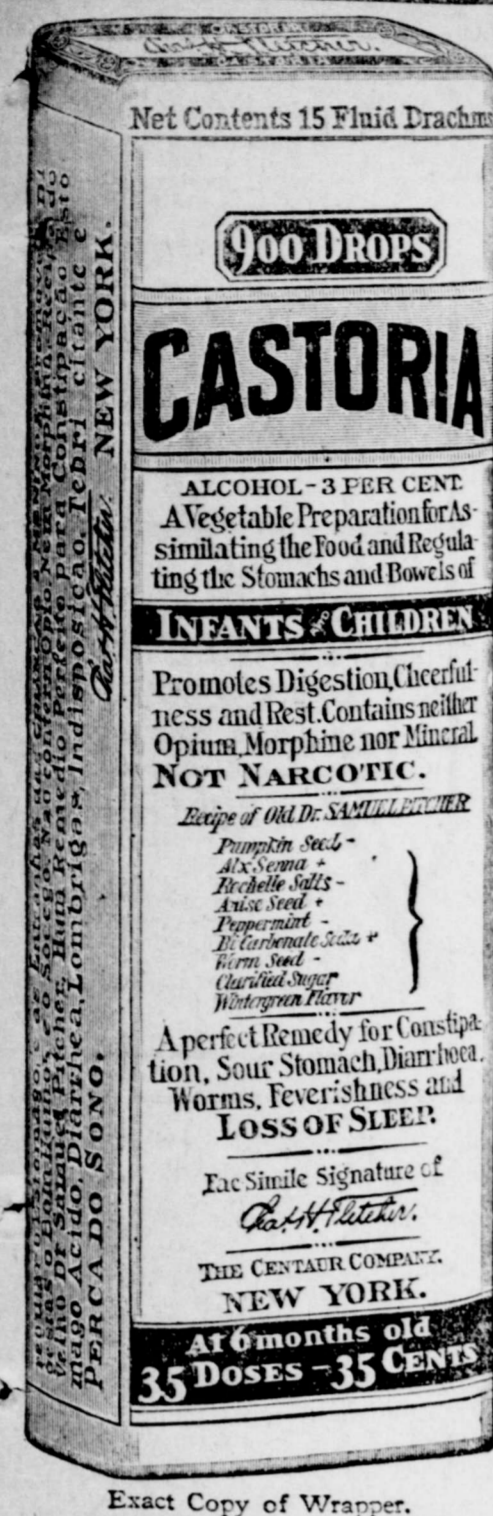

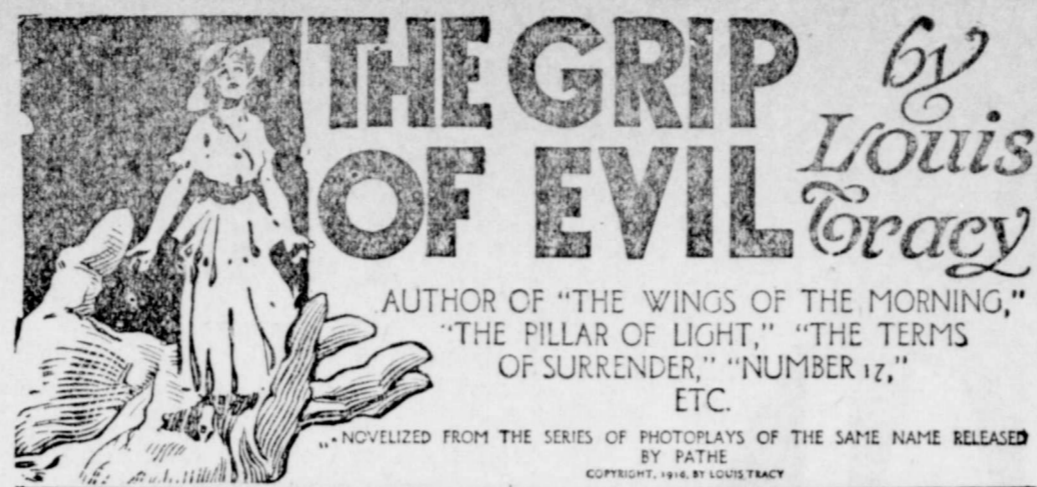

MOST EVENTFUL CONGRESS CLOSES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Congress is arranging to quit work, and the lawmakers will walk out either late this evening or early tomorrow. The session just closing will go down in history as one of the most important in the American nation.

Inheriting its most pressing problems from the European War and Mexican bandits, and having had placed before it one of the most elaborate legislative programs ever known, the Sixty-fourth Congress, now in its last hours, probably will go down in history as one of the nation's most eventful sessions.

Called on twice to back the President in steps which it thought surely meant war with Germany, and actually appropriating millions for the Mexican punitive expedition, it nevertheless found time for half a dozen domestic measures of major importance—and to approve the heaviest appropriations in American history.

"Preparedness" led in attention throughout. The largest naval appropriation the world has ever known in peace-time, and the next-but-one largest army budget, were approved. Back of every economic measure—child labor, rural credits, U. S. merchant marine, workmen's compensation, was the cry of "industrial preparedness."

Though the Democratic party never lost its hold on legislation, and though President Wilson at all times was the admitted pilot, not a single measure passed both Houses on strict party lines.

The most sensational episode of the session was the fight over the Gore and McLeMORE resolution, warning Americans off armed merchant ships after Germany had given notice it intended torpedoing them. Avoudually slaps at the President's foreign policy, they brought the Chief Executive and Congress into sharp conflict.

Leaders of Congress called on the President and warned him if the resolution came to a vote, they would be approved, two to one. The President's answer was a summary demand that they be tabled. Three or four days passed while the fight was organized from the White House. Then his congressional lieutenants struck, and the resolutions were overwhelmed. After that, Congress—except for one halting exception—accepted the President's leadership in foreign affairs without question.

WHAT CONGRESS DID.
Passed eight hour bill for trainmen.

Passed revenue bill giving president power protect shippers. Reorganized and tremendously increased both army and navy.

Made biggest appropriations in history of Congress. "Preparedness" totals, close to \$700,000,000 are the largest peace-time military budgets in the history of the world.

Stopped shipment in interstate commerce of child labor products. Passes rural credits act guaranteeing.
