BOSTON, Nov. 18.—The Boston city registrar McGlennen, told reporters today that Peter Fagan, private secretary to Helen Keller, the famous blind and deaf genius, had applied for a license to wed Miss Keller some ten days ago.

The registrar stated that he refused to issue the license because Fagan had asked him to keep the matter a secret until after the ceremony had been performed.

Miss Keller, her mother, and Fagan, all unite in branding the story as false, and deny the statement in full.

Miss Keller, is suffering from a nervous breakdown as the result of her strenuous lecture tours and her writings, and will leave Boston this afternoon for Montgomery, Alabama, for a rest, it was learned.

SPANELL TRIAL SET FOR JANUARY 15TH

The jury lists from the district clerk's office have been turned over to Sheriff Hawley C. Allen, who this morning began the work of summoning one hundred and ninety-six men for service during the coming December-January term of district court. Court convenes on Monday, December 11, and will probably be in session six weeks.

Present indications are that the criminal docket will be heavy during the coming term. There are already three murder cases on hand, those of Harry J. Spannall, Chris Pistole and W. E. Lowe. Two of these cases were transferred to San Angelo from other counties in West Texas, the Spannall case coming from Alpine and the Lowe case from Ft. Stockton.

There are at present several men in jail who will likely be indicted upon charges of murder. Attorneys have tentatively agreed upon January 15 as the date for the calling of the Spannall case.

When court opens next month, there will be two new officers in harness—Judge Chas. E. Dubois, successor to Judge J. W. Timmons deceased; and District Attorney J. A. Thomas, who filled the unexpired term of District Attorney Alex Collins.

AMERICANS FINALLY GET TO SAFETY

EL PASO, Tex. Nov. 18.—Five American employes of the Alvarado mines are today fleeing from Parral, Mexico, after a Villista attack on that city. The Americans reached Culiacan on the west coast of Mexico late yesterday after a ride of fifteen days.

Across the Sierra Madras region, through a land infested with fierce Yapai Indians, the party went. A message telling of the safety of this party reached El Paso today, but the fate of five other Americans who were known to be in Parral is unknown.

PAYS TO ERADICATE THE TICK

Farmers in tick free counties receive from \$6 to \$10 per head more for their cattle than the farmers of tick infested counties. Tick free hides are worth 50 cents to \$1.50 more than tick bitten hides. Gregg county farmers should be interested in freeing this county of ticks.—Longview Times-Clarion.

COURT ACCEPTS NEW PUBLIC ROAD

The new road leading into Ballinger from southwest of the city through the C. H. Willingham farm over the new cement causeway, was accepted by the commissioners' court Saturday morning. The county judge and the entire court, accompanied by C. H. Willingham, and a Ledger reporter, made a trip over the road Saturday morning and found everything in tip-top shape and Judge Willingham is proud of the road, as it has been his earnest desire to have this road for the past six years and he has given of his time and land entirely free and it is certainly a big advantage to all the people of the section southwest of the city, and no doubt will be duly appreciated by all these people and also the merchants of Ballinger.

Feb McWilliams, the retiring commissioner of this precinct, is due much credit for this splendid piece of road work and the crossing with the cement abutments are now in shape to stand the greatest strain of water that will ever come down the Colorado river.

Judge Willingham reiterates his promise that no town site addition will ever be established on his land but he is ready at any time to give free 50 acres of land on this road for any public institution, such as the A. & M. college or any other school buildings and says he now has several propositions along that line.

The council also recommended that the government take immediate steps to make certain the stabilization, improvement, and extension of transportation facilities.

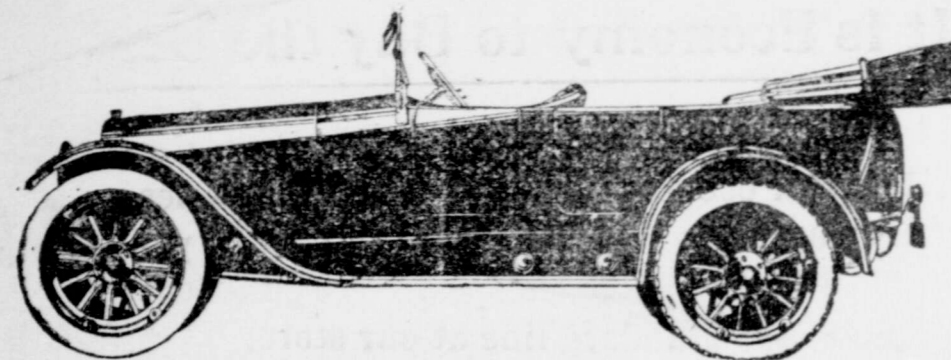
LOCAL FOOTBALL FANS GO TO BROWNWOOD

EARLY CLOSING FOR WHOLESALE LIQUOR DEALERS

At a meeting of the city commission at San Angelo Friday, an ordinance was past requiring all wholesale liquor dealers to observe

the same closing hours as are required by law for the retail dealers. Heretofore certain wholesale liquor dealers are compelled to close at nine-thirty. The wholesaler's sales are confined to not less than one gallon of booze, and the nine-thirty closing law passed by the state does not apply to them and the requirements outlined by the commission is a city law.

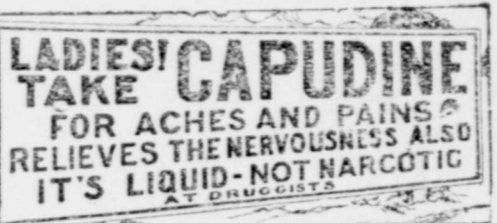

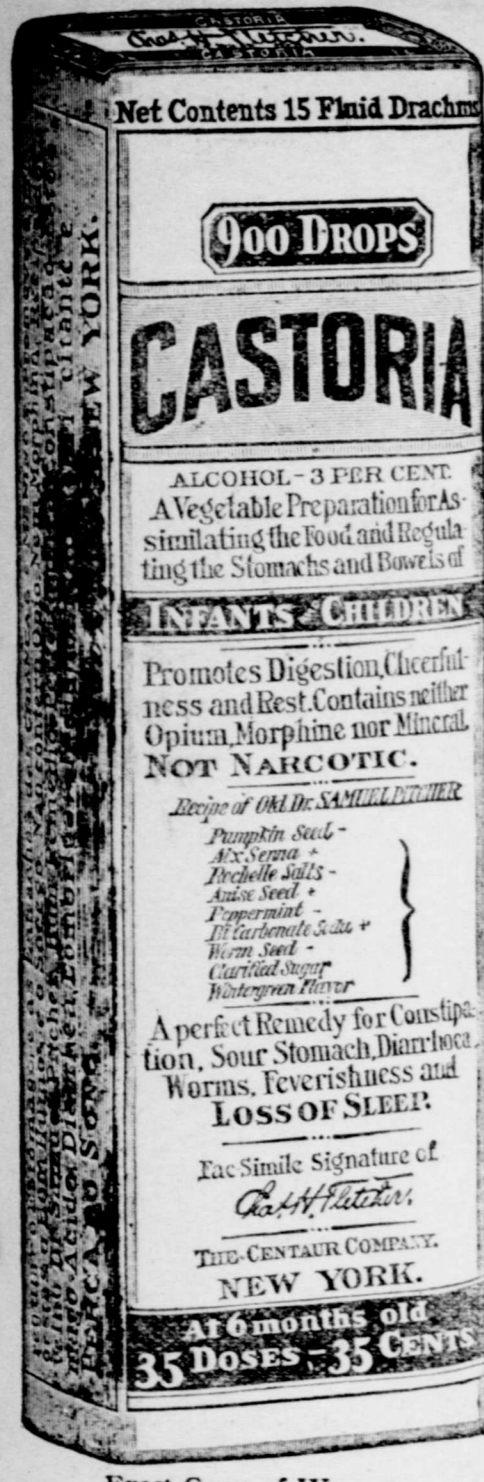

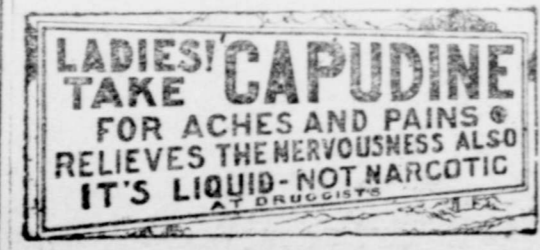

TURKEY MEAT GOES UP

Turkeys on the Ballinger market are real money today. Farmers in the Ballinger section are getting between 22 1-2c and 24c for these fowls on the present

market, and with Thanksgiving two weeks off and Christmas in the distance, more money yet may probably be paid.

E. A. Jeanes & Co., were offering 22 1-2c per pound for turkeys Saturday morning, and stated that the birds they were buying would average 11 pounds, although a

few would weigh as much as 25 pounds. One farmer near Ballinger, Mr. Jeanes stated, said he had an enormous old gobbler who would tip the scales at 53 pounds. At today's quotations this turkey should bring the producer nearly \$12.00. The highest price paid for a turkey in Ballinger so far this

year by the wholesale produce house was \$6.40, although the same firm bought a turkey in Coleman for \$8.50.

Turkey meat may seem to be out of reach for the average family for the holiday season, but one must take into consideration that feed of all kinds has advanced and it costs considerably more to raise poultry this year, even over last year. Other meats, pork, beef, etc. have also gone up too.

Quotations on hens were several cents less Saturday, selling as low as 9 cents per pound.
