10 MINUTES RAIN WORTH MILLIONS TO FARMERS

CHICAGO, May 24.—General Precipitation is the best ally the United States has right now. He is doing his bit by deluging the country with a series of rains that have saved the wheat crop in many sections and doing great benefit to other grains and foodstuffs.

"Each ten minutes rain is worth one million dollars to the American farmer," is the way one statistician puts it in commenting on the condition of the country. Reports from all parts of the country gathered here by United Press shows that crop prospects in general are exceptionally good, due mostly to recent rains, while the heavy frost failed to cause the destruction feared at first. At no season of the year in recent years were the prospects, generally speaking, more promising for the farmer than at present.

Agriculture Department Warns Against.

Washington, May 24.—If every one of the 20,000,000 American households should waste 1-4 ounce of butter daily, the loss would be 114,062,500 pounds a year, the product of ever half a million cows, according to department of agriculture figures today. If only one in every 100 homes waste 1-4 ounce, the loss would total over 1,000,000 pounds annually. The department issued these statistics to show why no butter whatever should be wasted.

New York Doesn't Fear Plague This Year.

New York, May 24.—Infantile paralysis may break out this summer in cities where it was quiet last year, according to a bulletin issued by the board of health. The department does not expect another epidemic here for some time. In the past they have come four or five years apart. Health Commissioner Emerson is experimenting to see whether the infection may originate in decayed teeth, as has been suggested by Dr. Louis Fischer, a specialist in children's diseases.

URGES MASS MEET SELL LIBERTY BONDS

County Judge Parish is in receipt of a letter from the Dallas Federal Reserve Bank requesting that the people of this city organize and take some concerted step in the purchase of Liberty Bonds. The letter suggests that great good might be accomplished by calling a mass meeting and having some one address the meeting.

Quite a number here have purchased bonds, and others will no doubt do so. Judge Parish said he did not feel that a mass meeting was the proper way to handle the proposition, but he had the matter in hand and would do what he could to stimulate the sale of the bonds. Those who have as much as fifty dollars they can spare can show their patriotism by investing in these bonds. The investment is safe, and pays three and one-half per cent interest, without taxes or other cost, making the interest all profit.

SELLING FISH BY THE BARREL.

As an evidence that fishing is good, parties appeared on the streets of Ballinger Wednesday with three barrels of fish. The local cafes were supplied and the fishermen did a rushing business for awhile supplying those who find it more profitable to use the silver bait when they get fish hungry. Of course the fish were not caught in the barrels.

BRITISH ARE BOMBARD BY AIR RAIDERS

LONDON, May 24.—Four or five German airships raided eastern counties of England last night dropping a number of bombs and killing one man in Norfolk village. Lord French, home defense commander, announced today that most of the bombs exploded out of reach of citizens. All the bombs fell on country districts and the damage was only small.

While the report says the raid was made by airships, it presumably means Zeppelins. If so this is the first airship raid since last November and second since the start of the war. Total casualties from Zeppelins and airships since the war are given at 229 killed and 451 injured.

8,600 PRISONERS TAKEN BY FRENCH

PARIS, May 24.—Eight thousand and six hundred German prisoners have been taken by the French troops since May first in their offensive between Soissons and Amberive, today's official statement asserted. The statement given out from the war office officially also details further heavy losses inflicted on the enemy in repulse of violent attacks on Valenciennes plateau.

MEXICAN BRINGS STOLEN WOOL HERE

The officers arrested a Mexican early Thursday morning and he is being held in jail to await the action of the grand jury. The Mexican is charged with stealing wool valued at about \$120. He was arrested while attempting to sell the wool. In fact he had perfected a sale when the buyer became a little suspicious and postponed settlement until an investigation could be had.

The Mexican came to Ballinger about nine o'clock Wednesday night, according to his own story, and spent the night with his half brother near the city. Early Thursday morning he came to town with a little more than two hundred pounds of wool on a small wagon. He sold the wool to A. J. Zappe. Before settling for the wool Mr. Zappe put some rather pointed questions to the Mexican and his answers were not altogether satisfactory. The Mexican had previously offered the wool for sale to E. L. Rasbury. Mr. Rasbury also became suspicious and the officers were soon on the scene and took charge of the Mexican.

After being placed under arrest and confronted with his crooked statements concerning the way in which he came into possession of the wool, the Mexican "fessed up" and told how he got the wool. According to his own story he stole it from F. Beck, of near Talpa, taking a small quantity of wool from each sack and placing it in small sacks, which he brought to Ballinger. It is the opinion of the officers that the Mexican had an accomplice and other arrests will probably be made.

400 LOST ON BRITISH TRANSPORT

LONDON, May 24.—Over four hundred men were lost in sinking of the British transport Transylvania the admiralty officially announced today. The Transylvania was sunk by a submarine on May 4th. The official statement said that the losses include twenty-nine officers and three hundred and seventy-three men, the captain of the vessel and ten of the crew. The Transylvania was attacked by the submarine, and the torpedo fired before the ship had time to offer any resistance.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK BUYS LIBERTY BONDS

The First National Bank made application this week for \$10,000 worth of Liberty Bonds. This is the largest purchase made in this section of the country and speaks well for the patriotism of this bank, as well as for their good judgment in investing in this class of securities.

Liberty Bonds bring a profit of three and one-half per cent, which is a great deal more than many investments bring after all expenses are charged off. And then there is the patriotic satisfaction of knowing that every dollar put in war bonds will help to democratize the world, and spread Americanism to lands now dominated by heartless rulers.

WOOL GROWERS SELLING CLIP

The annual wool sale held here from year to year for several years past, and which has been the attraction for many buyers from a distance, will not be held this year. This is due to the fact that the sheep men are not storing their wool, but are selling it as fast as clipped and brought to market.

E. L. Rasbury, a local buyer, has been buying the bulk of the wool brought here this spring, and the high price being paid for wool is a temptation that the sheep men can not turn down. The wool has been bringing around forty-five cents.

MAY LOCATE IN BALLINGER.

Gus Noyes was here this week looking after his property interest. Mr. Noyes is heavily interested in Ballinger property, being one of the heavy stockholders in the First National Bank, and owns more business property here than any other man. He subscribed \$500 to the A. & M. expense fund, and stated that if necessary to double the subscription. There is some probability of Mr. Noyes locating in Ballinger and building a fine home here. This is a certainty if Ballinger should secure the A. & M. College. He and his family are arranging for a trip to the East and North, where they will spend the summer, and after returning home they will definitely decide where they will build their home. While here Mr. Noyes put under way plans for rebuilding the garage building which was recently destroyed by fire.

ITALIANS DEFEAT AUSTRIANS IN GREATEST BATTLE OF WAR

REGISTERARS TO SERVE WITHOUT PAY

Many election managers, who under the conscription bill are also made registration officers, are volunteering to serve free, not charging anything for their services in holding the registration on June 5th. The government has requested that all who can serve free to do so, and in this way show their patriotism.

Dallas county registrars have announced that it will not cost the government anything to carry on the work in that county, the officers of every box in the county offering to serve free. The officers of other boxes in the state have announced their desire to serve free.

C. R. Crews, Jno. A. Weeks, and C. R. Stephens are the presiding officers at the Ballinger box. These gentlemen say they will make no charges for their services. The polls open at seven o'clock in the morning and close at nine in the evening.

USING INFLUENCE TO MAKE RUSSIANS FIGHT

PETROGRAD, May 24.—Speedy reconstruction of the Russian fighting forces is promised by Minister of Foreign Affairs Tereschtenka, in telegrams to Premier Ribot of France today.

Petrograd, May 24.—America's potent influence is being utilized by the new Russian government in its crucial campaign now on to spur the Russian army into fighting. American Ambassador Francis is personally addressing the Russian troops and scores of assemblages of plain people. He is working in the closest co-operation with Minister of War Kerensky in stirring the army to action. If Russia remains loyal as a nation to the allies it will be due greatly to the influence of America now being felt throughout the world.

RAIN DID NOT DAMAGE NEW ROAD.

Commissioner Kirk is feeling good over the success of road build. His road crew had been at work on the Brady road, leading east from Ballinger on the south side of the river, and a good stretch of road had been completed where heretofore there has been places almost impassable. The big rain falling in that section did not damage the new road in the least and it passed the test of washouts, and the people living on the south side of the river have been brought nearer to Ballinger by the good road work.

The big traction engine to be used in replacing the mules and horses on the road grading, arrived this week, and the grader is en route, and as soon as it arrives the modern way of building roads will be put under way. The roads can be built much faster and at a great deal less cost with the new machinery.

ROME, MAY 24.—FOLLOWING TEN HOURS OF THE MOST TERRIFIC BOMBARDMENT IN THE HISTORY OF THE EUROPEAN WAR THE ITALIAN ATTACKING FORCES BROKE THROUGH STRONGLY FORTIFIED AUSTRIAN LINES IN THE CARSO REGION, CAPTURING JAMIAN AND TAKING 9,000 PRISONERS.

The war office statement announcing the victory stated that 130 airplanes participated in the fight, dropping great bombs with deadly effect, and that heavy fire from the British artillery batteries aided the Italians in the great victory.

The breach in the enemy lines effected along the section from Gastagnivizza to the sea and in an area south of the Boscomalo road around Parria, Boscomalo and Locati. Around Gorizia, a strong point on the slopes of San Marco, was captured and progress made around Monet anto and Vodice.

This victory is credited with being the greatest since the Italians went into the war.

PRO-GERMANS LOSE OUT IN HUNGARY

BERLIN, May 24.—Count Tisza's fall as premier of Hungary was no surprise here. His resignation and withdrawal of his cabinet had been expected ever since the opposing forces in Hungary demonstrated Tisza's resistance to real franchise reform. Presumably this is the main reason for his downfall, but information received here today indicated that Tisza's hostilities to complete commercial accord with Germany had likewise been instrumental in his losing out.

Count Tisza, the "iron man" of Austria-Hungary, has been for many years the leader of the pro-German party in the dual monarchy, and was the last survivor of the little group of statesmen who surrounded Emperor Francis Joseph when the European war began. On the accession of Emperor Charles the majority of the officials of the previous regime were either dismissed or have resigned. There have been persistent reports from many sources that Emperor Charles keenly resents the dominance of Berlin in Austro-Hungary affairs, and that Count Tisza was the one great obstacle which prevented him from freeing his empire from the influence of Potsdam.

There have been several reports recently that the fall of Premier Tisza was imminent, but the rigid censorship imposed by Vienna has prevented the outside world from learning the exact condition of affairs. At the outbreak of the war a truce was declared between the political parties in Hungary, but last August Count Apponyi, leader of the liberals and a strong opponent of the Pan-Germans, announced that the truce was ended, and that he would resume criticism of the government's foreign policy. He was joined by Count Karolyi, president of the Hungarian independent party, and the two popular leaders instituted a vigorous campaign against Count Tisza for his failure to carry out franchise and other democratic reforms.

NEW YORK, May 24.—United States steel common stock sold at 130 today, shortly after noon, going up two and one-quarter points and making a new high record.

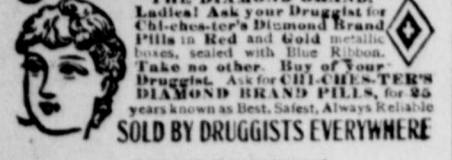

The Minister, His Audience And Theme

"Then drew near unto him all the Publicans and sinners for to hear him." Luke 15:1.

After an inspiring song service, and after the usual impressive preliminaries, Evangelist Wallace delivered the best sermon of the series being brought to those who are attending the meeting at the First Presbyterian church Wednesday night, and there was one conversion and one addition to the church.

The text as read refers to the ministry of Jesus, and the evangelist last night announced as his subject, "The Minister, His Audience and His Theme." "Jesus himself was the minister upon this occasion," said Rev. Wallace, "and the evangelist brought to the minds of his hearers how the people were spellbound under the preaching of Jesus—never man spoke like this man."

Referring first to the minister on this occasion, Rev. Wallace told of the perfectness of Jesus, saying that Jesus as the minister stood before his audience a perfect man, perfectly physical, mental and spiritual. This gave to Jesus force and magnetism. "Our body is marred and blighted by sin," said the speaker, "we are not only imperfect physically, but we can't think perfect, we can speak perfect. Jesus knew the thoughts of the people in his congregation and knew how to speak to them."

The audience—those gathered about Jesus were composed of three classes. The evangelist briefly told of the attitude of each class towards Jesus—the minister on this occasion. The first class referred to was the Scribes and Pharisees. These were a murmuring and complaining class, finding fault with Jesus saying, "this man receiveth sinners and eateth with them." Having such people in his audience made it a difficult audience for Jesus to preach to. "I am glad he did receive sinners," said the evangelist, "if he had not received sinners he would not have received me or you."

The second class referred to by the preacher as making up Jesus' audience on this occasion was the Publicans. This was the official class, the tax collectors—the hated class by the Jews. They drew near unto Jesus. "I am thankful for a Jesus we can draw near unto," said the evangelist, and here the evangelist emphasized the importance of leaving all, forsaking sin, taking a stand and following Jesus.

The third and last class of people making up the audience were the sinners—common everyday sinners. Evangelist Wallace told how Jesus was at his best when speaking to sinners. "He came in to the world to preach to sinners, to save sinners," said the evangelist.

The theme, "What would Jesus preach about?" asked the evangelist. "Salvation of lost sinners was the theme of this great preacher," and continuing the evangelist told how Jesus developed his theme, using the parables of the lost sheep, the lost coin and the prodigal son to illustrate how the sinner is lost and how Jesus saves sinners. "Like the lost sheep," said the evangelist, "the sinner does not intend to get lost, but he continues to nibble at sin, (and here the evangelist illustrated how the sheep left the ninety and nine by nibbling at grass further and further away from the flock) until he is lost. It was a foolish sheep, and it is foolish man, he does not intend to get lost."

Here Evangelist Wallace illustrated by the parable how Jesus seeks his lost sheep, leaving the ninety and nine and seeking the one that is lost.

Illustrating by the parable of the lost coin, Evangelist Wallace told how man is lost by carelessness and neglect. The woman was careless and lost the coin. We are careless and souls about us are lost. Some one fails to care for the young lives and they are lost in sin. Many young men and young women are in sin because the proper influence has not been thrown around them in the home. The evangelist told how the livestock interests was being cared for today, stockmen resorted to tick eradication, etc., to care for their cattle and neglecting the lives of young men and young women, making a striking illustration of the neglect of the soul of man. Continuing the discussion of the parable of the lost coin the evangelist used the finding of the coin to show how Jesus finds a lost soul. The woman first lighted a candle to seek for the coin. God's word—the Bible is the lighted candle unto the lost sinner. Failing to find the coin with the lighted candle the woman swept the floor. It sometimes becomes necessary for God to sweep with his providence to find the lost sinner.

Some people are lost by choice as was illustrated by the speaker using the parable of the Prodigal Son. The son had all that he wish for, but he wandered away into sin. It was the watchful waiting of the father who welcomed the return of the prodigal son. The Father is watchfully waiting to receive the return of the sinner. When the sinner returns there is rejoicing, as was illustrated by the returning of the prodigal son. God is a watchful waiting God, but he sometimes errs man with his providential dealings. The evangelist appealed to his hearers not to wait for the providential dealings of God to bring them back, and emphasized the rejoicing that would be in

heaven over the return of one sinner.

The attendance was good again at the service last night, and many who had not been attending the services were in the audience. Services were announced for ten o'clock in the morning and eight o'clock at night throughout the remainder of the week.

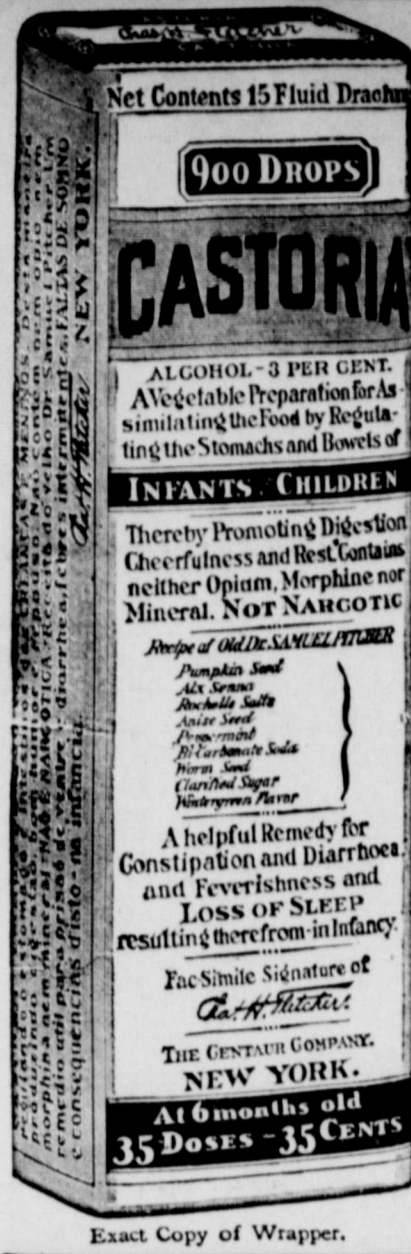
