## Entire German Division is Wiped Out By the Canadians

### People Must Buy Liberty Bonds Or Put Up by Large Taxation

DALLAS, June 4.—The following bulletin was issued today by the Federal Reserve Bank of the 11th United States District, at Dallas:

The Liberty Loan situation in this district is serious. This is a farming section and the farmer and dweller in the country town must respond to the call of the loan or it will fail.

National and State pride should be enough to secure an oversubscription. There is however another aspect of this matter which the farmer and dweller in the smaller towns should take note of, namely, that if this loan is not subscribed we shall have to suffer the heaviest taxation. The men who will not lend their money on good security and reasonable interest will be forced to give it up without return of either principal or interest. If the call of patriotism is not sufficient, business sense should secure subscriptions.

The people of the farms and in the smaller cities and towns dependent on the farming interests MUST realize that it is through them that a large portion of the loan must come. They have the greatest resources in land and real wealth. Although their ready money may be tied up to an extent means must be found to raise funds according to their share in the wealth of the country.

It is to protect their lands, their rights, their privileges of good prices for food stuffs that the government is striving today.

Our large business centers are few and far between. It is to you that the country is calling—the country that educated you, protected you and has made you what you are. Do not shift the responsibility onto the city dweller, but meet your responsibility as Texans Southerners and true Americans.

### 3 MILLION BUSHELS OF WHEAT BURN

PETROGRAD, June 4.—Forest fires in the Minsk region have already burned over seven thousand acres of land, destroying at least three million bushels of wheat.

At Saratoff, according to word received in Petrograd, many big elevators were destroyed.

The origin of the fires is believed to be incendiary, and a vigorous investigation will be made.

It is not known whether any lives have been lost in the fires or not.

### URGES RUSSIAN MINISTER TO STAY RECRUITING STATION OPENED IN BALLINGER

PETROGRAD, June 4.—The cabinet of the provisional government met today at the home of the former Minister of Commerce, M. Kornavaleff, and pleaded with him to withdraw his resignation. Premier Lvov wept in parting with the former minister as he refused to withdraw his resignation.

### Don't Want Russian Paper Money

PETROGRAD, June 4.—The workmen's and soldiers' Journal, now all powerful in Petrograd, makes complaint editorially today against the further issuance of paper money by the Russian government and demands that all war profits be confiscated by the central authority.

R. G. ### GERMANS GAIN SLIGHT FOOTHOLD

PARIS, June 4.—The Germans made a strong attack on the advanced French positions northwest of Friedmont farm last night and gained a foothold for further advances. The French admit failure in the attempt to repulse the attacks.

BERLIN, June 4.—The capture of 250 prisoners and thirty machine guns in two sections of the French line, has been announced by the Berlin war office, officially.

### BRITISH CAPTURE LOST TERRITORY

LONDON, June 4.—The British forces wrested back from the Germans early today the British post, which the British were compelled to give up in Sunday's fighting.

In the Sunday morning fighting the enemy gained slight advantages Southeast of Cherisy, but Hindenburg's men were driven off this gain this morning, and Gen. Haig reported further British advances in the trenches East of Vermelles, enemy trenches being captured.

### GUARDSMEN MUST BE REPLACED

WASHINGTON, June 4.—National guardsmen now doing duty in protecting factories and railroad bridges will be ordered to join their commands when the National Guard units are called in July and August.

The work the guards have been doing will have to be done by watchmen employed for that purpose or by home guards, as the army will call out for service all available guardsmen.

### PRESIDENTS MESSAGE IS IN RUSSIA

WASHINGTON, June 4.—President Wilson's message to Russia stating America's aims in the war, has reached Petrograd.

The message was presented to the provisional government immediately upon being received at Petrograd. The state department at Washington was so advised today.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES  
IN THE FIELD, June 4.—The great war will be over and a "staggering" indemnity straddled upon the United States before she knows she is in the war, according to the belief and attitude of the Prussians. German prisoners captured by the British today reflect this view when they talk freely about the opinion of Germany.

For instance, a typically arrogant Prussian officer jeered at me most contemptuously as he stood inside a barbed wire compound fresh from the battlefield, where the Canadians had mauled his division into scraps and captured and killed the entire division.

"Before America awakens," said this German officer held prisoner by the British, "we will have starved England, France and Italy and made peace with Russia leaving you Americans alone in the field."

To my enumeration of evidences of America's immediate participation in the war, such as the sending of United States destroyers to the submarine zone, the early sending of division troops to the front, and hundreds of thousands of others being recruited and trained for service he replied to each statement, ironically, saying "all bluff."

When I mentioned the big financial advance made to our allies by the American government he replied, "loans are profitable." When I spoke of the large air fleet now being built he said, "the war will be finished before it arrives." I told him Col. Goethals was constructing a vast fleet of food carriers and he said, "you'll be paying indemnity before ships are finished—it's too late, you can't harm us now."



### FULFILLING LOCAL BANKER'S FORECAST

A prediction made by Chas. S. Miller and sent out broadcast in a circular letter two months ago is coming true so fast, that it has prompted a number of those who received Mr. Miller's letter to respond, although the letter was mailed out more than two months ago, the replies are coming in now. During the past few days Mr. Miller has received letters from prominent bankers and officials commenting on the prediction made concerning the food situation, prices, price of cotton, wool, etc. Among the letters received is one from Postmaster General Burleson, dated May 31, just two months to a day from the time Mr. Miller wrote his letter. Another letter comes from the National City Bank of New York, dated nearly two months after the New York bank had received Mr. Miller's letter.

It appears that the latter written by Mr. Miller predicting a food shortage and high prices all along the line, was side-tracked, or discarded, as being of little consequence, until the predictions began to come true, and then those receiving the letters began to reply and congratulate Mr. Miller for his far-sightedness. After offering an apology for not responding to the latter at an earlier date, Mr. Burleson says: "I read with a good deal of interest your comments with regard to the war. I must commend you for your far-sightedness in regard to the food situation."

The reply received from the New York bank, and dated May 10, says: "We are obliged to you for sending us a copy of your letter to 'Patrons and Friends' dated March 31st. It shows that you were on the job early."

In view of the fact that we did not publish Mr. Miller's letter to the public issued on March 31st, and in which he predicted 50 cent wool and 25 cent cotton, we are publishing herewith the letter in full:

To Our Patrons and Friends:

"From all indications it appears now almost certain that our National Government is about to embark into the great European war. Should it actually do so, time can only tell what the ultimate result will be."

"Thus far, our local crop conditions are not encouraging, by any means, for the year 1917. Everybody knows what the result will be with the present high prices of feed and a crop failure."

"Therefore it behoves each individual to put on his thinking cap and adopt resolutions to be carried out in solving the problems now confronting us."

"To aid you in your decision, a few timely suggestions will not come amiss: Under any conditions, it is and ever should be the patriotic duty of each State and individual citizen to stand by and uphold the honor of 'Old Glory,' Our Flag."

"Many will exhibit their patriotism by joining the army and the navy, history will make a record of these and their sacrifices. But, no less noble and grand will be the exemplification of patriotism on the part of those noble men and women who remain at home and devote their utmost energy toward increasing and conserving the agricultural resources of our grand country."

"When millions are fighting and destroying, it requires enormous efforts on the part of the producers to raise enough to feed and clothe the entire world."

"LET EVERY FARMER'S MOTTOS BE:

"Plant more feed and less cotton, Raise more poultry, hogs, cattle and sheep;

More cotton means some will rotten;

More food means more money in the bank to keep."

"While it is true cotton is now a good price, and I personally have no doubt but that it will reach 25 cents by August 1st, which is its real present intrinsic value, according to prices of its manufactured products, still, if we have an over-production this year, it could and would drop below 14 cents, whereas if production is limited, the price can easily be held above 20 cents, thus the farmer would get more for his lesser crop of cotton and besides have that much more land to plant to feed stuff."

"This is also one year, in which, the wool producer can dictate the price, if he chooses. This spring's wool should not be sacrificed below 50 cents or 45 cents per


