## BALLINGER PEOPLE TO HAVE HAND IN RAISING HUNDRED MILLION DOLLAR FUND

**SAN FRANCISCO, June 18.**—The West from the Mississippi to the Pacific, has promised to raise a sum greater than the fifteen million asked of it by the Red Cross War Council. Every state has responded to the appeal and many of them have delighted the Western committee by offering to increase the amounts apportioned them.

California leads the list with \$3,250,000. Texas is next with \$2,500,000. Kansas follows with \$1,600,000. Four big states have promised a million each—Washington, Colorado, Oklahoma and Nebraska. Another million will be raised by North and South Dakota together. Iowa, with the exception of three big cities, will raise half a million. And Missouri with the exception of two cities will do the same.

Oregon has set the mark at \$700,000. Idaho guarantees \$400,000. Montana is down for \$300,000. Arizona and Utah will each raise a quarter of a million. New Mexico and Arkansas have promised \$200,000 apiece, and Nevada and Wyoming say they are good for \$100,000 each.

The total is \$15,850,000—nearly a million more than the West was asked to give.

The first Red Cross meeting ever held in this city was held at the Methodist church Sunday night. At this meeting the following subscriptions were made to the call for funds, and this is just the beginning of what is to follow:

At this time Runnels county will not attempt to raise one dollar per capita, or a total of \$25,000 to help carry on the Red Cross work, but that the citizens of Ballinger are alive to the interest of the American soldiers and will take a big hand in supporting the Red Cross was thoroughly demonstrated at the Red Cross mass meeting held at the Methodist church Sunday night.

For this occasion the different churches of the city, with perhaps one or two exceptions, dismissed their respective services and the people met in a mass meeting, or in a union meeting for the purposes of launching a campaign here to raise funds for the Red Cross and for the purpose of organizing a Red Cross chapter. The meeting was very necessary at this time as National Red Cross week began at this time and will continue through this week. A revival was in progress at the Methodist church, but the pastor, Rev. Curry and the evangelist, Dr. Renfro, very kindly gave way and assisted in making the mass meeting a success.

Complying with a call made by President Wilson several days ago, Mayor Krebs appointed a committee composed of R. T. Williams, chairman; A. W. Sledge, J. A. Weeks, J. McGregor and W. B. Ray, to formulate plans for launching a Red Cross campaign here and observing Red Cross week. The committee met immediately and the mass meeting held Sunday night was the outgrowth of the committee work.

R. T. Williams presided at the mass meeting Sunday night and introduced several speakers, and the short but inspiring talks made it possible for the work to be started in this county under the most favorable circumstances. Patriotic songs, including a male quartette made up the music for the meeting.

Rev. Morgan, pastor of the First Baptist church, was the first speaker of the evening, and he emphasized the fact that many of those who remained at home must substitute their places in war with money. The speaker first gave his endorsement of the work, the method in which it was being launched in Ballinger and stated that the Sunday evening's mass meeting was not out of place but was in perfect harmony with christianity.

Rev. Morgan was followed by short talks by J. McGregor, Chas. S. Miller, Judge A. K. Doss and E. D. Walker. Judge Jno. I. Guion in his characteristic way made the large audience realize that this country was in the war, and made them feel the need of their help in the work undertaken in this city. Judge Guion's address, like all the others speakers, was free from any unkindly criticism of the enemy, but a feeling of pity was expressed for the peo-

### WILL GO TO ITALY AFTER GIRL SLAYER

**WASHINGTON, June 18.**—The state department today cabled the Italian government asking for the provisional arrest of Alfred Cocchi, the alleged slayer of Ruth Cruger in New York. The remains of Miss Cruger were found under the floor of Cocchi's shop after he had fled from this country, following the mysterious disappearance of the young girl.

### CONTRACT IS LET FOR U. S. FLEET

**WASHINGTON, June 18.**—It was officially announced today that the government shipping board had let contracts for ten complete steel cargo-carrying steamers and twenty-four wooden hulls. These will be added to the emergency fleet.

Up to date, the total number of contracts let for the emergency fleet is as follows: twenty-eight complete steel ships; thirty-two composite ships, made of wood and steel; thirty complete wooden ships; and forty-eight wooden hulls.

### PARENTS SHOULD NOW MAKE TRANSFERS

We are told that every year there are quite a number of parents who lose the benefit of the free school money all because they neglect to transfer their children from the district in which they are listed in the scholastic census to the district where they expect to move or to where they expect to send their children to school.

If a child lives in one district and expects to attend school in another, it is absolutely essential that the transfer be made with the county superintendent before the first day of August. To neglect to do this means that you must pay tuition.

Superintendent Hagan stated Monday that he was ready now to receive transfers and make the proper entries in his records, and those wishing to transfer their children from one district to another should not wait until after the first of August. Do it now, if you know what your plans for the coming school term are, and if you do not know what your plans are, find out before the first of August and make the transfer with the county superintendent. You are entitled to free school money if you see that the district in which your children attend school gets credit for the money, but if you do not do your part don't cuss the school board because they will not admit your children free.

On the heels of the report that the steel companies had boosted the prices of steel and were planning to make enormous profits on their contracts with the government, it was learned that any such move will be met with a sharp check by the government.

For the past ten days the raw materials committee and the council for national defense have been working with the heads of the big steel manufacturing companies of the country in trying to fix reasonable prices for steel plates and shapes.

Thursday night will be Red Cross night at the White City. The managers of the movie have offered fifty per cent of their gross receipts to the Red Cross fund on this night. It is expected to fill the picture show to overflow.

There will be something doing Friday, but no definite program has been announced.

Saturday will be Red Cross Day at the Melton Dry Goods Co. store, and Tag Day. Melton Dry Goods Co., have offered five per cent of their gross sales on Saturday to the Red Cross fund. BLESSINGS OF BEING FINITE

Rev. Morgan, since coming to Ballinger to take charge of the pastorate of the First Baptist church, has rapidly gained a hold on his work. He was greeted by a large congregation Sunday morning at eleven o'clock, and delivered a forceful message.

The Blessings of Being Finite
Heb. 2:7. "Thou madest man a little lower than the angels, thou crownedst him with glory and honor and didst set him over the work of thy hands."

It is with much difficulty and long training that we learn to correctly estimate ourselves, and the value of human life clouded as it is with the shadows of decay and death.

God's creation of man puts him a little lower than the angels and fastens upon his frame the mark of dust and dissolution. This fact often overshadows the blessings of our finite life and its temporal relationship. The rich man often does not discover the real value of money and makes it an end of life rather than a means of deeper and wider living. The poor man seldom can take stock of his poverty and let it help him to find the riches of soul that rust can not corrode, nor thieves break thru and steal.

The learned man does not always use his lore to attain and secure that simplicity which makes men great, nor can the ignorant man often grasp the wisdom of being foolish for Christ's sake.

Thus we drift with time, losing or disdaining the values of what we are and struggling with the disappointments of what we are not.

It is the purpose of the meditation suggestion by this text to help us put a better value on temporal things and our finiteness in relation thereto, in order that we may love life to use it rightly.

Though made lower than the angels, and shadowed by the clouds of finiteness, we may yet crown life with glory, honoring God and blessing the world in a limited place of superintendency and stewardship over the works of His creation. Finiteness is the greatest help to faith. The infinite can have love and sympathy, but hopeful faith is swallowed up in knowledge since hope that is seen is not hope for what one seeth that he does not hope for. Being finite blesses our lives with the inspiration of faith, for faith inspires, knowledge suffers, faith undertakes, knowledge rests.

Finiteness permits the inestimable privilege of growth that which is perfect or infinite can not grow, but human life may ever come to the larger and wider sphere of development in all things that pertain to its own pleasures and usefulness. This act enforces human character with its real meaning.

To be able to grow, attaining larger character, values of self-control, courage, candor, gratitude, contentment, prudence, economy, hope and a living conscience are the blessings of finite beings.

Finiteness denies to us the knowledge of the future but fits us with a sense and wisdom that does prepare us in the best way for its revelations and at the same time brings us the joy of unexpected pleasure or the preparedness for disappointments. Finiteness grants us the privilege of having equals and there is no sorrow and loneliness like the sense of being in a class wholly unequal in tastes, nature and ambitions. This passion and need must be suggested in the divine order of being when we find the truth and doctrine of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. A trinity of equals that furnish fellowship and sympathy for the Godhead.

Finiteness again permits the blessing of superiors. The human heart is full of joy to find those who may lift us and upon whom we may lean for counsel and example. The soul would waste itself in bitter disappointment could we not find those that are a stay and strength in times of need.

Finiteness provides us with a faculty to use and preside over the works of God's hands. Things of time can best be used by timely wisdom.

Surely finiteness is the most certain prophecy of some day being lifted and glorified in the infinite, under the grace of our infinite God. "Amazing grace, how sweet the sound that save a wretch like

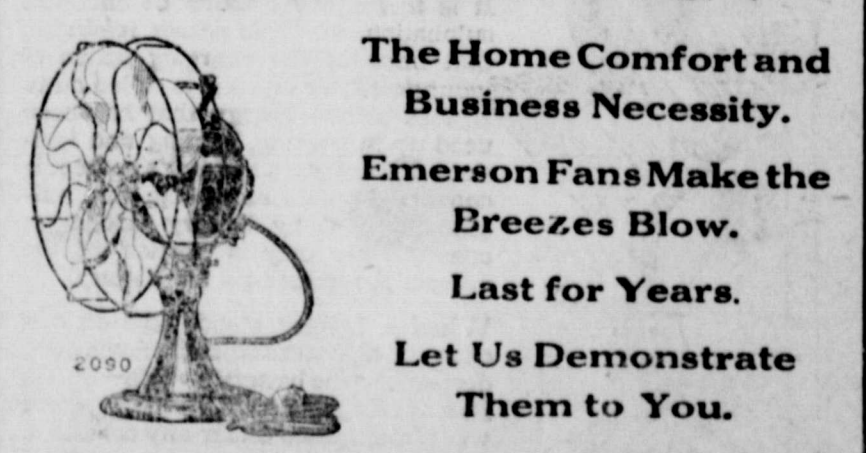

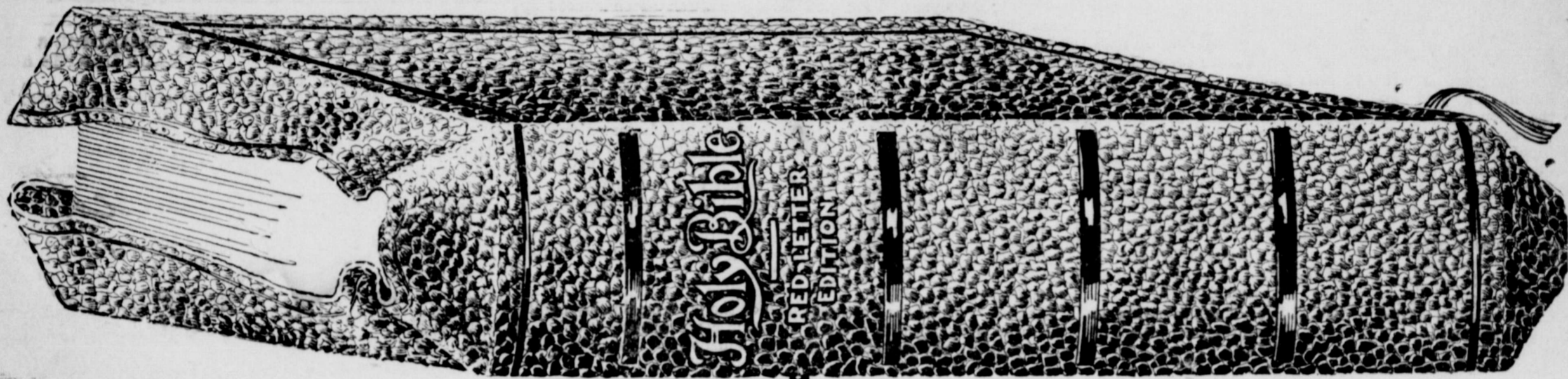

ple who make up the opposing nations in this war, and it was pointed out that America was not fighting for gain of territory, nor in this country carrying on a war of aggression, but was fighting a fight for the spread of christianity and freedom.

Preceding Judge Guion's enthusiastic and inspiring address, Chairman Williams announced that it had been definitely decided by the committee that a permanent chapter of the Red Cross Society would be organized in this city. In order that this work might be carried on successfully, and the chapter organized with a large membership, a soliciting committee was appointed. This committee, as announced by the chairman, is composed of Mrs. U. P. Melton, chairman; of manager of the three sub-committees or squads. Miss Lois Crews, Miss Lucile Powell and Miss Mamie Gregory were appointed to lead each squad in the campaign and three squads are to be organized of eight members each, including the leader and the squads are to be known as the Army Squad, lead by Miss Crews, the Navy Squad, lead by Miss Gregory, and the Aviation Squad, lead by Miss Powell.

The plan as outlined by chairman at the meeting Sunday night, calls for a contest between the three squads in canvassing for members and funds. The leaders appointed were requested to meet at once and select those they wished to make up their respective squads, and to call on the committee for any help they needed. It is expected that the present week will be observed and that a sufficient number of members will be secured to organize a Red Cross chapter here.

During the week different plans for raising money will be adopted. The Walker Drug Co. have announced that fifty per cent of the gross receipts from their soda fountain for one day, the day to be designated later, would go to the Red Cross fund. The Melton Dry Goods Co., announced that they would give five per cent of their gross sales for Saturday, June 23 to the Red Cross chapter. The Queen and White City Theatres will give fifty per cent of their gross receipts one day this week to the Red Cross. Other methods of raising money will be announced later, and in the meantime the young ladies appointed to solicit members will be shelling the woods for subscriptions, and will be armed with membership cards, which provide for any amount the contributor wishes to give to be paid in four monthly installments.

This work is important work. To send American soldiers to the battle front without providing for their care when sick and wounded is unreasonable to think about. There is no other way to raise the money except by free will offerings, and the Red Cross work is carried on in this way.

It is expected that another mass meeting will be held at an early date, at which time Dr. L. P. Allison, of Brownwood, is expected to address the people. Dr. Allison has just returned from Wichita, Kansas, where he attended the National meeting of the Red Cross Society. He is not only an able speaker, but he is familiar with the work in hand and every loyal American is expected to hear him when he comes here.
