# Names and Numbers of Men Drafted In Runnels

## Instructions for Those Who Must Answer Country's Call

Now that the numbers have been drawn and the registrants listed in the order in which they will be called for examination, rules governing exemptions, examinations, etc., will be of interest to those who are subject to call, as well as to their families and friends.

The power of the exemption board is limited, and the idea that a man can get an excuse as easy as he can from a judge when called for jury service will not hold good. The exemption board will receive full instructions within a few days, and those desiring exemptions must appear before the board and show cause why they should not serve, and stand the exemption. To fail to do so will make you subject to call.

Following is excerpts from the instructions issued by the war department.

As soon as quotas are assigned to each state, and each board, each board will call upon persons whose cards are in its jurisdiction instructing them to present themselves for examination. This call will be posted at the office of the local board and the papers will be requested to print it. A notice will be mailed to you, but the posting of the list at the office of the board will be deemed sufficient notice to charge you with the duty of presenting yourself. The law therefore makes it your duty to inform yourself when you are called. The mailing is for your convenience, but if the letter never reaches you, you can not make that an excuse.

Watch the lists at the office of your board and see when you are called for examination.

You must report for physical examination on the day named in your call.

If you are found physically disqualified the board will give you a certificate which will explain to you what your further duties are.

If you are found physically qualified and file a claim for exemption within 7 days after your call you will be given 10 days after your claim of exemption to

file proof in support of your claim of exemption.

If you are found physically qualified and file no claim for exemption, or if you do not appear for physical examination, your name will be posted to the district board as one who was called for military service and was not exempted or discharged. On the eighth day after call, or within two days thereafter, copies of the list of persons so posted to the district board will be given to the press with a request for publication, will be posted in a place at the office of the local board accessible to the public view, and notice will be mailed to you at the address on your registration card.

Therefore watch the notices in the office of the board about 10 days after the day you were called and make arrangements for the prompt receipt of mail.

No claim of discharge on account of the industry in which you are engaged can be decided by a local board.

Whether you file a claim of exemption or not, you must present yourself for physical examination on the day named in the notice.

From the day notice that you are called is mailed and posted you have seven days in which you may file a claim of exemption or discharge. The form for filing this claim is simple. If you wish to file such a claim to the board and get Form 110 for exemption or Form 121 for discharge. If the board has not the printed forms ask to consult the form pamphlet and copy the form shown there.

Your claim of exemption or discharge must be filed within seven days of day on which notice that you are called was posted and mailed. But after you have filed your claim for exemption or discharge you have ten days within which to file proof.

The method of proving claims is simple but it is rather exact. If you follow the rules given below you will have done what is required of you.

First. Go to the local board and

It is known that Scheidemann is opposed to the German submarine policy.

## TO INSPECT ROUTE FOR STATE HIGHWAY

R. P. Kirk receive a phone message Friday requesting that a committee of citizens from Ballinger meet J. W. Golston, of Quanah, secretary of the Tex-O-Kan Highway Association at Abilene Saturday morning, and come prepared to pilot Mr. Golston over the route from Abilene to Ballinger. Mr. Golston is making a tour of inspection of the proposed state highway in order that he might be able to report the meeting to be held at Abilene next Friday.

Mr. Kirk is busy today trying to get a committee ready to go to Abilene, and he is also communicating with Paint Rock and Menard and making an effort to get all the towns along the proposed line to co-operate in organizing the highway over the Ballinger-Paint Rock route.

It is expected that Mr. Golston will find the route this way an ideal one, as it is a high dry route with plenty of material for building roads, and it also gives the connections with other highways desired. It is important that these facts, however, be brought out and that nothing be left undone to place Ballinger on a state highway.

Number 258—Claybourne W. Clayton, Benoit.

At nine-thirty-five Friday morning the first draft number was received at The Ledger office. The numbers continued to come in throughout the day. While numbers were drafted at the rate of about one thousand per hour, only those applying in Runnels county were received here, no number above 1636 being of local interest. The first number drawn was 258 and held in this county by Claybourne Clayton.

The numbers were listed under the name of the registrant holding them and posted for the public. Throughout the day crowds lingered at the bulletin board eager to learn at the earliest possible moment in what turn the names were drawn, and if possible learn the names of those who would be called from this county for the first draft of about one hundred men.

Early in the day the war department sent out a flash that it would require about twelve hours to make the draft. This will run the drawing up into the night, and it will probably be ten o'clock before the last number is announced. Below is given the number and names of registrants drawn up to four o'clock. The remainder of the list will be published in a later edition of The Ledger.

Every number registered in this county will be drawn and the order in which they are listed is the order in which they will be called for exemption or examination. The department has not given out definitely the number of men that will be called from this county to make up the two million men authorized from the first draft. 687,000 men will be called as rapidly as the work can be done, and as soon as these can be officered, equipped and assigned and another call will be made, until the two million men have been placed in service.

As the time for bidding farewell to home folks and departing for the army camp draws near, the people are made to realize more than ever that we are at war. Many who a few months ago never dreamed that they would have to go to war will within the next few weeks be wearing a soldier's uniform and will be training for service. Of this number it is estimated that at least four hundred will be called from Runnels county. These four hundred men will be selected from the list of 1636 registrants in the following order:

## GERMANS AND FRENCH IN BIG HAND TO HAND FIGHT

PARIS, July 20.—Germany's night last night the battle raged with great destruction to both sides, and the Germans made slight gains. The attack by the Germans is the most desperate since the war, and the troops are fighting with a force that indicates victory or death.

## WILL TAKE 18 HOURS TO COMPLETE DRAWING MEN

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Up to one o'clock only two thousand numbers had been drawn. On this basis it will require until three a. m. Saturday to complete the drawing. Announcers of the numbers drawn slow down on account of getting hoarse, and change in shifts are being made frequently.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Selecting men to serve in the army to be made up by selective draft began on schedule time this

morning. Secretary Baker drew the first number. Number 258 was the first number drawn. The registrant holding this number in every district will be the first man called for examination.

It is now estimated that it will require twelve hours to draw the entire list of more than ten thousand names, and it will be nine or ten o'clock tonight before the last number is drawn. Up to four o'clock this afternoon a little more than one-half of the number had been drawn.

SAVING A NATION.

It is the history of all nations since history was written that there come crises in the national life of all peoples when prompt action is imperative if destruction be averted. Some peoples have taken such action and lived, while others have slumbered and died.

Grave as the consequences of our present struggle are apt to be, the American people, it can be seen more clearly as time passes, are being saved by it from an even greater danger which threatened them—the danger of over-prosperity and over-indulgence.

Even now, since we have entered upon the task of mobilizing American resources, the mind staggers at the colossal values aggregated. Where a few years ago we whispered in awe of millions, now we speak of billions as glibly as a school girl prattles of pin money.

This of itself would not have constituted such a grave danger had not our people framed their personal lives on the same vast scale. From talking in thousands to living in thousands is an easy step. The same is true of millions. As our operations increased and our national wealth piled up our personal ideas enlarged apace, until when we woke up last April to find ourselves the probable deciding factor in the greatest war of all history, we discovered ourselves living at a rate that could have had but one possible ending—national disaster, if not national death.

War is horrible. We shrink from it and wish from the bottom of our hearts that it could be banished from the earth forever more. Yet in this war the heroes who die for us on the fields of France will confer a greater blessing upon their country than merely preserving its honor, as the world sees honor. They will have saved us from national moral decay and death. For the domestic revolution, without which our part in the conflict can not be carried out, is the upheaval that was needed to take our feet out of the road to death and set them on the road to a broader and saner life.

consult the regulations to find out the form number of the affidavits that you must submit for your particular claim.

Second. Ask the board for the blank affidavits that are necessary in presenting your proof.

Third. Have the affidavits properly accomplished and return them to the board within the time limit assigned you—10 days from the filing of your claim.

There will be no argument before the board and no proof other than the prescribed affidavits unless calls for other proof which it will do in only a limited number of cases.

Every claim for discharge or exemption will be decided by the local board within three days after your affidavits have been filed.

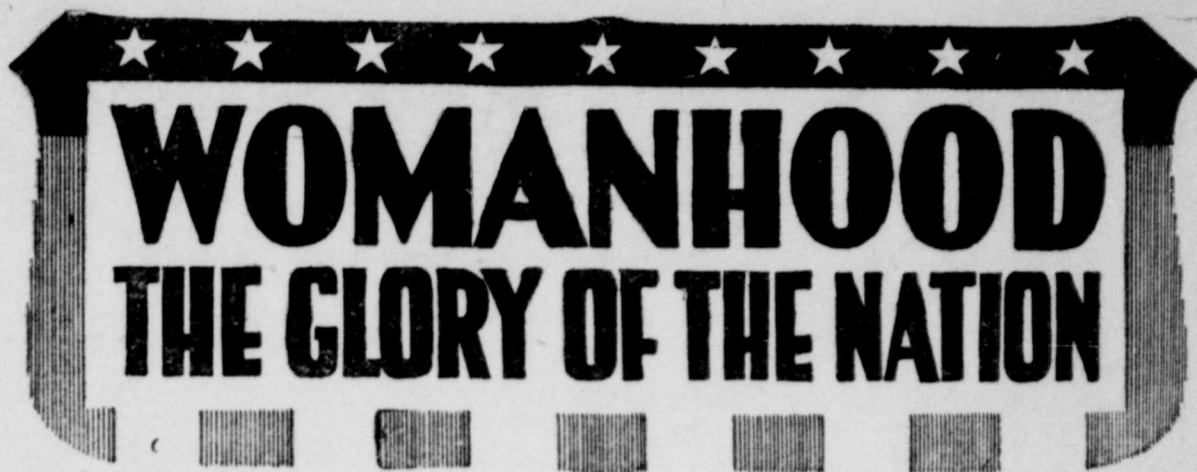
If your claim is allowed a certificate of exemption or discharge will be issued to you.

This certificate may be recalled at any time.

If it is temporary or conditional, it becomes of no effect when the time or the condition named are fulfilled.

You have been drawn for military service and when the condition that has postponed your posting to the colors ceases you may be recalled at any time.

Remember that your case may still be appealed to the district board by the Government and on this appeal your certificate may be withdrawn at once. When so withdrawn you stand precisely as though you had been selected for military service by the local board.

If your claim is disallowed by the local board your name will be certified and sent by the local board to the district board as one who has been called for military service and not exempted or discharged. Within two days thereafter, if practicable, a list of those so certified to the district board will be given to the press with a request for publication, will be posted in the offices of the local board accessible to the public view, and notice will be mailed to the address on your registration card.

**Claims for Discharge On Industrial Grounds.**

Only the district board can receive claims for discharge on the ground that you are engaged in industry, including agriculture found to be necessary to the maintenance of the military establishment, the effective operation of the military forces, or the maintenance of national interest during the emergency.

Only affidavits can be used in filing proof before the district board of a claim for exemption on industrial grounds. All such affidavits must be filed within five days after the filing of the claim.

If the decision of the district board is in favor of the claim the board will issue a certificate of discharge. If the decision is against the claim the district boards will so notify you.

Only decisions of district boards on industrial claims for discharge can be appealed.

If you desire to appeal the decision of the district boards to

the President, you may do so within seven days of the date of mailing to you of the decision of the district board.

Notice that your have been selected for military service will not

necessarily order you into service.

The notice to report for military service will come when the Government is ready to receive you.

**MEXICANS SHOOT AT BORDER PATROL**

MISSION, Tex., July 20.—Approximately 500 shots were exchanged across the Rio Grande yesterday at Ojo de Agua, eight miles southwest of Mission, between a small American border patrol and a number of unidentified Mexicans. There were no American casualties, but latest reports here say two or three Mexicans were seen to fall during the engagement, which started at 11 o'clock yesterday morning and ceased at 5 o'clock when the Mexicans withdrew from the river. The Americans were under command of Corporal Kent, the identity of whose regiment is not known here, and the fighting started when several shots were fired at the patrol from the Mexican side. The outpost at Ojo de Agua, hearing the Americans returning the shots, immediately sent reinforcements under Sergeant J. C. Henderson. The fighting continued six hours. Col. B. F. Dalimeter reached today with 100 men from K and H companies of the Second Texas infantry. A strong patrol has been thrown out along the Rio Grande and affected section as a precaution against a possible attempt at border raiding. Few details of the engagement reached here. From the best information there were about 100 Mexicans participating and one report says three distinct bugle calls were heard. This leads to belief that Americans were attacked by an organized force.
