FIRST TO HIT HUNS

J. D. Justice is in receipt of a letter from his son, Marvin. The letter was dated "At the Front." Every American knows where that is, and a letter dated at that place is always read with interest.

Marvin enlisted in the Marines early in the game. He was with the boys who blazed the way for the other American soldiers and who put the Germans to flight, and created a name for the Americans that the Germans hate with all the hate at their command.

Following is a part of the letter received by Mr. Justice this week:

Dear Daddy: I received your letter. Was glad to hear from you. I had not heard from home in some time. have been so busy I could not get my mail. Have been ten days in some battle and open warfare. Not in the trenches, but from

woods to woods. We drove the Germans back three times in two days and we win ground in every battle. The French were retreating when we were brought up and we started things to going forward as soon as we hit the ground. We were brought up in trucks and we have advanced every day a little. nights, when were finally releived and are now about three miles

from the lines. In support the Marines certainly made some name in France. The French are crazy about the Marines. They don't talk about anything but the Marines, Marines Marines. We did some good fighting, and I wish you could have I seen how the boys went after the Germans when we landed on the scene and got them in the open field. We run them from one to another and the folks at home who receive news of their son's death ought to feel very proud of their sons for being the first and best soldiers in the field to drive the Germans back. The Germans sure hate the Marines. They call them the "Devil Dogs."

I lost my officer wounded before we made the second attack and I had to take charge of my platoon of 55 men and lead them myself and I did the best I knew how, and we made the fartherest advance and lost less men than any other plateon in action. Our major was in the woods with us and he complimented us in many ways and recommended me to our division commander for bravery.

I hope I will continue lucky, but if they ever get me I will die doing my duty. The Marines are great fighters and my boys are willing to go any where with me, and I love them like brothers.

Don't worry about me if you don't hear from me often. There are times I can't mail letters for 15 or 20 days. So don't worry.
