LITTLE MARY BELLE DOSS IS DEAD

When Jesus said, "Suffer little children, and forbid them not to come unto me; for of such is the kingdom of heaven," He made it possible for fathers and mothers to see their children removed from this sinful world and transplanted in His Kingdom.

While today a home in Ballinger is sorrow stricken, a father's and mother's heart and the hearts of her grand parents are breaking with sorrow, and sadness is all among their host of friends, the sweet little spirit of little blue eyed Mary Belle Doss is with Him who took the little children in His arms and blessed them.

Her little chair in the home is vacant, but she has claimed the crown prepared for her in heaven. Her little playmates here have been made to sorrow, but the angels in heaven have been made to rejoice.

Just one week before the little soul took its flight from this world and during the revival which closed last Sunday, little Mary Belle in the simple child like way, responded to the call of the evangelist for converts, and while the choir sang "Jesus is Tindery Calling," walked down the aisle and gave her hand to the evangelist and told him she wanted to give her heart and life to Jesus. She would have become a member of the Methodist church last Sunday, such announcement having been made, had she not become ill on the Saturday night before.

Mary Belle was six years and six teen days old. She was the oldest daughter of Judge and Mrs. A. K. Doss. She passed out of this

world at four-forty-five o'clock Thursday afternoon, September 12, 1918.

It will be remembered by the friends of Judge and Mrs. Doss that Mary Belle was quite ill early in the summer with what was thought to be typhoid fever. She recovered from that illness and was able to be about her play and in the Kindergarten school up until Saturday night before her death on Thursday, although her health was known to be not as good as before she first became sick.

Wednesday night the little girl was carried to the sanitarium, where an operation was performed and everything that human hands and skilled minds could do proved too weak, and at the above hour the sweet little soul took its flight into a world where sickness and sorrow can not go.

The announcement that Mary Belle was dead brought sorrow to many, for she was well known and popular among a large circle of playmates, and the sympathy of many hearts in Ballinger go out to the bereaved parents and grand parents.

At two o'clock Friday afternoon the remains were carried to the Methodist church, where Mary Belle attended Sunday school regular, and Dr. Sam G. Thompson, Presiding Elder, from Brownwood conducted the funeral services. Wreaths and cut flowers placed about and banked on the little casket symbolized purity of the little life which had been claimed from this world.

A long procession of friends formed at the church following the funeral and wended their way to the City Cemetery where the little remains were tenderly laid to rest. The pall bearers were C. P. Shepherd, Paul Triunmier, W. A. Francis, U. E. Hartman; honorary pall bearers, A. W. Sledge, Scott H. Mack, R. T. Williams, E. Sheppard, E. D. Walker, and G. W. White.

Besides the parents and grand parents, Mary Belle is survived by two little sisters younger than she was.

Rev. W. H. Doss and Mrs. Doss came in from DeLeon, Thursday night, to attend the funeral of their little grand daughter, Mary Belle Doss.

NINE BALLINGER NURSES IN SERVICE

Mrs. Archie R. Crews has on display in the hall of the Halley & Love sanitarium a Red Cross service flag. The flag is a beautiful one. It differs some what from the regular service flag displayed in so many homes and places of business throughout the country at this time.

On a white back ground a large Red Cross stands out surrounding the Red Cross there are nine bright blue stars, representing nine nurses who have gone from this institution into the Red Cross service, or who have volunteered, and accepted and are waiting transportation and shipping orders.

Mrs. Crews is justly proud of her service flag, and when one is reminded that of fourteen graduates from the Ballinger Training School for nurses nine have entered Red Cross work and given themselves to the cause of suffering humanity, volunteering to go any where the American Red Cross sees fit to send them, all will agree that Mrs. Crews and her associates in the local school have something to feel proud of.

These nurses who have been assigned to duty in different parts of the world, and some of whom have been carried so far away that their friends here today do not know where they are, are Miss Emma Blunt, Miss Emma Pagles, Mrs. Nellie Whaley, Mrs. Ruby Scott, Miss Florence Parr, Miss Maggie Joyner, Miss Lillian Wiedemann, Miss Alta Pritchard, Miss Estelle Hunt.

These ladies go forth as a band of angels of mercy, and hundreds of wounded soldiers will be nursed back to where they can fill places of usefulness in this world all because of the Ballinger Training School for nurses taught them and sent them out into the world to perform a duty that only a trained nurse can perform.

LOCAL GARAGES TO OBSERVE SABBATH DAY

Mr. Joyner, if you want to joy ride on Sunday, you must make all your arrangements on Saturday. You must fill your gasoline tank, fill up on free air and fortify against break downs before Sunday comes.

Hereafter local garages will close at the usual hour on Saturday night, about nine o'clock, and will remain closed until Monday morning. The garage men have given notice that Sunday will be observed as it should be and their employes will not be required to work on Sunday.

If you go in the ditch while joy riding on Sunday, you must get out the best you can or remain in the ditch until Monday, as the notice given by the garage men says: "We will not change easings on Sunday."

In the past garages have been running on full time on Sunday, and practically the same service given on Sunday as on week days. If a man wanted to buy a new casing, and have same adjusted on his car, all that was necessary was to roll in and make the deal. If he had a blow out or a puncture he made a beeline for the garage and called the mechanic into service. Nothing like this in the future.

The public, with perhaps the exception of a few who have no regard for the Sabbath and who do think some men should work all the time, will readily approve of the closing rule and comply with it by buying their gasoline and auto supplies on business days. There is no more excuse for keeping a garage open on Sunday than there is in keeping a grocery store open on Sunday.

SAYS THE FEE IS TOO HIGH

In the notice given by the Executive Committee of the Ballinger Chapter, A. R. C. in which the announcement was made that arrangements were under way for a training course in Elementary Hygiene and Home Care of the Sick, the fee was given as being \$150, when it should have been \$1.50. LONDON, SEPT. 13—(7:00 P. M.)—THE AMERICANS HAVE COMPLETELY FLATTENED OUT THE ST. MIHILE SALIENT ACCORDING TO DISPATCHES FROM THE FRONT TONIGHT. TWELVE THOUSAND PRISONERS HAVE BEEN TAKEN SO FAR.

Berlin, Sept. 13—During the night the evacuation of the salient was completely undertaken with out interference from the enemy. We now are standing in new lines which have been prepared, the German war office announces. Unclear weather was the means of evacuation and wasnot from the entire salient, merely that part of the line southwest of Thiaucourt.

Crushing in the flanks of the St. Miheil pocket the American boys are reported to have reduced the avenue of escape for the Germans in the salient to six miles by the advance. They advanced eight miles from the south, three from the west and took ninety five hundred prisoners and sixty guns. The offensive is still in full blast today with the American troops winning new gains hourly.

London reported that the Americans have reached Vingneulle in the middle of the original German wedge.

The Germans all along the line are blowing up their munition dumps and having much trouble in getting their artillery out of the American's trap, rains having made the roads bad.

London, Sept 13—The first American army under personal command of General Pershing for the first time went into action today in the St Miheil salient. Never before has there been such a large concentration of American troops for one operation and never have the Americans been in such complete control of their own operations.

The event had long been anticipated, some people assigned to it grandiose objectives but in reality the attack is for limited objectives only.

At one o'clock Thursday morning the artillery preparations began with a roar that could be heard many miles away. From all the roads that run parallel the flashes of innumerable guns told of the impending assault. Toward 5 o'clock, the hour of the attack, the firing became even more rapid and it sudden tone mingled strangely with the sound of the rain.

At dawn the whole fleet of tanks manned by strong young Americans and French were to be seen moving out of their shelters to lead the attack. They lumbered on but the Germans offered little opposition. The American infantry followed in open order, plowing through the mud, but they were little troubled by the feeble artillery resistance.

At one point near Seicheprey, where the Americans had previously fought desperately with the Germans, machine gun and automatic fire swept down upon the Yanks right flank, but the tanks and artillery quickly moved in that direction and the Americans went steadily forward.

At 7 o'clock the tanks had disappeared amid a smoke cloud over the ridge on the front of Seicheprey.

The Germans have offered very little resistance to the advancing Americans. Occasionally a stang machine gun or automatic rifle has been discovered but it is apparent that the enemy has withdrawn his main forces to a second line, which possibly he will defend with a certain degree of tenacity.

His artillery has been firing from behind a ridge which runs in front of the American line but he is being pursued by tanks which at one point lost only one out of forty-five and that stuck in the mud.

The accident occurred when he became overbalanced and attempted to catch the rope which pulls the drill casing bit. The machinery was in motion and his hand was partly drawn through the block. The workmen immediately went to his rescue, but he was forced to endure intense suffering for twenty minutes until the block could be taken to pieces and his hand released.

OIL COMPANY ABANDONS WELL

Robert Lee, Sept 12—The derrick has been moved from the Robert Lee Oil Well No. 1 on Lockdale ranch and has been erected on the Stroud farm on the Colorado river. The Robert Lee Oil Well No. 1 has been obstructed with drill casing and tools for some months and it seems that it could not be entirely cleared. The company will accordingly sink another well.

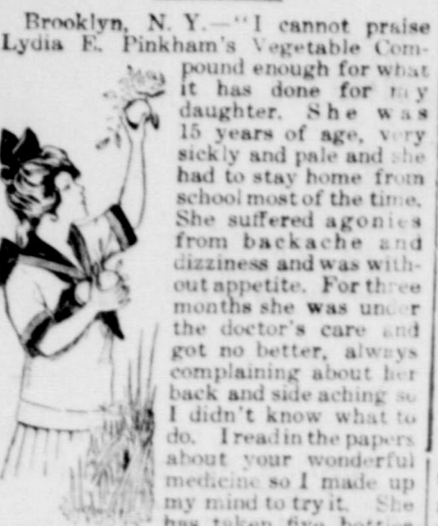

Included in the equipment furnished each infantryman by the ordnance bureau of the war department are 62.7 ounces of brass. This is exclusive of the uniform equipment provided by the quartermaster corps.

Used in the haversack are 1.8 ounces of brass; in the bayonet scabbard, 0.6 ounce; in the canteen cover, 0.2 ounce; cartridges (100), 47.4 ounces; cartridge belt, 10 ounces; gun sling, 1 ounce; oiler and thong case, 1.5 ounces; pouch for first-aid packet, 0.3 ounce.

Equipment from the ordnance bureau for 100,000 infantrymen contains almost 100 tons of brass.

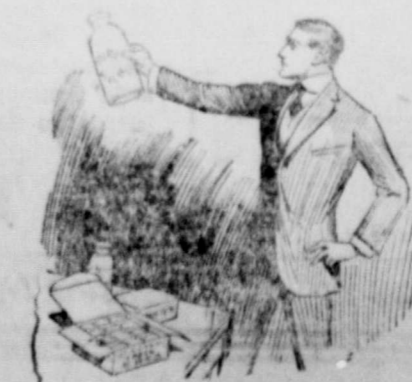
